

And, I mean wait until the last minute as they never have details ahead of time.

What's that you say about overlapping events? Well that's a tradition in SC. There's no central calendar of art events so people just keep programing events at the same time. I think some people do it so their local folks who love the arts don't stray too far from home.

This will be ArtFields[©]' third year and I think people should see a lot of improvements. I've heard the level of works submitted have gone up a notch or two, but you'll have to be the judge of that, I thought it was pretty good last year. Of course after you've finished going through this issue of Carolina Arts you can head over to the ArtFields[©]' website at (www.artfieldssc.org) and check out the competitors. Images of accepted works and info about the artists who made the 400 cut was to be posted Apr. 1st. I'll be checking it out - after I do my launch duties of the day.

And then we have ArtFields[©] in Lake

One thing you might notice when you go to that website is that ArtFields[©] has a new slogan. I'm not going to mention the old one, but the new one is: Small Town - Big Money - World Class Southern Art

I like the way that sounds, in fact it sounds like something I've said about ArtFields[©] in the past. You could also add in - Genuine Southern Hospital*ity*. Now if I could just get them to drop the "life-changing" description of their awards, \$50,000 is a lot of money, but it's not exactly life-changing these days. But, believe me - any artist who wins it will be thrilled. I know I would.

Another new addition to the competition for artists is the ten Honorable Mention \$1,000 cash prizes selected by the jury panel from the entire 400 works. These are also non-purchase awards so the artists selected for these awards will keep their works - that's if they didn't get sold during ArtFields©.

That's another factor that hasn't sunken in for artists and visitors to ArtFields[©] - a lot of works are sold during this event. Most of the works are for sale. So if you see something you really like you could take it home with you after the event or even have it sent home to you.

Visitors to ArtFields©

ArtFields© 2015 will also see improvements for visitors too. The new The Inn at the Crossroads, a 57-room boutique hotel, is now open on Main Street in Lake City. The Hotel is less than a block away from the Jones-Carter Gallery and the Green where many events take place. Plus, Main Street is where many of the stores displaying artworks are located.

Lake City is just a few hours away from

most of SC and just 20 minutes off of I-95. For folks who live even further away, now the new Inn will make an extended stay possible - if it's not already booked up during the run of ArtFields[©] 2015.

A couple of new events that got my attention include: Arts + Drafts, a celebration of the art of craft beer with live music by The Whiskey Rebellion out of Virginia, where visitors will be invited to sample several craft brews and browse the art market featuring a diverse selection of artwork from original work to prints; The Art of 'Que, an event showcasing the art of Southern BBQ featuring live music by popular Americana group, The Blue Dogs.

Other events include the Color Me 5K race, the Portrait Contest, tours at Moore Farms Botanical Garden and Competition Artist Talks - there is plenty to do in addition to looking at art. Check out the events being offered at (<u>www.artfieldssc.org</u>).

But, the most important thing that visitors can do while attending ArtFields© is voting for their favorite works on display. Voting by the public not only helps select the People's Choice Awards for two of the awards, but also determines which works the Jury Panel can select the top award from. The people have most of the power in determining the winner of this competition.

Of course the majority of visitors are just lookers, they don't want to get involved,

and it's so hard to register to vote. Wait a minute - I registered to vote, so it can't be that hard. You might have to give a phone number or e-mail address.

You're thinking, "Oh no - not my e-mail address, now I'm going to get tons of junk e-mails." Not a worry - I've never gotten an e-mail from ArtFields[®] that wasn't directly related to a request on my part.

When you register you'll receive a full color catalogue of the competition entries and where they are located, as well as other important info. If you don't register to vote, you still get to look.

Haven't Gone Yet

If you haven't made the trip to Lake City

yet you need to make that trip - especially if you are an artist who keeps wondering what it's all about. Once you see what it's all about you'll enter the next year.

If you're just someone who enjoys the visual arts, this is the biggest, most diverse show you'll ever see in the South. And, if you're that rare person who actually buys works of art - this is like making a trip to the Mall of America and all the stores are art galleries.


