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through his imagery, quiet and contemplative. "I paint churches on weekdays, because I can work without being disturbed", says Mr. Douglas of his choice of subject matter.

Painting came about as another course of study for Douglas who has always been keen to mature in cultural pursuits. He began early in life sketching and experimenting with acrylic paint, even daring to associate with graffiti artists on occasion. After completing an associate's degree in Arts from Northeastern Technical College, he worked in his family's antique business and as a rural mail carrier. As the years passed, his study of art began to find practical application.

Douglas's first professional paintings were begun in 2013 and consisted of floral still lifes and miniature paintings in acrylics. By 2015 he had developed his technique enough to pursue American impressionism in oil and watercolor. This is the style to which his work still generally conforms, with infrequent forays into personal experimentation in abstract expressionism and absurdity. Douglas has exhibited in several local art shows and festivals in Chesterfield County, but his

primary audience is his online following.



## **Burroughs-Chapin Art Museum** in Myrtle Beach, SC, Offers Works by Betsy Havens & James Calk

Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, is presenting two exhibitions by two Georgetown, SC-based artists, including: Congregate, featuring works by Betsy Havens and Rhythm & Hues, featuring works by James Calk, both on view through Dec.

Two basic human needs have been universally expressed throughout human history: the need for connection and the need for expression. Two Georgetownbased artists offer their interpretations of these aspects of humanity in a pair of exhibitions. Betsy Havens' exhibit explores people's need to gather in a variety of settings from cafes to street markets and in large congregations of faith, through a series of figurative paintings. James Calk's exhibit offers abstract landscapes of brilliant colors in oils that offer a visual representation of the rhythms and tonalities of musical compositions.

Havens and Calk, who are married to each other, live and paint in Georgetown; both artists work in oils. Havens' exhibition includes 39 works plus 35 8" x 8" paintings from her Homo Sapiens series;

Havens grew up in Savannah, where at age 12 she began her study and love of art at the Telfair Museum of Art. Educated at the University of Georgia and the University of South Carolina, she earned a Bachelor of Arts in Design and did postgraduate work in the History of Architecture and Southern Literature.
