or, in some cases permanently. The images of devices such as ladders, stairs and portals serve as a metaphor for a way out of a situation either physically or psychologically."

Penumbra explores these issues in a universal sense, but Fantuzzo also connects the work to her own personal journey, "To be alive is to experience constant and endless change, therefore, I too search for my own means to access and embrace the coming

As an additional component to the project, the artist is collaborating with the Long Table Poets of Charleston, SC, for inclusion of new poetry in the exhibition. Fantuzzo invited the poets to join her in an ekphrasis project. "Description" in Greek, an ekphrastic poem is a vivid description of a scene or, more commonly, a work of art. Through the imaginative act of narrating and reflecting on the "action" of a painting or sculpture, the poet may amplify and expand its meaning. There will be poetry readings at the City Gallery on Jan. 23 at 7pm and Feb. 22 at 2pm, which are free and open to all.

Linda Fantuzzo grew up in Endicott, NY, and studied painting at The Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia, PA. Her work has been featured in numerous

### City of North Charleston, SC, Features Work by Katherine Hester & Jenion Tyson

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to exhibit paintings by Katherine Hester of Pinopolis, SC, and photographs by Jenion Tyson of North Charleston, SC, at the North Charleston City Gallery, on view through Jan. 31, 2020. The concurrent solo exhibitions are free and open to the public.

In her exhibit, Ebb and Flow, Katherine Hester will present a series of mixed media paintings of the ocean; exploring the romantic idea of a day spent at the beach versus the reality of humans' impact on coastal life. Ebb and Flow features a collection of small studies of figures on the shorelines and within ocean landscapes, set amongst large canvases that reflect what remnants are left behind when humans carelessly interact with coastal environments.

A native of the Lowcountry, Hester grew up on her father's wildlife center, where conservation became a lifelong interest. Any proceeds from the sale of her work in this exhibition will be donated to the South Carolina Aquarium's Sea Turtle Care

Hester is currently serving as the City of North Charleston's Artist-in-Residence. She works in oil and mixed media and paints outdoors, onsite when painting landscapes in order to capture the changing light of the Lowcountry. She also enjoys creating portraits, working in mixed media in order to put a modern twist to the classic genre.

A graduate of the College of Charleston, she holds a Master's in Education and worked as a studio art, art history, and science teacher before leaving the classroom in order to pursue her painting career full time. Hester has been represented by galleries in Charleston and exhibited her work throughout the region. She has won numerous awards and participates in the annual Piccolo Spoleto Outdoor Art Exhibition each spring.

Begun as an exploratory series prior to the arrival of Hurricane Florence, the photographs featured in Jenion Tyson's



Work by Katherine Hester exhibition, A Bug's Eye View: Macro Photography in the Garden, depict small, often overlooked, flowering plants common to South Carolina yards. Tyson enlarges the view of these plants to new, nearly unrecognizable perspectives showcasing a fascinating, underappreciated plant life that the viewer may come to realize can be found in their own backyard. Though the plant subjects he chooses to highlight, such as dodder, milkweed, and wild garlic, are often considered weeds by gardeners, in these photographs they are elevated as desirable and beautiful plants in their own right. The exhibit features thirteen macrophotographs displayed alongside smaller corresponding photographs showing recognizable views of the plant subjects, as well as short essays written by the artist about the various plant

Tyson is a nature photographer and certified master gardener. His interest in nature photography began as a means to supplement his gardening articles, but quickly developed into an artistic practice. Early on in his journey as a photographer, he was encouraged by winning a weekly photo contest in the Post and Courier. His photographs have been displayed in group and solo shows and festivals throughout South Carolina, including Artfields, the Coastal Carolina Fair, and the Georgetown Artwalk.

The North Charleston City Gallery is situated in two corridors of the Charleston Area Convention Center, located on Coliseum Drive in North Charleston. The exhibition space is at the northwest corner of the Convention Center adjacent to the Coliseum, facing International Boulevard. Parking and admission are free. It's Hip to be Square is an exhibit that challenged students and SoBA members to create art using a square format. Students from Bluffton High School's National Art Honor Society and Painting classes explored a variety of subjects working in acrylic on gallery wrap canvas. Photography 2 students used photo emulsion lift techniques to display Lowcountry images. May River High School Art 1 students experimented with montage and mixed media to create lively, textured surfaces on canvas.

The students' artwork will hang along with SoBA members' art during the January show. The student pieces are available for purchase for \$75 per piece. Proceeds from the students' art will fund SoBA's Naomi McCracken Scholarship, which benefits students who plan to pursue an art-related degree.
