## Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, Offers Exhibition With Three Artists

The Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, will present an exhibition by a trio of outstanding artists, Chotsani Elaine Dean, Craig Crawford and Antonio Modesto Milian, on view from Oct. 22 through Jan. 8, 2021.



Work by Chotsani Elaine Dean

Chotsani Elaine Dean a ceramicist former of Anderson College in the upstate of South Carolina and now an Assistant Professor of Ceramics at the University of Minnesota. Dean notes: "The many, complex layered realities of the history and visual archives of my communal ancestry form and impart creative purpose in my studio practice and research. Foremost in my research are quilts from Slavery (chattel enslavement) thru Antebellum periods, made on and off of cotton plantations by enslaved and free blacks, through mid-20th century. The visual and historical synthesis of various craft traditions, historical events and commodities; quilts, the cotton trade, Civil Rights Movement and the vast realm of textiles, inform and shape my visual ideas and approach to ceramics.'



Work by Craig Crawford

Craig Crawford is a painter who earned a bachelor of fine arts degree from the University of South Carolina. After graduation, he moved to Washington, DC, where he apprenticed with conservator Charles Olin, former head of Painting Conservation at the Smithsonian Museum and the National Portrait Gallery. Crawford became an associate conservator, specializing in American landscape and French Barbizon works. Crawford later returned to South Carolina and opened his own conservation practice.

Moody and evocative, Crawford's psychologically charged paintings explore his deep-rooted emotional response to his surroundings in rural South Carolina. Crawford notes: "Interpreting the landcape that I am familiar with through th use of multiple techniques, composition, and a great appreciation for 19th century American landscape painting is what interests me. In 18th and 19th century American landscape painting artists conveyed a sense of mystery and intimacy that comes from the interplay between realism and personal emotional history. I enjoy painting the Lowcountry landscape and swamps along rivers since I grew up in Aiken, SC."

Anthony Modesto Milian is a New York City transplant living in Greenville, SC. His photography is the vehicle by which he portrays the human experience and individual stories. He first got his introduction to artistic storytelling by creating the street photography blog "Faces of the Upstate". After the untimely passing of his brother Milian began focusing on telling his own story as an Afrolatinx. He is an inaugural fellow at the Greenville Center for Creative Arts, has served on the creative team of TedX Greenville, and completed "Seeing through photographs", a program sponsored by P.S.1 MoMa.

Milian notes: "That he hopes his work will have a larger impact than he alone can have, and open up a larger dialogue than me just talking. When people see my work something else happens. They're more engaged in asking what experience informs that work, which opens up a dialogue about Black Lives Matter, police brutality, community policing, and things like that."


