Wheels are spinning and kilns are firing every day in Seagrove as potters busily prepare for the 4th Annual Celebration of Spring and the 4th Annual North Carolina Pottery Festival.

The Celebration is presented by the Seagrove Area Potters Association on April 21 and 22, 2012, and will have 36 Seagrove area pottery shops participating. Those shops will welcome visitors for studio tours, kiln openings, demonstrations, door prizes, refreshments and more. Some shops will have special guest artists. A couple of shops are offering the chance for visitors to get their hands dirty with hands-on activities.

The NC Pottery Festival was formerly known as the Seagrove Pottery Festival and held at the Greensboro Coliseum in Greensboro, NC, in the past. It gets a name change this year and will relocate to Seagrove Elementary School, 528 Old Plank Road in Seagrove.

The event will be held April 14 and 15, 2012, from 9am - 6pm, both days. Admission is \$5. Over 60 artisans, including potters and other craftspeople will have booths. Demonstrations will be held each day, and food vendors will be on site. The event is hosted by the Museum of NC Traditional Pottery. The North Carolina Pottery Center will have a pottery identification day on April 14, 2012, from noon - 2pm. The NCPC will also have a one-day student clay camp for middle school students on April 7, 2012. The camp is sponsored by the Grassroots Grant, Randolph Arts Guild and the NCPC. This is an invitational event with only 28 other potters from around the world selected to participate. Chawan is a Japanese term that refers to special tea bowls used in a Zen Buddhist tea ceremony. Captain James and Emma Holt White House in Graham, NC, Features Works by Dave Urena and Annual Youth Art

The Alamance County Arts Council in cooperation with Asolare Fine Arts Academy will host an exhibition of works by Dave Urena, through Apr. 21, 2012, on view in the SunTrust Gallery of the Captain James and Emma Holt White House in Graham, NC. Also on view through Apr. 21, 2012, in the Sister Galleries will be the 54th Visual Arts Competition for Young People.

Dave Urena is a language teacher, designer/art director and photographer living in Winston Salem, NC. His approach to photocollage is to assemble photos taken from multiple points of view creating a novel perspective and sense of space that goes beyond simple wide angle perspective.

Urena was bitten by the travel bug early in life. His father's engineering work – and parents' interest in exploring – landed the family along the center cities of the Appalachian/Allegheny area from Tennessee to Pennsylvania; over the Atlantic to Portugal; briefly through the San Francisco Bay area; across the Pacific to the tropical Philippines; and to the inland highlands of southeastern Brazil. Urena returned to the United States- after

graduating from the *Escola Americana de Belo Horizonte* (Brazil) – to study at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (BA, Education) and at the School of Design at North Carolina State University in Raleigh (MA, Visual Design).

While following a satisfying career as a graphic designer and art director, Urena turned his attention to using his life-long travel experiences as subject matter to develop his interest in documentary and artistic photography. He is a member of SEED Gallery in the Winston Salem Arts District and a fellow of the Asolare Fine Arts Foundation, Lexington, NC.

The Visual Arts Competition for Young People was one of the first Arts Council sponsored programs to be initiated upon the founding of the Arts Council 56 years ago. It has continued annually since its inception and this year we celebrate 54 years of honoring Alamance County's student artists.

The exhibition/competition is a juried show for Alamance County students enrolled in grades 7 through 12. The competition consists of two divisions judged separately: Division I, Middle


