"Searching to connect to a time and place undefined by buildings and roads, I merge these materials to create a recognizable yet undefined object - something earthy, ancient eroded, symbolic ... feminine," adds Langston.

Robinson received a Bachelor of Arts in Urban Studies from Tufts University in Medford, MA, and a Master's Degree in City Planning with a concentration in Urban Design and Community Development from MIT. While working in the urban transit and planning field for over 25 years, she engaged in a parallel pursuit of art. She became a full-time artist in 1999 and has been teaching abstract mixed media and collage workshops and exhibiting her work on the east and west coast ever since.

Robinson's work has been displayed widely in Washington, DC, Oregon, and Washington state. In addition, she has offered consultation services to arts nonprofits, worked as a curator for festivals and art fairs, managed art programs and mural projects for civic and corporate institutions, and managed a creative re-use center. She currently lives, works, and offers classes in her home studio in Washington, DC.

Fleming Markel offers the following artist's statement: "Our culture perpetuates many traditions and beliefs within our governing, religious and social institutions. Many of these traditions and beliefs are myths, unfounded notions. Yet, these myths exert control on our daily lives, and on our world view. By constructing objects that question the veracity of those myths, I try to counteract their social control. I juxtapose disparate materials to make sculpture with titles that offer questions, but no answers. My sculpture, while humorously off-kilter, might also be uncomfortably confrontational.

with the 50th Anniversary n parmersmp Celebration of the South Carolina Arts Commission, The Arts Center of Greenwood, in Greenwood, SC, is hosting a solo exhibit, Remnants: Jim Arendt, for 2013 -2014 SCAC artist fellowship recipient, Jim Arendt, on view through Oct. 28, 2017.

The exhibit is one of fifteen exhibitions taking place throughout South Carolina of current and past visual artist fellowship recipients.

Mark Flowers and Kevin Isgett's paintings meet at Greenville Technical College's **RIVERWORKS** Gallery as a collection of stories. The similarities and diversities of voice and content are collected as a single exhibition in a similar fashion that short stories are collected within a literary journal. Each painter uses the body language of solitary male figures to tell his story. Isgett traps silent young men in bleak landscapes painting skewed, expressionistic portraits.

The young men's averted, unfocused eyes speak, not aloud but as reme experiences. Flowers combines his anonymous male figures with non-objective imagery. This imagery and the figures are in the same plane but separated by a distinct change of field. Through his figures and the shape, color, and surface of their non-objective speech, he tells his stories.

"Funny Little Man Arrives". Isgett, speaking to his process says, "I like to distort the shape of the head and the placement of features to get a more intense feeling in the character....I believe a piece is finished when I sense a personality evolving and a compelling emotional connection." Flowers on the other hand states: "I have always made use of painting to understand my relationship with the world.... In seeking meaning in the world, I am sharing my story in hopes of making common connections with others."

West Main Artists Co-Op in Spartanburg, SC, Features Works by Beth Regula and Louisa Coburn

The West Main Artists Co-Op in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting Lyrical Lines, featuring works by two local artists, Beth Regula and Louisa Coburn, on view through Oct. 14, 2017.

three-dimensional works on display. Regula, the chair of West Main Artists Co-Op, is most well known for her abstract 3-D creations made from clay, paint, and unfettered mixed media. They often show complex and conflicting images working in harmony to convey social or emotional messages. Coburn, a past member of the Co-Op, will present a series of thematic non-representational paintings that utilize strong colors organizing along a horizontal

Regula, 67, is reluctant to classify her work "because I feel that artists do not need to limit themselves to any particular media or style," she said. "By exploring all media, learning takes place. As an artist grows, they will use the media that works best for what they are trying to convey at any particular time. Maturity and learning helps the artists to develop their own recognizable style. Although I use a variety of media in my work, I think that my style is seen in all that I create."

Most of Regula's professional life was in teaching art and English in South Carolina schools. However, in the early 1980s, she was a Project Manager for Cox Cable Communications in Atlanta, GA. In 1983, she became a full-time artist. She and her husband Dennis reside in Roebuck, SC. Her work has been widely showcased throughout the Upstate, reaching as far away as San Diego, CA.

