Realizing nursing was not for her, she transferred to UNC-Chapel Hill, and later received a Bachelor's of Arts degree in Radio, TV and Motion Pictures (now called Communications) with a minor in Journalism.

Immediately upon graduation McCoy moved to Washington, DC, where she briefly attended Howard University's Law School; however in the cosmopolitan D.C. area she found herself more drawn to the arts; theatre, music, dance and poetry. This led to her migration to Los Angeles; and after years of working in advertising, real estate, and education, she obtained her Masters degree in Marriage & Family Therapy and embarked on a career in counseling. Back in North Carolina, she combined education and clinical practice, teaching Psychology and working as a counselor at Stanly Community College for more than 15 years; and working on the Behavioral Health Unit of Stanly Regional Medical Center for more than four years. Also during that time, she got back to poetry, piano and paint - all interests discovered earlier in life, and now full-time pursuits.
