Process is the main influence on McKerley's work. He uses a technique called water carving that mimics erosion. He paints paraffin on his dry, unfired pots and then washes the surface with a very wet sponge. The possibilities of this technique helped to create the patterns and lines used in decorating his pots.

McKerley didn't envision a style to seek out but was led to his current body of work by following this technique. Certain lines and shapes are possible in water carving and these are the lines and shapes in his work.

McKerley looks to mass-produced glass, metal and plastic for inspiration just as much as he looks to contemporary and historic pottery. The recent drawings on his work come from diagrams, images of cells and viruses, Mayan glyphs and symbols used in mathematics. McKerley unique and complex surfaces offer a rich visual and tactile experience.

"I have been fortunate to capture an array of birds and yard critters that frequent my wooded property. This was done by being a little creative and using a lot of patience. It's easier once you learn their attitudes and how they react to one another. The right setting, focus, speed and exposure are crucial to capture some of the elusive ones that are so fast."

River of Forgetting is about the search for self-understanding, which is always caught between remembering and forgetting, holding on and letting go, moving forwards and backwards. Mira Gerard Singh paints figures as if they exist in a dream-state, entering the landscape and experiencing moments of presence that seem to erase everything from the past and future. In painting these subjects, that acknowledge a desire to forget, remember, and transcend, she seeks to do the same.

In Greek Mythology, the river Lethe, one of five rivers of the underworld, was known as the river of forgetfulness. It flowed through the cave of Hypnos, god of sleep, where its murmuring would induce drowsiness, and the shades of the dead were required to drink its waters in order to forget their earthly life. Interestingly, the ancient Greek term for truth, Aletheia, (a-"not" + lethe "oblivion, forgetfulness"), literally means "not forgetting" or "un-forgetting." Truth, then, can also be understood as "remembering."

"My paintings of figures in cinematic

landscapes are a way of attempting to address the tangled process of coming into being" said Singh. "The images I work with signify memories and fantasies and are rooted in an idea of being on display, skin exposed, which in turn relates to the skin of the painting. Alongside these impulses exists a wish to disappear, or at least to be defined by the dangerousness of an imagined apocalyptic sublime."

Singh grew up in a secluded Ashram in New Hampshire. Her father, painter Jonas Gerard, encouraged her work from an early age, and as a child she spent a lot of time in his studio painting and drawing. She went on to receive a BFA from Indiana University in Bloomington, IN, and an MFA from the University of Georgia in Athens, GA. She currently lives and works in Johnson City, TN, where she is a painting professor at East Tennessee State University.
