Irene Morrah Fine Art in Greenville, SC, Offers Works by William Jameson

Irene Morrah Fine Art in Greenville, SC, will present Natural Wonders, featuring works by William Jameson, on view from Feb. 21 through Mar. 31, 2014.

In 1980, William Jameson was living in Manhattan and working in the art movements of the moment: minimalism and constructivism. For a change of pace, he decided to accompany a landscape painter he knew on a foray to South Carolina. On the spur of the moment, once there, Jameson decided to also go out and paint on location with the artist. These decisions turned out to be life-changing for Jameson, who had grown up in South Carolina.

Once back on his home turf, he came to some important conclusions. "I realized what I had been missing," he says. "I really needed to and wanted to paint the southern landscape. I appreciated this landscape in a new and different way.'

Jameson returned to New York, but a year later he packed up and moved back to his home state. Today he lives about 30 miles east of Asheville, NC, in the small town of Saluda, and for inspiration he frequently visits the nearby Appalachian Mountains.

Jameson works from sketches and photographs as reference material. And he prefers to define his paintings as "explorations" as opposed to labeling one of his works "a scene." His artistic mission is to delve deep,

past the surface magnificence of the individual elements in the landscape to reveal the mystery and power of nature.

'I try to develop a lot of texture in my paintings and convey information through this texture," Jameson says. "People ask me if I run out of things to paint. The truth is I fall further and further behind all the things I want to paint. I can never catch up."

The sweetgrass basket tradition is represented by Mary Jackson, the best known practitioner working in this craft, and by Linda Blake, Marguerite Middleton, and Elizabeth Kinlaw. Artists such as Merton Simpson, Beverly Buchanan, Sheri Moore Change, Maxwell Taylor and Connie Floyd are all South Carolina-connected artists who no longer reside in the state.

"A number of these artists are legendary as arts educators as well. Their influences and contributions extend beyond image and object making," said Green, who sees the show as an opportunity for area residents

to learn more about the contribution African-American artists in South Carolina.

The State Art Collection is considered the most comprehensive public collection of works by contemporary South Carolina artists. Established in 1967 as one of the first programs of the South Carolina Arts Commission, the State Art Collection has grown to include 448 works in a variety of media and styles by 277 South Carolina contemporary artists.

The Jones-Carter Gallery is a state-ofthe-art exhibition gallery owned and operated by the Community Museum Society in Lake City. Located in the heart of the downtown historic district of Lake City, the gallery is convenient to contemporary gift shops, clothiers, antique stores, and several restaurants. The gallery hosts several exhibitions throughout the year featuring exhibits from local to major national artists. The gallery offers group tours, lectures, visiting artist presentations, workshops, activities for families, and community events based on current exhibitions. Rhodes offered the following artist statement: "I am interested in the act of making. Rather than expressing a preconceived idea or conveying a specific message, I find that meaning and purpose within the work comes from employing art making as a way to question. Through process the content is revealed to be dependent on the internal logic of the piece. The resulting composition bears many traces of how it was made. While you can see the effects of underlying colors and patterns showing through the topmost skin of paint, there are also the
