Few museums can claim such rich holdings. South African beadwork is an art of vibrant colors, sophisticated patterns, and varied textures. The works on view derive from three principal population groups in the area: the Mfengu, the Zulu, and the Ndebele. Of particular note are rare examples of nineteenth-century beadwork, probably collected by European Christian missionaries.
