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Fujiwara moved to Charleston at the end of 2010 and became a member at cone 10 studios where she continued to gain practical experience with running the studio, such as mixing glazes, loading and unloading kilns, recycling clay, and setting up exhibits at the cone 10 studios gallery. In 2012, she became a member of Charleston Crafts Cooperative by juried evaluation of her work.

After living in the SC for more than 8 years, she continues to be impressed and inspired by the rich natural history of the Low-country. She has been exploring the creative possibilities of expressing the beauty of nature through clay, working with local trees, native plants, shells, bird nests, which also resonates with her experience as a museum curator. She is fascinated by the beauty and complexity of the living environment both visually and structurally.

This exhibition *Impressed by Nature* emphasizes the richness and beauty of nature in the Carolina Lowcountry, which she enjoys daily and which is quite opposite from the synthetic beauty of the controlled urban landscape of Tokyo. For this exhibition Fujiwara also explored more hand-building techniques to express organic shapes, patterns and colors in oxidation firing.

The Francis Marion Department of Fine Arts presents the *Type Directors Club*, on view through Apr. 2 in the Adele Kassab Gallery located within the Hyman Fine Arts Center.

NC Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, NC, is presenting *The Seen & The Sublime*, featuring paintings by Pegi Barnes-Sharp and Oona Lewis, on view in the Mims Gallery of the College's Dunn Center, through Mar. 29, 2020.

Talented and versatile artists Pegi Barnes-Sharp and Oona Lewis not only share a studio in Wilson, NC, but are sharing this spring exhibition.

Co-founders of ArtVentures, Wilson, friends and art partners for more than twenty years, Barnes-Sharp and Lewis share working space, teaching and manage the commercial gallery business with selected artists and exhibitors. Both paint landscape and North Carolina scenic subjects; both are gifted plein aire painters who work outdoors right at their subject whether France, Italy, the Bahamas or local.
