Craven Arts Council in New Bern, NC, Features Two New Exhibitions

Craven Arts Council in New Bern, NC, will present several new exhibits including: the *TRAA Annual Juried Exhibition*, and works by visual arts students at Craven Community College, on view in the Main Gallery, from Apr. 5 through May 1, 2018. A reception will be held on Apr. 13, from 5-8pm. Also on view in the Director's Gallery will be works by students at two private schools, on view from Apr. 5 through May 1, 2018.

The Twin Rivers Artists Association (TRAA) exists to promote and encourage the creation, education, and appreciation of fine art in the region. The over one hundred strong membership meets monthly to learn and discuss techniques, provide feedback, make social connections, and distribute news on the arts in the area. Skill levels range from beginners to professional artists, in an environment that encourages cooperation and mentorship. Once a year the Craven Arts Council hosts an exhibition of the group's membership, combined with students from the local Craven Community College, in order to encourage the creation and exhibition of local art. Works on display will include painting, photography, sculpture, pottery, and mixed media.

This year's juror for the exhibition will be Ryan Fox, a contemporary watercolor

artist from Raleigh, NC. Fox's watercolors often depict historical locations in a unique and colorful style.

The Craven Arts Council and Gallery is proud to host an exhibition of work from local area private schools in the Director's Gallery at Bank of the Arts. This exhibition will feature the work of art classes from Epiphany Global School and Annunciation Catholic School.

Art has been shown to have an integral beneficial effect on youth education in subjects from math and science to literary analysis. Bank of the Arts is pleased to reinforce these ideas by offering the students a chance to exhibit their works in a gallery setting. Jodi Tomboulain and Eva Glennon, art teachers at Epiphany and Annunciation respectively, have spent this year teaching their students not only the fundamentals of art and design, but also art history, global cultures, and advanced craft based techniques. The exhibit will host a variety of subject matters and mediums, including ekphrastic drawing and poetry, animal collages, and painted panel iconography.



Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, Offers NC Artist Fellowship Exhibition

The North Carolina Arts Council's *Artist Fellowship Exhibition* is on view through Aug. 5, 2018, at the Cameron Art Museum (CAM) in Wilmington, NC, with the works of 17 contemporary artists.

The artists participating in the show include ten visual artists, three craft artists, two film/video artists, and two choreographers - all were recipients of the 2016-2017 Artist Fellowship awards.

"The scope of work in the exhibition shows that North Carolina continues to be a creative environment for artistic exploration, a place where diverse and innovative artists are supported and thrive," CAM exhibition curator Holly Tripman Fitzgerald said.

Together, the artists in the exhibition offer a snapshot of what some of the best artists in North Carolina are doing and why they were recipients of the prestigious award, said Jeff Pettus, who oversees the Arts Council's Artist Fellowship Program and serves as the Senior Program Director for Artists and Organizations. The NC Arts Council has awarded more than \$5 million to over 600 artists since the program started 35 years ago. It is considered one of the country's premier programs in supporting artists.

"I am delighted that, on the occasion of its 50th anniversary, the North Carolina Arts Council has chosen to partner with the Cameron Art Museum to host its biennial *Artists Fellowship Exhibition*," said Susi H. Hamilton, Secretary, North Carolina Department of Natural & Cultural Resources. "This celebration of some of the state's finest artists could not find a more welcoming venue than the Cameron."

Works in the show range from the sculptural work of used silver platters by former Penland artist Jaydan Moore to the delicate paintings of Lien Truong

of Chapel Hill that depict and reinterpret *The Course of Empire* by Thomas Cole, a Hudson River School mid-19th century painter.

Katina Parker, a filmmaker from Durham, will have five short videos for viewing, and Asheville artist Jackson Martin's pieces will give a nod to the 40-hour work week with an installation composed of 300 hand-cut pieces of vinyl mesh fabric that reflect the dimensions of traditional cinder block. It took him 40 hours to create, and there is no thread or glue holding the fabric together.
