

Ella W. Richardson Fine Art in Charleston, SC, will present Exit Right, featuring abstract works by Mark Bettis and Karen Weihs, on view from Apr. 1 -30, 2016. A reception will be held on Apr. 1, from 5-8pm.

With a soothing palette of muted tones, Weihs' works elicit a sense of softness and delicacy, while Bettis' brim with bold color and an keen awareness of spatiality. The exhibition proffers a delightful blend of their right-brained energy that begs viewers to pause and consider the mood invoked by each work

Several years ago, Charleston native Karen Weihs bid goodbye to the Lowcountry in favor of the mountains of Cashiers, NC. Her works are heavily influenced by her surroundings as well as the comings and goings of abstract shapes in her mind. Weihs is highly regarded as a colorist and palette-knife painter, meaning that she pays close attention to tonality as well as the process of smoothing paint

across the canvas. She is a sought-after mentor and teaches one-on-one lessons as well as an annual group retreat at The Bascom museum in the Highlands of North Carolina.

Whereas Weihs' works give the impression of the softness of passing clouds, Mark Bettis' reel viewers in with a ferocity of texture and depth. For this show, Bettis has created "a series of abstracts that manipulate the traditional concepts of landscapes to various degrees of abstraction." Bettis originally hails from Chicago, IL. but currently resides in Asheville, NC. Expect to be surprised by this oil and cold wax painter, whose work was recently accepted into the prestigious ArtFields© Festival in Lake City, SC.

Each time Bettis and Weihs sit down in their studios to create, they are really pushing the envelope of personal artistry as well as challenging what has been


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Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Pat Forsberg