In describing this exhibit, Regula said, "To me a lyrical line is a line that moves within space or dances across a page or canvas. As I look at the world around me, I

see all objects as lyrical lines. They sweep upward, swirl, cross each other, sweep downward and in general dance. As they dance, they set up a rhythm or tension with other lines. The tension created, I relate to ons of human emotions. The works in this exhibit express my visual interpretation to these human emotions. I have used lines of clay, string, paint and ink for this expression. Within the exhibit there are sculptures, 3-D wall hangings, paintings and pen and ink works. I wanted to set no limits on the materials used or the sizes of the pieces."

Regula has 12-20 pieces of art in this exhibit, and they will be for sale, starting at \$100.

"This is my second time to be exhibiting with Louisa Coburn at WMAC," Regula said. "I met Louisa when she joined the Co-Op. It has been a very rewarding experience to plan this exhibit with Louisa. Our work represents our two different views of the interpretation of Lyrical Lines."

Coburn is a former member of the Co-Op and a clay, watercolor, and mixed media artist. She is a native of Hudson Valley, NY, but has deep southern roots and has lived in Spartanburg for the past 33 years. She has degrees in English and Child Study. Service, and as a teacher in public and private schools. Her career as an artist began relatively late in life: She took her first studio art course in ceramics at the defunct Spartanburg Arts Center on Spring Street in 2000. Her fascination with water color began with her first class with Sa Smith at the Church of the Advent in 2004. She likes to "color outside the lines," she said. Her work is playful and expressive, non-traditional and non-representational. She has 12-20 pieces in this exhibit

"When I first started thinking about this show about 18 months ago," Coburn said, "I thought it would be called 'It's Lyrical,' and be a show that played off literal song lyrics that were meaningful to me. I really did not want to reveal that much information about myself. When Beth decided to exhibit with me, we settled on the title Lyrical Lines. What I have learned from preparing for this show is that both 'lyrical' and 'line' in the arts have meanings different from what they might mean for me as an English major."

"Line implies movement in art. Lyrical implies deeply felt emotion. I had to find a way to approach this idea that made sense

to me, and I did so by focusing on 'line' in a very basic way. I started thinking about the myriad ways lines control us from a very early age. We line up, toe the line, sign on the line, color within the lines, don't cross the lines, etc. All those rules! My next thoughts were about telephone lines, telegraph lines, airlines, lines of sight - all the ways lines might foster con Many of the paintings start with a horizontal line that divides the space. What happens in and around the line is what interests me."

During these travels, Dr. Lenti always carried art supplies to visually record her travels; she studied impressionism at galleries including exhibits in Florence, the Hermitage in St. Petersburg, the Prado in Milan, the Louvre in Paris, The Arts Institute in Chicago and many others. Dr. Lenti was named a Perfornance Fellow of the SC Arts Commission, taught and lectured many years at the SC Governor's School for the Arts and at the Interlochen Center of the Arts in Michigan.

For the past decade, she has owned Art by Marianne Lenti as an artist-in-residence at the Greenwood Arts Center, displaying works in oil, acrylic, pastels, assemblage, and watercolor. She has continued art study through workshops with leading artists hroughout the country and was honored by the Reserve at Lake Keowee, where she taught pastel artists for a week, and completed a commission for their gallery.

Lenti displays regularly at the South Carolina Festival of Flowers, the Uptown Market in Greenwood, and regional art shows. She is a landscape artist specializing in acrylic on canvas. Her recent project, "Spirit Trees[®]," combines her love of nature and color.



Lenti is a Professor Emeritus of Fine Arts at Lander University in Greenwood, where she lives her with husband, Anthony.

Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, **SC**, **Offers Works** by Henri Matisse

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting Henri Matisse: Jazz & Poetry on Paper, a sweeping exhibition that celebrates four of the artist's books, including his iconic Jazz portfolio, on view through Jan. 15, 2018. Drawn from the Bank of America art collection, the exhibition features 80 framed illustrations that together offer meditations on life, love. hardship, and utter joy.

