taking walks through the woods or along the river," says Grenell. "The challenge for me then is to combine these influences with my handwork. I use hand stitching, embroidery, fabric dyeing, and doll-making techniques to create objects with a life of their own."

Grenell's work will be showcased alongside the work of Mica artists, present-

ing beautiful objects in functional pottery, sculpture, glass, textiles, paintings, prints, furniture, and jewelry.


## Asheville Gallery of Art Features Works by Judy Rentner

Asheville Gallery of Art in Asheville, NC, will present *In Vivid Color!*, featuring works of Judy Rentner, on view from Oct. 1 - 31, 2019. A reception will be held on Oct. 4, from 5-8pm.

Rentner says her painting journey really blossomed twenty years ago, when she and her husband retired to Western North Carolina. "Although we had lived in nine states, none inspired me as much as this one. Surrounded on every side by so much visual beauty, I was compelled to capture it on canvas. Of all the seasons, fall is my favorite; the cooler crisp air, the brilliant colors, and the sense of change. The past recedes and the future beckons."

The attention Rentner gives to her work is evident when she shares her creative process. "Each painting begins with a vision in mind, but it evolves as I go, pushing back areas with dark values, and highlighting other areas with impasto lights. I emphasize pure and vivid colors to achieve a luminance that in nature is not apparent. By placing shapes, colors and values, I try to achieve a composition that is pleasing to the eye, yet dynamic."

Rentner has been painting for 40 years and has been with the Asheville Gallery of Art for 17 years, where she enjoys the fellowship and inspiration of the 30 other artists. She holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Ohio University, and has taught art in

the California school system. "An artist's journey is never a straight line. There are periods of time where the creative spirit lies dormant, and then there are times when there is a leap of insight and understanding, a new way of looking at things."

## American Folk Art in Asheville, NC, Offers Pottery with Handles

American Folk Art in Asheville, NC, will present *To Have & Hold*, an exhibit honoring the form & function of the handle in pottery, on view from Oct. 3 - 17, 2019. A reception will be held on Oct. 4, from 5-8pm.

Recently, a beautiful piece of writing came to our attention, and has sparked an idea for our October show at American Folk Art. The 19th century German philosopher Georg Simmel wrote an essay titled *The Handle*, in which he wrote: a pottery vessel is "unlike a painting or statue, is not intended to be insulated and untouchable but is meant to fulfill a purpose-if only symbolically. For it is held in the hand and drawn into the movement of practical life. Thus the vessel stands in two worlds at one and the same time."

American Folk Art specializes in regional pottery by potters who intend for their wares to be used, and in many cases used in many ways. The pitcher, for

example, can hold tea or flowers; a robust-handled baking dish can hold keys or fruit. Pottery is not just for the table or only for special occasion use, it is a useful tool and an upgrade to daily life. The handle is your invitation to use, to add beauty to the everyday, and is an integral part of the usability of an object. Each potter finds lovely ways to add signature shape, form, or flourish that enhances the look and shows something personal about that potter.
