

Ackland Art Museum, UNC - Chapel Hill, Columbia & Franklin Streets, Chapel Hill. Through Dec. 10 - "Court and Capital: Art from Asia's Greatest Cities". This exhibition is part of the elegant re-installation of the Ackland's Asian galleries. Following "Flora and Fauna," which featured exquisite depictions of plants and animals, "Court and Capital" explores the grand customs and fashions of Asian capitals during their transformation to modern megacities. Through Jan. 7, 2018 - "South African Beadwork: Recent Acquisitions rom the Collection of Norma Canelas Hoth and William Roth". The Ackland recently acquiredby gift and purchase from the distinguished collection of Norma Canelas Roth and William Roth of Winter Haven. Florida-29 fine pieces of nineteenth- and twentieth-century beadwork by peoples of the South East Cape region of what is now South Africa. Few museums can claim such rich holdings. South African beadwork is an art of vibrant colors, sophisticated patterns, and varied textures. The works on view derive from three principal population groups in the area: the Mfengu, the Zulu, and the Ndebele. Of particular note are rare examples of nineteenth-century beadwork, probably collected by European Christian missionaries. Through Jan. 7, 2018 - "Flash of Light, Fog of War: Japanese Military Prints, 1894-1905". The exhibit examines how Japanese printmakers, in response to First Sino-Japanese War and the Russo-Japanese War, created dynamic compositions - soldiers silhouetted against fiery pyrotechnic explosions, beams of bright white electrical light illuminating the hulls of steel warships, and the haze of spent gunpowder obscuring the brutal combat of the battlefield - that were part reportage and part dazzling artistic display. Through Aug. 31, 2018 "Patrick Dougherty: Stickwork". The Ackland Art Museum has commissioned its first major

site-specific, outdoor art installation in nearly 20 years: a "stickwork" by Chapel Hill-based artist Patrick Dougherty. As yet untitled, the large-scale work will be made entirely of tree saplings. Construction of the piece will begin on Oct. 9, 2017, and continue through Oct. 27, 2017. The Collection Galleries, Through May 18, 2018 - "The Collection Galleries". In this beautifully designed installation, the Ackland presents a powerful and stimulating selection of over 260 works from its extensive permanent collection.