"Henri Matisse is one of the essential European artists of the modern era," says Lynn Robertson, CMA interim director. "As South Carolina's only international art museum, we are thrilled to partner with Bank of America to give our community the chance to see the artist in one of his most personal and experimental genres."

Widely regarded as one of the most important artists of the 20th century, Henri Matisse influenced a diverse number of art movements, artists, and schools of thought. Over the course of his 60-year career, the daringly modern artist experimented with a variety of mediums, producing paintings, drawings, prints, and sculpture, as well as costume and stage set designs.

Matisse became increasingly interested in printmaking and illustrating in the 1930s Artists' books, conceived as art objects in their own right, provided him personal and creative renewal. He brought to life some of the greatest works of French literaturemedieval chivalric poems, 19th-century symbolist works, and 20th-century riffs on ancient myths-with playfully looping gestures, elegant lines, and brightly colored shapes in a way that is always distinctly his own. Over the course of his life, Matisse created 12 illustrated books, 11 of which were widely reproduced and one of which was made exclusively for his family. The Bank of America Collection is fortunate to have four of Matisse's important artist's

books, and these original works are featured in this exhibition:

—Poésies de Stéphane Mallarmé (The Poetry of Stéphane Mallarmé), 1932 *—Pasiphaé—Chant de Minos* (Les Crétois)

(Pasiphaé—Song of Minos [The Cretans]), 1944 -Jazz, 1947

-Poèmes de Charles d'Orléans (Poems of Charles d'Orléans), 1950

Matisse's first illustrated book, Poésies de Stéphane Mallarmé (The Poetry of Stéphane Mallarmé), includes images created to accompany the works of the French poet, a key figure among the symbolist writers. The illustrations in *Poésies* are characterized by the use of simple, delicate lines, making them some of Matisse's most elegant works of art.

Pasiphaé—Chant de Minos (Les Crétois) (Pasiphaé—Song of Minos [The Cretans]) retells the story of Pasiphaé, wife of King Minos, and the Minotaur. For these illustrations, Matisse used linoleum engraving to create white lines on a solid black background, suggesting ancient Greek vase paintings.

Jazz is considered one of the great illustrated books of the 20th century; Matisse created both the text and illustrations. Based largely on imagery from the circus and music halls, the vividly colored illustrations derived from Matisse's cutouts. Although he had devised the art form years earlier, it wasn't until the 1940s that Matisse focused on cutouts. He perfected the technique in the final years of his long career when, confined to a wheelchair and suffering from illness, he found it difficult to paint. In delightful calligraphy, Matisse expressed his thoughts on the creative process and the inspiration of music.

Published four years before his death, Poèmes de Charles d'Orléans (Poems of Charles d'Orléans) features Matisse's fanciful, curvilinear designs and handwritten transcriptions of the ballads and verses of the late-medieval French poet Charles d'Orleans. Matisse copied poems using colored crayons with a spontaneity and freedom reminiscent of the way he used scissors in his late cutouts.

To complement Matisse's works, the exhibition incorporates relevant objects from the CMA collection, including ancient Greek vessels, pages from a medieval book of hours, and a 19th-century bronze. Galleries devoted to Jazz and Poèmes de Charles d'Orléans each feature softly played thematic music - French swing music of World War II and Debussy's "Trois Chansons de Charles d'Orléans," respectively-creating an immersive experience celebrating the intersection of the arts.

"In this exhibition, I took Matisse's books as a reason to further explore the fact that modernism was a creative hub-art, literature, dance, and music all interwove themselves playfully," says CMA Curator Catherine Walworth. "It's also important to continued on Page 23

"I take pride in the fact that CCCD offers a space to display some of the best, most forward-thinking examples of craft in North America," says CCCD Executive Director Stephanie Moore. The contemporary art world can often feel exclusive, making it difficult for emerging artists and arts administrators to challenge longstanding practices. By offering Benchspace Gallery & Workshop to curators like Matters Unsettled, Gonzalez explains CCCD is "actively making space for artists and curators from all backgrounds in an effort to change the art world's rigid landscape."

