American Folk Art & Framing in Asheville, NC, will present *Straight Out of Alabama*, featuring works by James A. "Buddy" Snipe, on view from Oct. 6 - 26, 2016. A reception will be held on Oct. 7, from 6-8pm.

Snipe incorporates the elements of high art: Line, Form, Texture, Balance, Color, yet being uninhibited by these norms, he adds rhythmic improvisation & narrative which bridges the worlds of Primitive and Modern art in completely original ways.

A handsome and robust man in his 70's, Snipe, known as Buddy, did not start life that way; a puny child, the 12th of 12 children, he did not possess the physical strength the family's rural Alabama farm demanded, so Buddy was often left to his own devises. During these hours of solitude, he developed a remarkable life-of-the-mind, creating, with found scraps and detritus, the only toys his brothers and sisters ever had: Baby dolls made from cow and goat bones. Vines, sticks, shards of glass, springs...all found their way to young Buddy, and his imagination would take over.

His yard is a colorful delight, full of kinetic sculptural additions which attracted the attention of champions of Southern folk and vernacular art with his pieces

being exhibited in museums and added to private collections throughout the country. He is completely fueled by his own imagination, not outside trends or influences. Other than paint, he only uses found materials and cast-offs. He sees things no one else could, and fashions sculptures and paintings completely original to him.