I'll tell you how important and interesting this show is. The dates of ArtFields[©] comes at the most inconvenient time for me. It takes place during the week that I have to pull together one of our biggest issues of the year - our May issue. With that in mind I plan on visiting Lake City at least twice. That's going to hurt. That means burning a lot of midnight oil to make my deadlines. I know last year I felt as if I was burning my candle at both ends. So what's your excuse for not going?

The Critic and the Cheerleader

Anyone who follows my commentary on a regular basis knows I've been a critic and a cheerleader for ArtFields[©] from its beginning. I offer my 2 cents worth on what is good and bad because I want the event to get better, grow, and go on for a long time.

Not being an artist, I only see the outside view of ArtFields©, although I do receive feedback from a few artists. And, I'm still hearing a few complaints from artists about the entry process and some who complain that it is too costly to enter in that they have to make at least two trips to Lake City. I'm not really sure those are valid problems or just artists being artists. It's impossible to please everyone in any group. I've never heard a complaint from an artist who won one of the cash awards. But, if you are an artist who has a complaint, you can tell the folks at ArtFields[®] and if you're not comfortable with that you can tell me and I'll pass it on. And, I've never revealed a name in 28 years of doing this.

The management of ArtFields[®] listens, as they want to make the event better also.



Upstate Gallery on Main in Spartanburg, SC, Offers New Exhibits

The Upstate Gallery on Main in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting two new exhibitions including: a site-specific sculptural installation of colored fibers by Jessica Reynolds, on view in the Spotlight Gallery through Apr. 25, 2015, and a selection of works by the late New York artist and designer Beatrice Riese, along with selected prints and photographs by Andy Warhol, on view in the Collections Gallery, through Apr. 25, 2015.

Jessica Reynolds received a BFA in Art from Clemson University in Clemson, SC, and a MFA in Art and Design from Winthrop University in Rock Hill, SC. She is currently a Professor in the Art History Department at USC Upstate.

Beatrice Riese, an abstract artist, was born in The Hague, the Netherlands. In the 1930's she studied art in Paris, where she was first introduced to African art. In 1940, shortly before the Germans invaded France, she escaped with her parents to Africa. From there they sailed to the US, settling in Richmond, VA. Riese took art classes with Clyfford Still at Virginia Commonwealth University. Riese died at the age of 86, in 2014, in New York City.

In 2008 the Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts gifted USC Upstate 152 color Polaroid and black and white photographs. The aim of the Photographic Legacy Program is to provide greater access to Warhol's artwork and process, and to enable a wide range of people from communities across the country to view

and study this important yet relatively unknown body of Warhol's work. The program offers institutions that do not have the means to acquire works by Warhol the opportunity to bring a significant number of photographs into their permanent coltions while allowing those institutions that do have Warhol in their collections to enrich the breadth and depth of their holdings.

Upstate Gallery on Main is dedicated to contemporary and original exhibitions that include selections from the permanent collection by artists Andy Warhol, Jerry Uelsmann and Beatrice Riese.

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Duncan is a painter and printmaker who is a member of West Main Artists Co-op in Spartanburg, and also a member of The Printshop in Greenville, SC. His work has an immense amount of variety. This past year, his diligence and experimentation has left him with a body of work that is quite impactful. This is evident in his upcoming show. The pieces exhibited deal with the search of spirituality from religious ideas and principles, the duality of paralyzing fear and indifferent acceptance of our own personal mortality, and the ludicrous things we do, while alive, to distract our minds from the inevitable.

Duncan is a native of Spartanburg county, who moved away to pursue a career in tattooing and has been back since 2008. Having no formal art education, Duncan declines the notion that he is a "self-taught artist", claiming, "We write our stories in our minds with experience, and without all the people I've crossed paths with throughout the years, I would have unfortunately missed all the marks".



We are here to shine, to let our spirits 'arise and illuminate' as John O'Donohue says. That's what my jewelry is about."

Chris Burnside has always been attracted to stained glass. So in the 1980s when he was dancing and choreographing in NYC he crossed paths with two brothers who were stained glass artists. "It seemed like some kind of nudge from the universe," explains Burnside. In exchange for helping them when he wasn't rehearsing or performing, they trained him in the art of stained glass.

Yellin says, "I have heard, and sometimes believed, what people say about artists...egotistical, self-centered, navel-gazing (don't get me started about the crazy part). 

