Arts on Main Art Center in Gastonia, NC, Offers Works by Jacqueline Dunford

The Arts on Main Art Center in downtown Gastonia, NC, will feature in the Gallery Vault, works by Gaston County Art Guild president Jacqueline Dunford entitled, *Encaustic and Clay*, on view from Oct. 2 through Nov. 3, 2012. A reception will be held on Oct. 5, from 6:30-8:30pm.



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is *The Stages of the Inner Man from a Platform of Origami Cranes*. This installation is based on the discoveries of Dr. Erik Erikson

who developed the eight stages of successful psychosocial human development. Four large ceramic origami cranes sit on the floor

with 500 origami cranes attached to 12

strands. The cranes increase in size, color

and pattern as they ascend to the ceiling,

representing human growth and develop-

ment. This installation is part of the current

exhibit, Melancholy, currently on view in

the Arts on Main gallery.

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Dunford moved to Belmont, NC, in 2001 from West Virginia in pursuit of a more favorable winter climate. She has had a lifelong love of crafting, is a prolific jewelry designer and sells her designs in the Arts on Main gift shop.

Dunford was introduced to the encaustic process through a painting course and at the same time, fell in love with ceramics and began working with both exclusively in 2009. The encaustic process and ceramics have the relation that both are 100% recyclable in their natural forms of beeswax and unfired clay which is very important to this artist. She uses some of the same tools for both mediums and makes ceramic stamps to use for encaustic processes.

Encaustic and Clay will feature encaustic works from the inspirations of nature and technique, some developed by herself. Included will be *Lake Wylie Summer* using a photo taken from her back yard and *Reds*, a very nice contrast of colors. This exhibit will also include 5 of her favorite shoe sculptures and her muse: a black velvet 80's style disco era, Elton John platform shoe. treat with the 18" *Fierce Red Unishoe* made entirely of matchsticks. She was inspired by the suspense thriller movie *Black Swan* to create the conceptual shoe, *Then She Morphed into the Black Swan*, complete with swan foot-hand morphing heel and black feathers using a ballet slipper shape.

Another conceptual collaboration of encaustic, clay and origami is a floor to ceiling installation with a psychological inspiration *continued above on next column to the right* In 2010, Dunford received her AFA and became president of the Gaston County Art Guild the same year. She won first place in the *I Am Woman* show in 2008 and second place in 2009 and has won numerous ribbons and purchase awards in North and South Carolina art competitions. Dunford devotes much of her time to the guild committees of grant writing, community outreach projects, and social networking. She enjoys giving demonstrations of the encaustic process to schools, guilds and hosting workshops across the country and at the Arts on Main Art Center.

Dunford is an initial organizer/consultant/designer of the development of the Arts on Main Art Center. Located at 212 W Main Ave in downtown Gastonia, the formerly abandoned, historic Citizens National Bank now houses Arts on Main with 18 individual artist studios, a fine arts gallery, gift shop, classrooms and is operated by guild members on a voluntary basis. The gallery has a Work by Jacqueline Dunford

vault (one of many in the building) that is used for community outreach exhibits and featured artists on an alternating basis in collaboration with each 2 month long gallery exhibit.

Dunford devotes her studio at Arts on Main to encaustic painting and sells her art and jewelry in the gift shop, in the 6 annual exhibits hosted in the AoM gallery, the guild sponsored exhibits: *A Visual Harvest* in the Rauch gallery on the campus of Gaston College and *A Natural View* at the Schiele Museum, both in Gaston County.
