our eyes, but also all of our senses. One cannot help but come home somewhat changed by the experience of another place. For most artists - painters, musicians, architects, chefs, sculptors - travel is a necessary part of their artistic growth. The benefit is not only to their craft, but also to their understanding of the world around them.

Our featured artist for May is West Fraser. His paintings of the Lowcountry are known for their light and atmosphere, his ability to paint a portrait of place. The Lowcountry is his home and he is familiar with its nuances. Painting other places - even just going up the Eastern coast - presents new challenges - different light, unfamiliar vegetation, along with unfamiliar places. For our show *Artists' Travels*, Fraser has created a group of paintings from two of his favorite places - Costa Rica and Italy. Although they are not depictions of his beloved southern coast, they are recognizable as West Fraser paintings.

Robert Lange Studios in Charleston, SC, Offers a Really Big Exhibition of Really, Really Big Paintings

The Robert Lange Studios in Charleston, SC, will present *Epic*, featuring really large paintings from their artists, on view from May 4 - 25, 2018. A reception will be held on May 4, from 6-8pm.

Each work is the largest piece that each painter has ever created. This is the first series of its kind shown at the gallery and Robert Lange said, "We are extremely excited to see what these artists are capable of on a grand scale."

Most of the artists in the show are landscape painters. However, artists and local Charleston favorite Nathan Durfee decided to tackle the challenge of painting his largest work to date. For his part he created an enormous tree filed with cardinals being serenaded by a panda.

"Creating a piece of this scale allowed me to create a world within the painting. Each bird perched on a branch has its own personality and individual story," said Nathan Durfee. "When you look at a crowded street, everyone you see has there own story, this painting creates a similar effect. There are a multitude of paintings worth of stories expressed within one piece." Durfee starts his painting process by creating doodles and sketches that he then loosely translates with oil onto the canvas. The painting as he says "evolves into what it wants to be" as he adds more and more rendering and color. Showing along side Durfee's piece will be two enormous 7' seascapes from painter Adam Hall, whose moody waters and textured landscapes are usually quite large but nothing like what he has made for this show. Hall has wanted to create something gigantic but was intimated to start. He said, "Putting the first brush stroke on such an enormous canvas was something I'll never forget doing.' In another piece for the show titled Endurance a single tree stands within a vast landscape overlooking mountains on

a 36" x 48" canvas. Artist Brett Schiefflee had initially painted the same image in a smaller work 10" x 10" piece. "When I was approached to participate in the show I immediately thought of that smaller tree piece and how I had wished that I had originally painted it larger. There were so many nuances that were lost."

One collector's comment in anticipation for the upcoming show is, "To test ones own ability and push for excellence in art and life is how we grow as people," Peter Levine, a great art collector from Charleston said, "I think this show will dare an artist to dream big and that after all is what it's all about."

Robert Lange Studios is a gallery space run by artist and gallery owners Megan and Robert Lange. As such, it is dedicated to the development of an on-going dialogue between artists from a diverse range