Winthrop, receiving her MFA in Painting with a minor in Printmaking in 2011. She currently teaches at the University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC.

Rhodes comments about her work, While exploring ideas of gen memory I am reflecting on a sense of nostalgia and yearning. Printmaking is the core of my process. Incorporating prints into my mixed media pieces leads to recurring imagery that becomes my personal iconography. Bees represent matrilineal ties, complexity and fragility- hexagons the underlying structure of the universe. Sky charts and navigational imagery reflect the attempt to quantify the unknowable, while moths are an acknowledgment of mortality. Strings literally tie up disparate parts while found objects reflect chance, and the gestural marks form an emotive counterpoint to the rational stability of the grid. Above all I try to create within the work a sense of searching and questioning, rooted in the belief that asking and exploring the questions of both life and the studio are more rewarding than finding clear cut answers or illustrating ideas."



Historic Cabarrus Association in Concord, NC, Features Works from the Robert F. Phifer Art Collection

Fourteen paintings from the North Carolina Museum of Art that were last on public display during the Nixon administration are going to be on exhibition at the Historic Cabarrus Association's Concord Museum, located in the Historic Courthouse in Concord, NC, through July 14.

The Art Collection of Robert F. Phifer ncludes 19th and early 20th century paintings collected by the Concord native who used his success as a prosperous planter and cotton buyer to fuel his passion for art. In the early 20th century, he had one of the most comprehensive art collections in the world. With his passing, Phifer became the first major benefactor of the North Carolina Museum of Art. The museum acquired more than 230 works of art, including many of its masterpieces, wholly or in part with funds from Phifer's bequest.

The effort to bring the collection to Concord was spearheaded by local Judge Marty McGee who worked with the Historic Cabarrus Association, which operates the Concord Museum, the Cabarrus Arts Council, Cabarrus County and the City of Concord on the project.

The fifth of seven children born to Caleb and Mary Phifer, Robert Phifer grew up continued on Page 23

on North Union Street in a house on the present site of First Presbyterian Church. He entered Davidson College before his 15th birthday, but left before graduation. By the time he was in his early 30s, he had accumulated a substantial fortune and left the business world to move to New York and become an artist and collector. He became an active member of New York's legendary Salmagundi Club, a men's society of artists and art enthusiasts. Over the years he acquired many works by Salmagundi members for his own personal collection. He also traveled and studied art all over the world. He never married and is buried in First Presbyterian Church's Memorial Garden on Spring Street.

The 14 paintings include "Red Snow-Mt. Fuji, Lake Hakone," which Phifer painted during a six-month trip to Japan in which he traveled and painted with local artists

The other 13 paintings include landscapes and portraits:

Ernest Albert, American, 1857-1946, "Autumn Afternoon,"1919, oil on canvas. A distinguished theatrical and scenic designer who became a landscape painter and muralist. He was founder and first president of Allied Artists of America.

Charles Shepard Chapman, American, 1879-1962, "Cornered," circa 1916, oil on board. Chapman was a respected illustrator and a co-founder of the Leonia School of Illustration in New Jersey. It is probable that this painting with its dramatic narrative of a wolf closing in on a young boy was originally created to accompany a published story.

William N. Hasler, American, 1865-1933, "A Summer Afternoon," circa 1926, oil on board. A landscape artist and member of the Salmagundi Club, Hasler worked mostly in oil, but also did etchings, black and white prints and some watercolor.

Carl Hirschberg, American, born in Germany, 1854-1923, "Evening," 1919, oil on board. A late 19th century highly academic painter, he became an early 20th century impressionist and influential member of the Kent (CT) Art Association and the broader Litchfield County group of painters.

Artist Unknown, British, "Robert Sherson," circa 1814, oil on canvas. This portrait may commemorate this man's triumph over scandal. Robert Sherson (ca. 1770-1842) was an administrator in the British East India Company, charged with handling all receipts and disbursements of grain imports at Madras, who was charged with fraud and embezzlement and later exonerated.

Frank von der Lancken, American, 1872-1950, "Landscape," undated, oil on canvas. A prominent educator, artist and proponent of the Arts and Crafts movement in early 20th century America, he was proficient in a variety of media, from oil and watercolors to pencil and charcoal.

