## Coastal Discovery Museum on Hilton Head Island, SC, Offers Exhibition Focused on Santa Elena, a Spanish Colony Founded on Parris Island in 1566

The Coastal Discovery Museum on Hilton Head Island, SC, and the Santa Elena Foundation have joined together to tell the story of America's first century. The Coastal Discovery Museum will host this new 1,000 square foot traveling exhibit, on view through Dec. 7, 2020.

In the 16th century, Spain claimed the New World, today known as North America, and named it La Florida. The Spanish founded Santa Elena on Parris Island in 1566 and it became the first capital of La Florida and the first successful European settlement on the Southeast coast. This city flourished for twenty years and was then abandoned and lost to history.

Slowly, over the past 150 years, archaeologists have discovered parts of this settlement and have pieced together its fascinating story. Ongoing research has revealed new fragments that include the stories of the Native American people who lived here for millennia; the enslaved Africans who first arrived in South Carolina in 1526, and the French, Spanish, and English explorers and settlers who fought fiercely over this land we now call home. The Coastal Discovery Museum inspires people to care for the Lowcountry. With the Coastal Discovery Museum you may explore our beautiful yet fragile environment; learn about the region's history, culture and art; and discover what makes the 68-acre Historic Honey Horn property so special. Most importantly, leave with the knowledge that you can make a difference by actively caring for our environment and heritage. Start your museum visit at the Discovery House to pick up a map of the property and information on our exhibits, walks, talks, tours, and more. Everyone is welcome. There is no admission charge, but voluntary donations are accepted. Our trail system which begins behind the museum, takes

As you walk across this historic landscape, enjoy the magnificent live oaks and ancient cedars, take in the view from the boardwalk, see the Marsh Tacky horses grazing in the wideopen fields, and envision what the island was like before it was developed. Celebrating five years in operation, the Santa Elena History Center sincerely thanks the dedicated volunteers, generous supporters, numerous partners, and especially Beaufort County, for launching efforts to claim Santa Elena as America's First Capital. Now, the Santa Elena Foundation will move on to an exciting new chapter as a part of the Coastal Discovery Museum, a Smithsonian affiliate organization. 
