The interaction of image, shape, and surface appeal to me aesthetically. Conceptually, they are about telling small stories of insight. I see my work as visual poetry seeking to make sense of the world around me."

Flowers earned his BFA in Studio Arts from The University of South Carolina in 1977 and his MFA in Painting from Western Michigan University in 1979. Following his academic career, he has exhibited his work throughout the United States and in Europe. Flowers' work can be found in 26 public and over 300 private collections. Throughout his career he has won numerous awards for his art in both regional and national competitions. Most recently he was named one of the 100 Art Alumni for the

Flowers' art teaching career parallels his art making. He has taught art at the secondary and college levels for more than 41 years. While he has been a teacher of art, he has also chaired two fine arts departments and one painting department. In pursuing dual careers, he has served as a town councilman, volunteer firefighter, Little League baseball coach and president of a community recreational board.

Flowers is a career artist who lives his life creating art, teaching what he knows, and serving his community well. He and his artist/wife, Kristy Higby, live in a handmade log cabin just north of Asheville, NC, in the neighborhood of Alexander. They also have a large studio on the property named Mountain Tea Studios.

When Keefer was very young, her mother, a teacher, provided her with pencils and paper and encouraged her to create. From then on she always knew she wanted to be an artist. She has a bachelor's degree in art education, and a master's degree in special education and art history from the University of Alabama, Birmingham. Keefer took graduate painting instruction *continued above on next column to the right* In an attempt to understand our social and political climate, artists and writers have a unique perspective that is worthy of our attention.

Art that sparks further thought or encourages communication can have an impact on individual views and how they are shaped into the future. Engaging words and images have always had a powerful ability to elicit a wide range of responses, from outrage to revelation.

In a culture oversaturated with sound bites and quick images, meant to only be eye-catching for a moment, poetry and visual art are able to add to the civic dialogue posing big-picture kinds of questions and provide a platform on which conversations can be started that, hopefully, lead to communication between people, communities, even political parties.

This is not a new concept. Art and poetry have historically played a role in shaping public consciousness, from William Blake to Patricia Smith and from Picasso to Kara Walker. Art has always been a faithful documentarian, often acting as a moral compass,

asking difficult questions of establishment views and institutions.

We asked fifteen local, regional and national poets to submit poems that address a variety of political and social issues, from our environment to our present political divisiveness. We then invited fifteen visual artists to respond to a specific poem with work they felt illustrated the feeling and meaning of the poem chosen for them.

The result of this "blind" collaboration is a thought provoking exhibition of work.
