## Burroughs Chapin - Jack Mitchell

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Mitchell took on thousands of special assignments for Dance Magazine, After Dark, Rolling Stone, Time, Newsweek, Life, Vogue, People, Harper's Bazaar and countless others. His photograph of Lennon and Ono, taken weeks before Lennon's death, held the record as the best selling cover for People for over 16 years.

But what sets Mitchell's photographs apart was his ability to reveal his subjects as individuals with identities apart from the work that had made them famous; as described in Arts magazine, "as subjects themselves and not merely artifacts or of secondary importance to their art." In shots both candid and posed, he succeeded in elic-

iting a side of his subjects unknown to their public - even with such intensely private persons as Andy Warhol.

Says poet and critic John Yau, in an essay about the exhibition, "Mitchell's interest in high contrast, costumes, multiple exposures, and the choreographed moment immediately distinguishes his work from that of other well-known photographers... His photographs are sculptural, as they make us aware of volume, as well as different textures."

## **Burroughs Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle** Beach, SC, Offers Works by Philip Mullen

Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, will present the exhibit, Mullen: 2009-2012, on view from Jan. 13 through Apr. 25, 2013. A reception will be held on Jan. 13, from 1-3pm.

Probably the most renowned artist working in the state of South Carolina today, Philip Mullen (b. 1942) is an artist's artist who celebrates the richness of the visual world. His work could be described as a fusion of abstract and figurative styles with a touch of mystery. Created in multiple layers and filled with subtle hints of objects and figures not obvious at first glance, many of his paintings seem to play tricks on the viewers' eyes, drawing them in for a closer look.

Mullen's work has been exhibited in museums from coast to coast, including the Biennial of Contemporary Art, Whitney Museum, New York City, NY; Biennial of Painting and Sculpture, Walker Art Center, Minneapolis, MN; National Drawing Exhibition, San Francisco Museum of Art, San Francisco, CA; and in Columbia, SC, a 35 Year Retrospective at the McKissick Museum and a permanent solo exhibition at the Koger Center for the Arts.

An educator at the University of South Carolina from 1969 - 2000, Mullen was subsequently named Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Art. His work can be found in numerous museum collections, including the Brooklyn Museum in New York, the Denver Art Museum in Colorado, the Mint Museum in Charlotte, North Carolina, the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, DC, and the Sonje Museum of Contemporary Art in South Korea.

The artist's early work, from the 1960s and early 1970s, was primarily figurative but later evolved into more abstract styles, as he explored the world of color field painting. By the end of the century, Mullen returned to his roots, incorporating figures

into his art once again. This exhibition comprises 45 of these more recent works, all of which are acrylic on canvas save three works on paper.

A recurring theme in Mullen's work is the painting within the painting: the unseen artist in his studio contemplating paintings or perhaps looking out his imagined window to paint from the point of view of looking out from inside. The artist's strategy of doubling the viewpoint serves to underscore and intensify the experience of the world and to make the viewer a direct participant in it. His works offer a reimagining and reworking of visual reality which prevents a viewer from taking them in all at once but rather beguiling him to "work" at appreciating them.
