

The South Carolina State Museum at 301 Gervais Street will offer *Abstract Art in South Carolina: 1949-2012*, and includes abstract works of art from more than 40 South Carolina painters and sculptors over the past 63 years. The exhibit is on view through Aug. 26, 2012. An artist reception will be held on Thursday, Apr. 26, from 6-8pm. Refreshments will be offered.

On Saturday, Apr. 28, the Museum will offer the annual Congaree Art Festival, which will feature over 20 contemporary artists from South Carolina and selling their work on the Museum's front plaza.

Install It: Installation art at Artista Vista, co-sponsored by the University of South Carolina's McKissick Museum, will be offered throughout the Vista. Seven Midlands artists will create installations for Artista Vista. Taking art outside traditional venues has long been a part of Artista Vista and these artworks for the 2012 exhibition will be located outdoors throughout the Vista. Most of the works will be up for four weeks.

The installations were curated by Jeffrey Day, who organized the 2011 *Install It* at *Artista Vista*. Day is a long-time arts writer whose work has been published internationally. He has recently written essays for the Morris Museum of Art in Augusta, GA, and Hampton III Gallery in Greenville, SC.

Khaldoune Bencheikh and Mary How will conceive of and construct, along with community members, a giant sculpture of natural materials based on the "rangoli," a colorful Indian folk floor relief sculpture/decoration. A native of Morocco, Bencheikh has created several community-based projects including a rangoli

at the Tapp's Arts Center and a mosaic wall installation. Bencheikh is a master of fine arts candidate at USC. Mary How is an art therapist and owner of Angelfish Creations.

Eileen Blyth, using materials scavenged from the Vista, especially remnants of its warehouse/industrial past will build a sculpture connected to the railroad that once ran through the center of the area and the Adluh Flour company. She holds degrees from the College of Charleston and USC and has had solo exhibitions throughout the region.

Michaela Pilar Brown will create a large abstract sculptural installation made of both man-made and natural materials. Brown was resident artist at the McColl Arts Center in Charlotte, NC, in 2011, and recently had solo exhibitions at the Harvey Gantt Center for African American Art and Culture in Charlotte and SC State University.

Wendell George Brown's figurative sculptures will address both transportation issues and the African-American history of the Vista. A faculty member at Benedict College his work has been exhibited at the Japan International Quilt Show, the American Folk Art Museum in New York and the Corcoran Art Gallery in Washington DC.

Kara Gunter plans to re-inhabit an alleyway with "ghost trees" sprouting where real trees have been cut down. It will explore how the built and natural environments interact. Gunter holds a master of fine arts degree from USC and has had solo exhibitions at the SC State University and Lander University galleries.

Virginia Scotchie will make an unfired clay work connected to the brick and tile-making industry once located in the Vista. Scotchie, a professor of art at USC, has had her work exhibited in France, the Netherlands, Australia, Taiwan and throughout the United States. She will have a solo exhibition at Hunter College, The City University of New York starting in May
