

She says she carries her sketchbook with her everywhere so that she can sketch an idea as soon as it comes to her, to later make the sketches into sculptural works. The term "tectour" is a combination of the syllables "TEC" which stand for "archiTECture and TECtonics. McAninch hopes viewers will travel through many different textural worlds when viewing this exhibition.

Garry Turpin's show, The Circle of Life, is a chronology of his art from the 1970s until the present day. His paintings show personal experiences throughout his life. The subject matter moves seamlessly from portrait studies to clouds. His paintings delight all viewers.

Turpin has a BFA in studio art from Mars Hill College. A former business owner of a graphic design firm, he has 25 years of experience in computer graphics and illustration. Turpin's preferred medium is oil paint, although he sometimes experiments in pottery and printmaking. He says in the past year he has "experienced new and wonderful friendships and has seen unrelenting examples of aging and declining health in older family and friends." Turpin has been moved by these experiences, which can be seen in the newer pieces of this exhibit. As he continues to

He formally studied 2 dimensional and 3 dimensional arts in college, and currently attends workshops and continues to collaborate with and learn from other artists.

Smith has been commissioned for portraits, has donated works to various non-profits and charities within the community, painted murals, and has been invited to show in galleries throughout the southeast. Many of his current works are of the impressionistic style, and he enjoys presenting a variety of works using different painting techniques.
