Bechtler Museum of Modern Art, Levine Center for the Arts, 420 South Tryon St., Charlotte. Through July 25 - "Mario Botta: Architecture and Memory". Botta is among the most noted architects on an international scale. His reputation and status have long been established throughout the rest of the world by the great number and wide variety of commissions the 70-year-old architect has received in the last 50 years throughout Europe and most recently Asia. He is considered one of the world's foremost architects of churches and museums. Botta's body of work ranges from private residences in the Swiss Alps to urban projects in Europe and Asia. The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is the only US venue for this engaging exhibition that highlights the designs for some of Botta's significant museums, libraries, theaters and religious spaces. Over the last decades, Botta has focused on creating major public buildings worldwide. The exhibition features sketches, original wood models and photographs for 30 of these projects. Ongoing - The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler, a Charlotte resident and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1,400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust. The Bechtler collection comprises artworks by seminal figures such as Alberto Giacometti, Joan Miro, Jean Tinguely, Max Ernst, Andy Warhol, Alexander Calder, Le Corbusier, Sol LeWitt, Edgar Degas, Nicolas de Stael, Barbara Hepworth and Picasso. Only a handful of the artworks in the Bechtler collection have been on public view in the United States. Admission: Yes. Hours: Mon., Wed.-Sat., 10am-5pm; Sun. noon-5pm; and open

Latin American Contemporary Art Projects (LaCa), 1429 Bryant Street, in the heart of the revitalized FreeMoreWest neighborhood, Charlotte. Through May 2 - "Cuba: Art of the Fantastic," curated by Abelardo Mena. The exhibit brings together four masterful artists, Juan Carlos Verdial, Alicia de la Campa, Alexander González, and Vicente Hernández, who offer personal speeches through figurative, vibrant, and highly emotive paintings and drawings. Full of imagination and fantasy, these artists are joined by their eagerness to freely reinterpret symbols of the Cuban culture, of its geography and history, Catholic and African popular religions, proverbs of the Cuban popular idiosyncrasy, and by their deep knowledge and intertextual game with iconic works of the Western, European, and United States, all places where they have gathered considerable momentum. May 8 - June 20 - "Jeannine Marchand: Con Relación al Espacio". A reception will be held on May 8, from 6-9pm. The exhibit is a body of ceramic works based on Marchand's studio as her environment. Seventh St., corner of College St & Seventh St., Charlotte. **Through June 29 -** "Out of the Shadows: Undocumented and Unafraid," conceived and orchestrated by artist Annabel Manning and organized with the assistance of independent curator Carla Hanzal. Undocumented Latino youth who have lived in this country since they were infants or toddlers are an increasingly significant demographic in the South. They consider the U.S. their home: it's all most have ever known. Yet they face considerable barriers, often live in fear, and exist in the shadows of their communities in order to hide their legal status. In recent years many undocumented youth have made the decision to step out of the shadows and have emerged as activists. Through Aug. 17 - "Faces of Freedom Summer: The Photographs of Herbert Randall". The exhibition features 102 photographs taken by Herbert Randall in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. These powerful images document the struggles and triumphs of Civil Rights

activists and disenfranchised African-American voters during the summer of 1964. That summer, students of all races and backgrounds, voting rights organizers, and a coalition of local black residents worked together to secure the rights for all Americans to vote in the South. Among them were three young civil rights workers, James Chaney, Michael Schwerner, and Andrew Goodman, who were murdered days after arriving in Mississippi. Ongoing - "Cotton Fields to Skyscrapers," featuring a permanent exhibition featuring interactive environments that trace the history of the New South from the end of the Civil War until today. Contemporary artist Aurora Robson has a practice that is not only graceful and poetic, but ultimately part of a long-term solution to widespread apathy and nihilism. Robson's transformative practice intercepts from the waste stream plastic debris, excess packaging, and junk mail in order to address urgent issues of consciousness as they relate to our values and the environment. Mint Museum Randolph, 2730 Randolph Road, Charlotte. Through June 29 - "Bearing Witness: The New York Photo League and Sonia Handelman Meyer". The New York Photo League was established in 1936, and centered on the exploration of the power of photography to effect social change and capture the lives of ordinary people as they had never before been depicted. And now, the work of this era - focusing in particular on the remarkable photography of Sonia Handelman Meyer is on view. The exhibition includes approximately 100 photographs from Photo League members. Through Aug. 17 - "North Carolina Pottery, Then and Now." Selections from the museum's recent exhibition, "A Thriving Tradition: 75 Years of Collecting North Carolina Pottery," are supplemented by more highlights from the museum's permanent collection. From the earliest decades of the nineteenth century regions of North Carolina emerged as key centers of pottery production. Randolph, Moore, and Chatham Counties in the Eastern Piedmont developed strong ceramics traditions, with potting families like the Foxes and the Websters creating well-crafted, utilitarian vessels in salt-glazed stoneware. Farther west, the Catawba Valley counties of Lincoln and Catawba developed their own notable ceramics traditions, with the Seagles, Hartsoes, and other potters making storage jars and jugs in ash-glazed stoneware. The ash-glaze tradition was kept alive in the twentieth century by Burlon Craig and his followers. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo. OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Ongoing - "Arts of Africa". The African continent is remarkable in its geographic, social, political, and cultural diversity. This impressive diversity is reflected in the visual arts through a variety of media and forms including ceramics, masks, textiles, sculptures, prestige staffs, and shrines. With exceptional loans from private collectors and The Mint Museum's own collection of African Art, the museum is pleased to announce the expansion of its presentation of Arts of Africa, thereby providing visitors a more in-depth, meaningful, and exciting overview of African art.
