Martha Cloud Chapman Gallery, Campus Life Building, 429 North Church St., Spartanburg. Through Aug. 18 - "Old Main: A Trip Down Memory Lane". The exhibition explores the visual history of Wofford College through Main Building, known affectionately as Old Main. Referred to as "The College" for many years, Old Main remains one of the nation's outstanding examples of "Italianate" or "Tuscan Villa" architecture. The cornerstone of Old Main was laid with imposing Masonic rites on July 4, 1851. Construction finally began in the summer of 1852 under the supervision of Ephraim Clayton of Asheville, N.C. Skilled African-American carpenters executed uniquely beautiful masonry and woodwork, including a pulpit and pews for the chapel. The exterior of the building today is true to the original design, but the interior has been modernized and renovated three times – in the early 1900s, in the 1960s and in 2007. The selected archival and photographic prints as well as works on paper provide an opportunity to take a trip down memory lane to Wofford's most famous landmark. Hours: 7ammidnight, daily. The exhibit examines the history and legacy of Wofford's literary societies. In August 1854, the first literary society was created as a venue to practice skills such as debating, oratory, parliamentary procedure and writing. Three more societies had been formed by 1920. During the college's first century, the societies were integral to student life - starting libraries, building the college portrait collection and starting three student publications. Members planned major student events and provided the ceremonial activities of the annual Commencement week. While literary societies no long exist, their influence on the college continues. Spartanburg Art Museum, Chapman Cultural Arts Center, 200 East St. John Street, Spartanburg. Main Gallery, May 17 - Aug. 5 - "off the wall". A reception will be held on May 17, from 5-8pm with artist talks at 6:30pm. While in classical sculpture, art was made from raw materials, in the present day it is often constructed from pre-existing, reclaimed objects. Contemporary sculpture is about understanding the ways in which objects both acquire and lose meaning, and using this understanding to imbue them with new values. "Off the Wall" examines 11 sculptors who use this "alchemy of objects" to create new physical, conceptual, and political spaces. Works by Mayo "Mac" Boggs

West Main Artists Cooperative, 578 West Main St., Spartanburg. May 1 - 31 - "Mac Boggs: A Retrospective," celebrating 43 years of international recognition and acclaim Spartanburg artist, Mayo "Mac" Boggs. A reception will be held on May 17, from 5-9pm. His widow, Ansley Boggs, Ph.D., will give a free artist's talk that night from 6:30-7pm. "This will be West Main's most important exhibit for the year," Venue Committee Chair Dwight Rose said. "There is probably no other Spartanburg artist who has achieved as much recognition and respect as Mac Boggs. His work is literally around the world." Boggs passed away on March 10, 2014, at the age of 71, due to heart disease. At that time, he was retired from teaching art at Converse College, where he retained the distinction of Professor Emeritus of Art. Through May 12 - "Observer Observed," featuring works by Pickens County printmaker and artist Steven A. Chapp, giving the public extensive insight to his American ancestors, especially during the Civil War. Within the more-than 26 unique hand-pulled prints are historic family photos, written documents, and original drawings that Chapp used to create print collages, monoprints, and etchings using various printmaking techniques. The print collages are new constructions using older or current prints to create new compositions that he would not otherwise have made. The 14 pieces of colorful and delicate sculpture convey the artist's concern for the environment, creating emotional reactions of exuberance, sorrow, resignation, and determination.