Gonzalez is a Dominican American artist and curator who holds a MA from Parsons and a BFA from the University of the Arts. Gardiner is an indigenous artist and curator who holds an MFA from Ryerson University and a Honors BA from NYU's Gallatin School of Individualized Study. Together, Gonzalez and Gardiner seek to create exhibitions that serve as forums for cultural research and experimentation.

"From ceramic sculptures made from clothes left at the US-Mexican border to trading cards that position indigenous women as superheroes, Crafted Strangers is a timely exhibition that brings an array of stories that challenge mainstream representations of immigrant and indigenous people," explains the curators, Gonzalez and Gardiner.

The seventeen artists selected offer a diverse array of cultural perspectives and studio practices, though many are reinventing traditional craft practices on their own terms. For example, the exhibition opens with a life-size mobile by the Dominican American artist Joiri Minaya, featuring images drawn from the Google search: "Dominican Women". Visitors will be able to walk among the swirling, cropped, and floating larger-than-life cut-outs and reflect on the creation and destabilization of social stereotypes in this graphic and colorful installation.

huddled in a recessed doorway and painted one of my favorite works - a pasture and mountains partly obscured by a stormy sky. This moody, atmospheric painting suddenly opened my eyes to the unique beauty of North Carolina - quite different from Florida or the West - of fog rolling in and out, luminous sunsets, storms approaching, misty distant mountains, and huge banks of fat white clouds."

The transition to moody, atmospheric landscapes was not easy. "Atmospheric paintings require close values of dark and light and colorful grays; 'happy paintings' use strong contrasts of dark and light and bright color to capture the feel of sunny days," explained Pendergrass.

"I first tried various changes in paints by including one or more muted or unsaturated colors to mix the colorful gravs of the atmospheric landscape. I then began to appreciate the need for careful control of values."

To control values, Pendergrass undertook monochrome underpaintings in burnt sienna as a base for the color painting. "I had instruction in how to do this early on. but did not understand why anyone would. It seemed a lot of preparation to get to the 'real' painting. I finally realized that it is easier to get values right without color, which saves time in correcting later on," says Pendergrass.

In addition to an opportunity to check composition before painting in color, she found that the underpainting cues proper color mixes - she holds a loaded brush of the color mix next to a value in the underpainting to match it.

"At this point, it is a pleasure to do the underpaintings, and I find them beautiful in themselves," Pendergrass enthuses. "The underpaintings alone have an atmospheric look- I sometimes hesitate to go on with color."

Pendergrass has had a lifelong love of color and design but took up painting as a second career. As a child, her art education consisted of many hours perusing her parents' book, World-Famous Paintings edited by Rockwell Kent. When she later committed to a career in art, she studied with nationally known painters Scott Christensen, CW Mundy, Greg Kreutz and Kenn Backhaus. Formal art education included courses at Old Lyme Art Academy in CT, as well as Crealde Art School and Seminole Community College, both in Orlando, FL.

Pendergrass' paintings have been selected for many regional and national art competitions, where she has received a number of awards for excellence.

it but re-defining it into works both more visually poetic and intimate in tone. The 1960s were a tumultuous time on many fronts: The women's liberation movement was emerging and spawned consciousnessraising groups, while gay and lesbian groups struggled for recognition and acceptance; and Fishman became an activist. It was at this point that she began to approach male-gendered forms of painting as a feminist and lesbian. The indignation that Fishman and others in her woman's group felt found full expression in a series of 30 "Angry Paintings," each a kind of "portrait" of friends who were artists, writers, and spokeswomen for the feminist cause.

Born in Philadelphia in 1939, Fishman was raised in a conservative Jewish family. Both her mother and paternal aunt were practicing artists who had studied at the Barnes Foundation school. After receiving her BFA degree from the Tyler School of Art at Temple University and MFA from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Fishman moved to New York City.

