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my work for the river's continuing health and vitality."

The shared purpose of participating artists is bringing engagement with the river through their work. Most complete their work en plein air, remaining at riverside locations while painting and avoiding the use of photographs. Attendees in 2014 and 2015 appreciated not only the spirit of the event but the years' collections of newly created artwork, which boasted a variety of approach and technique. There were sumptuous botanical renderings of local flora and moody renderings of abandoned riverside buildings in walnut ink brewed by the artists.

At this year's event there will be a large map indicating the locations where the artists painted their works of art along the river's 218-mile run that straddles North Carolina and Tennessee.

This year's gala event once again features

Paul McCartney and Steve Martin. Whole Foods is providing food, while Oscar Blues Brewery is donating beer.

Zealandia, the gala's venue, was built by Philip Henry in 1889 and is on the National Register of Historic Places. It boasts a grand staircase and oak woodwork, with ample room for paintings by this year's 23 artists spread over two stories. The current owner, Zealandia Holding Company, has graciously offered the use of the house for the event.

"I take pride in the fact that CCCD offers a space to display some of the best, most forward-thinking examples of craft in North America," says CCCD Executive Director Stephanie Moore. The contemporary art world can often feel exclusive, making it difficult for emerging artists and arts administrators to challenge longstanding practices. By offering Benchspace Gallery & Workshop to curators like Matters Unsettled, Gonzalez explains CCCD is "actively making space for artists and curators from all backgrounds in an effort to change the art world's rigid landscape."

Gonzalez is a Dominican American artist and curator who holds a MA from Parsons and a BFA from the University of the Arts. Gardiner is an indigenous artist and curator who holds an MFA from Ryerson University and a Honors BA from NYU's Gallatin School of Individualized Study. Together, Gonzalez and Gardiner seek to create exhibitions that serve as forums for cultural research and experimentation. "From ceramic sculptures made from clothes left at the US-Mexican border to trading cards that position indigenous women as superheroes, Crafted Strangers is a timely exhibition that brings an array of stories that challenge mainstream representations of immigrant and indigenous people," explains the curators, Gonzalez and Gardiner. The seventeen artists selected offer a diverse array of cultural perspectives and studio practices, though many are reinventing traditional craft practices on their own terms. For example, the exhibition opens with a life-size mobile by the Dominican American artist Joiri Minaya, featuring images drawn from the Google search: "Dominican Women". Visitors will be able to walk among the swirling, cropped, and floating larger-than-life cut-outs and reflect on the creation and destabilization of social stereotypes in this graphic and colorful installation.
