Burke Arts Council in Morganton, NC, **Features Exhibition by Woodworkers**


The Burke Arts Council in Morganton, NC, is presenting its annual Woodworkers Exhibition, on view through Apr. 15,

Tom Blanton, Tom Denne, James Ellis and Kasia Sweeny, John Ferguson, Connie Molland, Peter Milne, and Don Olsen are showcasing their own craftsmanship and unique style of woodworking including wood turning, whittling, wood sculpture,

functional pieces, wall art, and furniture.

The exhibit will also feature works by The Students of WPCC, Professional Crafts Wood Program, under the direction of John Ferguson. Ten students will show their current projects - from chairs to dressers to tables. The program at WPCC offers an associate's degree in Professional Crafts Woods as well as certificates

Order came into play when John Ferguson, a local woodworker, visited and helped us make frames for each piece. These student artists had to help measure, count and calculate how each frame was to come together. The assembly of the frames was done by the