In 1990, a fire at her NYC studio destroyed her tools, equipment and a number of paintings. She moved upstate and, in 1997, began introducing calligraphic marks into her work, derived from Hebrew, Japanese, and Chinese writing. But as Nancy Princenthal, in one of the exhibition

catalogue essays points out, abstraction itself operates like a language that is at once structural, metaphoric, and literal.

Thor Bueno explores the chameleon-like ability of glass to assume any texture, color, or transparency that ranges from decorative. functional and architectural installations.

"I grew up surfing in Southern California," Thor Bueno said. "In many ways, glassblowing and surfing are similar. They are both an art that depends on reacting to a material that can be dangerous and has a great potential to get out of control."

The monochromatic, graceful, folded clay sculptures by Jeannine Marchand explore a sensual language in the lights and shadows of malleable white clay. Marchand is from Puerto Rico and is now based in Spruce Pine, NC.

"The concepts I develop are a formal response to my estimation of the moment,"



Works by Thor & Jennifer Bueno Marchand said. "Interpretation is based on the viewer's previous experiences. The products are monochromatic sculptures that are refined to achieve a smooth surface that is sensitive to illumination."

Pablo Soto fell in love with glass at age five watching Lino Tagliapietra work, and now as a glass artist himself he reacts to purity of form and materials. "As a maker, I react to purity of form and material," Soto said. "Recently, I have begun to reconnect with my roots as a functional craftsman. You are just as likely to find me building a steel and wood door as you are to find me blowing glass forms for

time he was ten or eleven. In 1962, he won first place in the North Carolina Artists *Exhibition*, an annual juried show for state residents sponsored by the North Carolina Museum of Art, while he was still a student at Broughton High School. The runners-up were art professors with established careers and decades of experience. A local art critic dismissed the teenager's win at the time as merely a lucky "fluke."

Many years after Jackson had won his first award at age seventeen - and long after his reputation had achieved national status he finally received a retraction and apology from the critic who had downplayed his early win. "You were no fluke," the former critic admitted.

In 1999, Jackson received the North Carolina Award, the highest civilian honor in the state. In 2015, he was given the North Caroliniana Society Award for extraordinary contributions to the state's cultural

heritage. Jackson's work is now in more than 80 collections, including the Baltimore Museum of Art; the British Museum; the Brooklyn Museum: Chicago Art Institute: Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; Philadelphia Museum of Art; Victoria and Albert Museum, London; and the Whitney Museum of Art, NYC. A Door is not a Window is his first museum show in his hometown in many years.

The title of the exhibition comes from an explanation Jackson once offered about his work. "The history of narrative painting," he said, "is based on representing a reality as if were viewed through a window, whereas I am interested in presenting a new entity that one enters, as if by a door."

Beginning Oct. 28, 2017, the North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh, NC, presents Inspiring Beauty: 50 Years of Ebony Fashion Fair, which tells the remarkable story of an extraordinary fashion show. The exhibition explores the 50-year history of the Ebony Fashion Fair (1958-2009), an unparalleled charity fashion show event that redefined the concepts of beauty, fashion, and empowerment for African Americans. It features 40 stunning ensembles by designers such as Stephen Burrows, Pierre Cardin, Christian Dior, Givenchy, Patrick Kelly, Christian Lacroix, Yves Saint Laurent, Bob Mackie, Alexander McQueen, b. Michael, Missoni, Jean Patou, and Vivienne Westwood. The exhibition also includes archival photographs and memorabilia from Ebony magazine and Ebony Fashion Fair. Inspiring Beauty runs through Jan. 21, 2018.

"Fashion is occasionally dismissed as something frivolous or unimportant - when in reality, it can be anything but," says Jennifer Dasal, associate curator of contemporary art. "This was certainly the case with the Ebony Fashion Fair, which had a huge influence by not only promoting glamour to a wide and diverse audience, but also by empowering and celebrating a community that typically was overlooked by the fashion industry. The Ebony Fashion Fair made a real difference.'

