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while supported his entrepreneurial venture working part time at Stokes Funeral Home.

Bryant built his reputation by taking candid shots of farmers at the tobacco markets during the harvest time in downtown Rocky Mount. He photographed people at the Annual Spring Galapade parade downtown and jazz notables like Ella Fitzgerald, Cozy Cole and Billy Eckstein at the June German. Rocky Mount schools were segregated until 1967 and those schools and African American social clubs were a client base for him. Bryant frequently submitted photographs to the *Rocky Mount [Evening] Telegram*, amongst many, the train wreck which is on exhibit.

This exhibition of selected photographs

about covers Bryant's fifty year career. Many of the people photographed have gone on to a better place but their family names are well known and likely their children now senior citizens themselves and grandchildren will be looking for their mothers, fathers, grandmothers and granddads, great granddads too. This exhibition is not only a tribute to the generations of African Americans who have helped shape Rocky Mount, but to the independent talented man behind the camera who built a career and half century business in our community.

The high realism in Gowans' figures, still lifes and some landscapes is attention grabbing in its detail, while other works are more expressionistic, full of energy and bold, broken brushstrokes. This alternation of both style and subject is what keep his work fresh and always new. The artist continues, "I make an effort never to copy myself," stating that each piece is a learning





Scott and Zelda Fitzgerald, along with reproductions of historical photographs from the F. Scott Fitzgerald Papers of Princeton University Library. Sagesse (Sometimes Madness is Wisdom) comes from Zelda herself. This was the title she gave to an exhibition of her work at the Cary Ross Gallery in New York City in 1934.

Zelda's influence on her husband's writing is well known. In a review of her husband's second novel, *The Beautiful and the Damned*, Zelda quipped, "In fact, Mr. Fitzgerald - I believe that is how he spells his name - seems to believe that plagiarism begins at home."

This exhibition is being held in conjunction with The Big Read Greater Wilmington in celebration of The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald. The Big Read is a national program through the National Endowment for the Arts, designed to revitalize the role of literature in American culture and to encourage reading for pleasure and enlightenment.
