if ART Gallery in Columbia, SC, will present *Washing the Dust*, featuring a solo exhibit of works by Asheville, NC, artist Mark Flowers, on view from Oct. 28 through Nov. 19, 2016. A reception will be held on Oct. 28, from 6-8pm.

The exhibition is called *Washing the Dust*, from a Picasso quote that he uses in his artist statement: "The purpose of art is washing the dust of daily life off our souls".

"They are shaped works that are objects and images at the same time," says Flowers in describing his work. "I often use visual elements in a sequence, not unlike how a filmmaker does to create a narrative. The separate images come together to make a whole. They are brief observations of my life in a static form."

In this new group of work are influences from a recent trip to Barcelona in the Spring and an intense residency at Golden Artist Colors in New Berlin, NY, this past Summer. His narrative, mixed media works evoke events and observations from his life. His rich panels of enhanced surface and figurative images combine to create a narrative that evokes a storyline to engage the viewer.

Flowers was raised in Greenville, SC, and has been part of the Southeastern art community for over 35 years. His work has been exhibited nationally and internationally and he is in numerous public and private art collections throughout the country. He and his artist/wife, Kristy Higby, live in Alexander, NC, just north of Asheville. They live in a handmade log cabin and work out of a large studio located on the property.

The Arts Council of Henderson County is proud to present the 57th annual Art on Main fine art/fine craft festival along Hendersonville, NC's historic Main Street, Oct. 1 & 2, 2016. Festival hours will be 10am–5pm both days.

One of the region's most popular outdoor arts festivals, Art on Main will feature fine arts and fine crafts from local and regional artists, as well as many artists from states beyond the southeast region. More than 80 artists will participate in this juried and judged festival.


Among the new artists for this year is wood artist Jason Green. Green is a Southern Highland Craft Guild member from Boone, NC. His totems bring to mind cairns although his are made from polished "stones" of wood. Also new to Art on Main, local artist Kim McCrum who makes silver jewelry with a contemporary edge and a touch of the southwest. Her perforated layers have depth and pattern. Terri Johansson, of St. Augustine, FL, works her magic with glass that is formed in the kiln. Her landscapes are fired as many as 11 times to create depth and texture. Although not completely new to Art on Main, Harry Jarman returns after a few years absence from the show. Jarman's paintings include still lifes and landscapes with fine detail. He was an annual fixture at Art on Main for many years and we are thrilled to see him return. Amy Perrier, who was new to Art on Main last year, has had one of her paintings, "Morning Blush," selected for Art on Main's marketing image for 2016. Her acrylic finger painting will be seen on postcards, posters and T-shirts promoting this year's show. Three distinguished judges will be judging the artist's work and booths to determine winners for \$3,000 in prize money. She earned a BFA in Art from the University of Georgia with concentrations in Ceramics and Textile Design. She enjoys sharing her knowledge of clay with others and has taught at Spartanburg Art Museum since 2000. Williamson is a founding member of West Main Artists Cooperative, where she maintains a studio and where she has served on its management board since 2009. Williamson was featured in the Spartanburg History Museum's Exhibition: Pottery Then and Now. She is a member of the Spartanburg Artists' Guild and has had work accepted in their juried shows.