A spectacle of glamour and performance the traveling Ebony Fashion Fair grew out of the pages of Ebony magazine (first published in 1945). It was founded by Eunice Johnson, who owned Johnson Publishing Company - distributor of Ebony - with her husband, John Johnson. Far more than just a display of fabulous clothes, the show challenged conventions of beauty; made high fashion accessible to a broader audience; and, as a philanthropic event, contributed millions of dollars to charities focused on education, health care, and civil rights.

Programming surrounding the exhibition includes lectures, films, workshops, and gallery tours for all ages. An opening night fashion show kicks things off, with Vogue editor and Durham native André Leon Talley as a special guest.

"I knew Mrs. Johnson well and worked with her for one year, making her annual trips to Europe and New York," says Talley,

who will attend the exhibition's opening night fashion show and also host a lecture on his time with the Ebony Fashion Fair. "It was a unique moment to capture how her visionary belief in aspirational fashion could enhance the black communities and raise funds for local charities. In their ubiquitous nature, the paintings present an anti-place: scenes that refer not to a specific place, but to uncannily similar tableaus that unfold everyday in communities across America. While Trujillo models his paintings after specific locations, usually in the Los Angeles area, his scenes appear strikingly similar to viewers' own relationships with local commerce. On view simultaneously with Marc Trujillo's exhibition features sublime watercolors of mountain peaks also explore familiar scenes. In this case, her works evoke picturesque representations of snow-capped mountains from the Italian Alps. De Eccher's watercolors offer a subversion of our current age in which images are vastly and readily shared online, especially those that are high-resolution and digitally retouched. In a way, they correlate with Trujillo's paintings: though titled, her pictures are cropped as to present anonymous mountains that could exist on almost any continent. Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, Features Works by **Rachel Meginnes & Kelly O'Briant**

Although a conversation generally happens between two people, it's certainly possible for artwork sharing the same space to suggest a dialogue. That's the premise of the "Conversation" series of two-person shows at the Penland Gallery. This year's entry is titled Conversation/What Remains, and it features work by artists Rachel Meginnes and Kelly O'Briant. Meginnes works primarily in textiles and O'Briant in ceramics, but neither of them limit their work to traditional materials. The exhibition runs from Oct. 3 through Nov. 19, 2017, with a reception on Oct. 7, from 4:30-6:30pm.

Rachel Meginnes is a former Penland resident artist who creates striking and soulful artwork from found textiles combined with various materials and processes. The pieces in this exhibition all began as vintage quilts—some were made from the quilt top while many were created from the compressed and stitched batting that's inside the quilt. Meginnes works on these surfaces with paint, gold leaf, image transfers, stitching, sanding, and other materials and techniques to make pieces that suggest abstract paintings but retain traces of the patterning, colors, and wear patterns of the original quilt. She transforms these old, discarded textiles into compelling objects that evoke memory, loss, and the

Although Kelly O'Briant's work is rooted in her experience as a maker of functional pottery, she has been creating complex forms and installations that incorporate references to functional objects. Central to this show is her piece All the Good Things, in which dozens of gold-lustered porcelain bowls containing porcelain seed forms sit on porcelain objects that resemble concrete blocks. O'Briant says that the seeds represent her migratory life and the generosity of the people she has encountered along the way. Another series traps familiar pottery forms in blocks of resin while a third is a group of small porcelain houses marked with

pressed outlines of household utensils. Like Meginnes's wall pieces, these objects display their own history. The work of these two artists will fill the Penland Gallery's main exhibition space, and the hope is that a lively conversation will ensue.

Also on display, in the Focus Gallery, will be a group of sleek utilitarian objects made from steel by Marc Maiorana. Outside the building is a stone sculpture by Carl Peverall, a monumental steel sculpture by Hoss Haley, and a recently created installation made of manipulated natural materials by Susan Goethel Campbell.

The Visitors Center Gallery has an ongoing display of work related to Penland's history. The Penland Gallery also has work for sale by several hundred artists affiliated with Penland School of Crafts.

The Penland Gallery and Visitors Center is located at Penland School of Crafts on Conley Ridge Road, just off Penland Road in Mitchell County (near the town of Spruce Pine). It is the first building on your right as you enter the Penland campus.
