#### Arts Council of North Carolina Gets It

On Oct. 6, 2020, I received an e-mail from the Arts Council of North Carolina, sent out to their e-mail list encouraging people to get registered and vote. It simply said: "The deadline to register to vote is October 9. In-person early voting begins Thursday, October 15, and ends Saturday, October 31. Election Day is Tuesday, November 3. Register to vote, find your polling location, and sign up to vote by mail at (https://www.ncsbe.gov/)."

Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, will present Life Within a Garden, an exhibition featuring a collection of original paintings by Marcia Sprecher Mathias, on view in the Guild Gallery, from Nov. 1 - 30,

Mathias was born in Batavia, NY, and grew up in Seminole, FL. She moved to Charleston in the mid 1970's where she worked as a registered nurse and pursued another personal passion in visual art: painting in watercolor, acrylics, and oil.

As a self-taught artist, Mathias' favorite art books are Art and Visual Perception by Rudolf Arnheim and The Art Spirit by Robert Henri. Not only are they both technical, but they also discuss at length the psychology of painting and perception.
