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"For someone to pause in front of a painting instead of just walking on by is what I strive for in my work," said Diemand. Clemson University in Clemson, SC, will present *Upstate 8: SC Fellowship Women Exhibit*, which celebrates the artwork of eight award winning women is being presented at the Lee Gallery at the Clemson University Center for Visual Arts, from Oct. 2 through Nov. 8, 2917.
