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He was included in the 2004 Triennial at the South Carolina State Museum and was one of four artists selected for 701 Center for Contemporary Art's inaugural 2008 exhibit.

Peek's paintings are painted from life, direct observation marking either its visual significance alone or one of a deeper meaning. The marks within his art, including possible initial mistakes and other struggles are left visible even as the representational image becomes more clarified. "I enjoy the challenge and the work of depicting life through line and paint, but never finishing it so realistically that the evidence of the process is lost." Rather than paintings of buildings with nature as an inevitable aspect, his work reflects landscapes with structures or other signs of human presence as inevitable aspects.