Harry Leith-Ross, American, born Mauritius, 1886-1973, "Snow Scene," undated, oil on canvas. Leith-Ross taught classes in landscape painting in New Hope, Pennsylvania, taking over teaching duties for John Fulton Folinsbee, a fellow member of the Salmagundi Club. Leith-Ross became an integral part of the New Hope art community, and eventually wrote "The Landscape Painter's Manual" in 1956.

Corwin Knapp Linson, American, 1864-1959, "Cool Comfort," circa 1926, oil on canvas. He was an illustrator, painter and writer whose subjects ranged from social commentary, to travel images, to biblical subjects. He wrote a book about the author Stephen Crane, his close friend.

George Glenn Newell, American, 1870-1947, "The Lane to the Brook," undated, oil on panel. Known for his pastoral landscapes featuring cattle, he exhibited widely and with much success throughout the United States. He was a member of the National Academy of Design.

James Scott, American, 1889-1934, 'Autumn Trees", circa 1926, oil on canvas. No information available.

Artist Unknown, American, first half of 19th century, "Portrait of a Lady," circa 1925-35, oil on canvas. This portrait can be approximately dated by the costume of the fashionable sitter. The attention paid to the lady's ring suggests that the portrait might commemorate her marriage.

Artist unknown, American, early 20th century, "Autumn Landscape with Corner of a Building", undated, oil on canvas.

John Scott Williams, American, born Great Britain, 1877-1976, "Faun", undated, oil on board. Williams and his wife, the artist Clara Elsene Peck, both attended the Leonia School of Illustration in New Jersey. He was one of seven major American artists who volunteered to create World War I propaganda posters.

the events were open to the public and two were private and held at schools. Working outside, in parking lots and playgrounds, participants make sheets of fresh paper containing recycled materials from schools and businesses and decorating it with pigmented pulp in images reflecting their community.

Partners in Street Pulp were involved because of their geographic location in the upper peninsula area of Charleston, involvement in the community, access to potential participants, and underserved audiences. These partners included the John L. Dart Library, 1067 King Street; DwellSmart, 804 Meeting Street; James Simons Elementary School, 741 King Street, and the Charleston Development Academy, 233 Line Street.

The project and exhibition also explores the idea of creative placemaking in the upper Peninsula. The transformative process from fiber to pulp to paper and then to the object of artists' book is an apt analogy for creative placemaking. Fiber does not change its nature, only its form, just as creative placemaking will change the form, but not the nature of the upper peninsula.

Ann Long Fine Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by William Halsey

Marking the 100th year anniversary of the artist's birth, the exhibit William Halsey will open at Ann Long Fine Art in Charleston, SC, on Friday, Apr. 10, 2015 and hang through Apr. 30. William Halsey (1915 -1999) was a pioneer modernist in Charleston, breaking ground in a city known for its picturesque art tradition. Exhibited at the gallery are fifteen later works by the artist, spanning the 1970s - 1990s.

William Melton Halsey was born on George Street in Charleston. As a boy he drew copies of lithographs hanging in his family home, leading his mother to enroll him in classes at the Charleston Museum with Elizabeth O'Neill Verner.

After two years at the University of South Carolina, where Halsev felt unchallenged except by classmate, fellow artist, and future wife, Corrie McCallum, Halsey enrolled in the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. There he learned classical draughtsmanship, anatomy, perspective, also more modern concepts of color theory. He developed a particular interest in mural art. At the Museum School Halsey's primary instructors were Alexandre Iacovleff, Karl Zerbe, and Lewis Rubinstein. As these

teachers had done, Halsey yearned to continue his study in Europe, but being 1939, war looming in Europe, Zerbe encouraged newly wed Halsey and McCallum to go to Mexico instead.

