Later in the month you can make a trip to Seagrove, NC, the center of pottery in the Carolinas, to attend the 4th Annual Celebration of Seagrove Potters. This three-day celebration begins with a Gala and auction of collaborative pieces (works made by two different potters who don't usually work together) on Friday, Nov. 18, from 6-9, also including a catered reception and live music.

These collaborative pieces are rare works of art and are highly sought after by pottery collectors.

The Celebration then opens on Saturday, Nov. 19, 2011, from 9am-6pm, and a second, silent auction will take place on Saturday from 1-3pm. The event continues on Sunday, Nov. 20, 2011, from 10am-4pm.

Of course all this takes place at historic Luck's Cannery, located at 798 NC Hwy. 705 (the Pottery Highway) in Seagrove, NC.

The Celebration brings together over 100 Seagrove potters, from 62 shops in the three counties known for Seagrove pottery.


