Artfields® 2015 Sets New Record for **Artist Submissions**

A record number of artists from throughout the Southeast have submitted new work to the ArtFields® 2015 competition taking place in Lake City, SC. By the midnight (extended) deadline on Nov. 21, 2014, 1,061 artists submitted work; that's a 35% increase over previous years. A panel of art professionals will select approximately 400 competition pieces.

Why did the deadline have to be extended? In this year of 2014, many artists are still challenged when it comes to making an online entry, which isn't too different from 20-30 years ago when artists couldn't get decent slides made of their work. Perhaps universities, arts agencies and arts groups should be offering their artists free workshops on how to make online entries and images of their work?

Now that might be a decent use of the taxpayer dollars we all give them - or not. Maybe those artists are being culled from the herd by natural selection.