After eighteen months in Mexico City and several months touring the countryside after, Halsey and McCallum returned to Charleston, where they would reside for the remainder of their lives, albeit traveling extensively to other countries including: Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, Peru, Greece, Portugal Spain and Moro

Halsev considered himself an outsider wher ever he was, even Charleston, but the city was essential to him. In 1987 Halsey said: "Growing up in a Charleston impoverished and neglected, surrounded by flaking plaster, mortarless brick walls, old tiles, and rotting wood. I saw them as delight rather than decay. Ever since, I have carried on a love affair with fragments, shards, ruins, bits of past civilizations... the more I have traveled, the further I have gone, the more I have come back to the same person and place."

Halsey lives on, not just through his art, but through his students, he was a dedicated teacher for over 50 years. Students Brian Rutenberg and Merton Simpson (until his recent death in 2013), notably, shape/have shaped today's art world as artist and artist/ dealer respectively.

Halsey is Charleston's own world-class modernist. From golden African-inspired fabric collages on door size panels to a Pollock-like explosion of small marks in vivid color, *Terrain*, this bold and important continued on Page 30



World in the 15th century, European mapmakers scrambled to document and map the new territories, using centuries-old technology. In contrast to today's massproduced, utilitarian maps, early European cartographers recruited renowned painters and miniaturists of their times who created maps that were truly works of art, richly colored and intricately decorated.

The artworks, a 1999 gift from Mrs. George Bishop in memory of her late husband, a local entrepreneur, are part of the Museum's permanent collection.

The exhibition includes 15 maps illustrating what has been termed the golden age of cartography plus a selection of complementary historical prints. During that era of rapid discovery - and hence, extensive production of new maps - cities as far-flung as Paris, Amsterdam, Florence, Venice and London competed as mapmaking centers of the world.

Since early maps often relied on unverified and often unreliable information from native populations, unsubstantiated reports and hearsay, the maps illustrate the evolution of both exploration and documentation of geographical information. Among the historic gems included

Many of Nein's works are created in the traditional stained glass method where small pieces of colored glass are fitted into lead strips to create a two-dimensional image. Some works are functional pieces such as tables, desktops and doors, while other works are pure sculptural forms. Besides blown glass and dichromatic glass, other materials find their way into his work: minerals, geodes, crystals, bottles, stemware

and even a car reflector and hubcap. Some works are created by fusing layers of glass. During the viewing experience one is immediately aware not only of the beauty of the created work, but also of the interaction of the works with light. Indeed, the reflections and projections of colored light are

works of art as well, entrancing to the eye. Nein does believe he is "painting with light" with these works. Locals may already be familiar with Nein's works. 



Today they are in various states of an unfortunate, yet often poetic, deterioration. Some plates are broken and on others the emulsion is peeling away, but the hundreds of vibrant personalities in the photographs prevail, engaging our emotions, intellect and imagination. The contemporary reprints in this exhibition are pigmented inkjet photographs on acid-free paper printed with archival inks.





Bender Gallery in Asheville, NC, will present Veiled Memories, a solo exhibition for Canadian glass and metal artist Carole Frève, on view from Apr. 3 through May 31, 2015. A reception will be held on Apr. 3, from 5-8pm.

Frève's work is distinguished by a unique pairing of translucent glass together with electroformed and knitted copper. Her graceful sculpture and vessels are like ephemeral moments in time, clouded in

Frève uses both blown and kiln formed glass which undergoes an additional firing at high temperatures so that her pieces lose much of their transparency and take on a semi-opaque, diaphanous appearance. She explains, "This transformation can be seen as a symbol for the passage of time, when memories become indistinct and reality distorted.'

Near the end of her studies, Frève created a piece titled Souvenir de mon Grand-pere (Memory of my Grandfather). It struck her then that her memory of her grandfather was that of a very old man. In contrast, her mother remembered him as a younger, working man. This subjectivity of memories has since become the cornerstone of Frève's work.

Frève creates an uncommon pairing with the translucent glass by adding electroformed copper to the surface or by enshrouding the piece in knitted copper wire. The metal and the glass complement each other and create balance in the work. She explains, "Glass working is a craft. It is in the body. Copper work is more scientific,

there are chemical reactions to understand." In her artistic statement, Frève states, 'Each piece is a reflection of my emotions, intuition, recollections and questions. I also seek to evoke the passage of time leaving its mark on my works and memories."

