This exhibition of contemporary American artist Lesley Dill focuses on her most recent large-scale theatrical work, including sculpture, installations, photographs and a video of the artist. About Face is a group of artists that share a figural model in the Museum's studios. This group, representing a wide range of ages and abilities, offers a supportive and friendly atmosphere in which to hone artistic skills. Mamie and William Andrew Treadway, Jr., Gallery 15, Through Jan. 2 - " Taylor Made: The

Art of Anna Heyward Taylor". Principally drawn from the collection of the Columbia Museum of Art, "Taylor Made" explores the process by which Anna Heyward Taylor designed and executed her prints. The exhibition includes watercolors, preliminary sketches and drawings, final prints and the blocks used in their creation. The exhibition was organized by the Columbia Museum of Art in conjunction with the forthcoming publication of the book, "The Selected Letters of Anna Heyward Taylor: South Carolina Artist and World Traveler," by the University of South Carolina Press. The book and Gallery 15 exhibition commemorate the 60th anniversary of Taylor's retrospective exhibition at the Columbia Museum of Art in 1950. BB&T Focus Gallery, Ongoing - "Southern Traditions," will showcase the richness and diversity of the Museum's collection of furniture, ceramics, silver, basketry, sculpture and paintings by artists native to, or active in, South Carolina and its surrounding states. Among the works on view will be fine silver made by Charleston and Columbia silversmiths; a sweet grass basket by Mary Jackson (SC, born 1945); wood carvings by Edgar Alexander McKillop (NC, 1879-1950); and paintings by Charles Fraser (SC, 1782-1860), Xanthus Russell Smith (SC, 1839-1929), William Harrison Scarborough (SC, 1812-1871), William Aiken Walker (SC, 1838-1921), among others. Ray Taylor Fair Gallery, Ongoing - Featuring a new and permanent installation of its ancient art collection. The installation includes approximately 50 objects that introduce the major ancient civilizations from the Mediterranean and Near East. Examples of the earliest form of writing from 12th century B.C. Mesopotamia, are shown next to Egyptian scarabs and Greek painted vessels. The world of the ancient Romans is represented by 2nd century glass and bronze items and portrait sculpture. Many of these works have not been seen since the Museum moved to its location on Main Street in 1998. The collection has grown over the last several years with the donation of 12 fine Roman sculptures in 2002 from Pennsylvania collector Dr. Robert Y. Turner. He is best known for his "Confrontation" series of the 1960s that plumbed the challenges of race in America during those turbulent years of civil unrest. Greenville's prestigious in-depth collection of works by America's Painter, Andrew Wyeth, spans seventy years of the artist's masterful watercolors.