Carol Frève was born in Gatineau, Canada and now resides in Montreal, Quebec. She studied Industrial Design at the University of Montreal and followed up with a three year glass program at Espace Verre. She has also completed artist residen cies in Lybster, Scotland and at Wheaton

artist Jim Collins, who has exhibited his work extensively in Ireland, created a new series of work especially for the show based on Irish mythology. Called The Wooing of *Etain*, it uses 19th- and early 20th century materials to tell the story of an ancient fairy who tricked a king into marrying his own daughter, giving it the feel of a Victorian-era of a tragic Wagner opera.

"The emphasis is on working artists based in the southeastern United States," Browne continues. "Even Fatimah Tuggar, who is originally from Nigeria and now is an Assistant Professor at Ontario College of Art and Design, has a strong connection to our region - she was a W.A. Mellon Research Fellow at John Hope Franklin Humanities Institute at Duke University. Patrick Crabb is showing work specifically created for this show. Crabb's many influences include: A "deconstruction approach" involving shards and fragmentation which was inspired by artist Rick Dillingham from the 1970's era; Nature treks into the American Southwest where broken pot shards by the Native Americans were viewed; and International travels each year where an appreciation for other cultural and ancient artifacts was developed.

These continuous paths of discovery have taken Crabb in several, but related, directions including the container vessels, the architectural interpretations, and the human figure. Each path continues to crisscross each other allowing it to enrich the imagery year after year.

Crabb's work conveys a sense of mystery and visual power to the viewers. Ancient cultures with historical artifacts from many countries layer the imagery, resulting in a multi-cultural composition which in turn, is a reflection of our contemporary life.

From the technical side, the clay pieces are altered wheel- thrown forms, slab to press molded constructions, and fired in multiple ways such as in raku, sawdust, horsehair, low-temperature salt, and oxidation... all of which are in the low temperature range of c/06-c/02.

Jason Bohnert brings an international sensibility to his ceramic work, having completed an apprenticeship in Jingdezhen and Yixing China in addition to his graduate work at West Virginia University and his residency at the Energy Xchange near Penland, NC. A thorough understanding of the rituals associated with ceramics in China pushes him to make pots that will continue to reveal their subtleties for years of use. For him, a tea bowl is not simply for drinking tea; it is an expression of an ancient aesthetic and philosophy.

Bohnert's love of landscape, particularly that of the Southwestern United States, also powers his creative drive. "Layered slips, glazes, over-glazes, and textured surfaces in the clay create landscapes and reference lichen, stained canyon walls, and forces of erosion." Pulling from a deep appreciation for cultural traditions and the natural world, Bohnert's work will grow on you for years to come

Steven Schaeffer's work is evidence of his experiences in the natural world. From walks in the woods, to river expeditions, these physical encounters have led him to a greater level of personal consciousness. Understanding his environment is an essential motivation for his creative process and nature is the didactic arena that Steven

"River trips by boat have led me to many places," says Schaeffer. "These vessels have been the carriers for my integration into the wild, which has allowed me to foster my personal connection with nature. As a result the form of 'boat' or 'vessel' is the inspiration core of my ideas. I'm intent on creating work that offers the notion of hope and the embodiment of strength.'

This is a direct response to nature itself and the risks that are inherent within it. Nature is a collection of many of the formal qualities that interest Schaeffer and in turn influences his work.

The work is simple in its method, yet transfers a generosity of scale to the viewer. The forms define space, and their weight is connected to the landscape they are inspired by. Within these works an entire canyon can be created with one line slicing through its surface. Schaeffer's work is about the spatial relationships he's experienced in nature and, in turn, the work has become a voice for those landscapes.

What does it mean to inhabit close quarters with another person? Especially in the arena of domestic life, the act of sharing a small space is often an interpersonal exercise in balance. The give and take of collaborative decision-making becomes a rhythmic dance that occurs between people and the objects that represent them. Eventu ally, color, pattern, texture and form blend within the space to reflect the relationship of those that occupy it.

Outside of the domestic arena, 'Close Quarters' also emphasizes the role that profound mutual respect plays in a successfully shared space. As good friends and thoughtful makers, Errol and Rogers, view the concept of close quarters as a challenge to celebrate the diversity of their individual artistic styles while combining forces to create a cohesive representation of an idea.
