The Durham Arts Council in Durham, NC, is presenting several exhibits including: Recent Paintings by John A. Recent Paintings, by Louisiana-based artist John Malveto, combines abstract surfaces to create recognizable imagery. Malveto, an Associate Professor at Louisiana State University, has developed a "glass release stain painting" technique in which he applies multiple layers of acrylic paint to glass. Once dried, he transfers the paint to a stretched canvas to create a narrative. Thought-provoking tension and depth emerge from unexpected spatial relationships and explosive foreground images. Malveto taught at many universities from New York to California prior to joining the faculty at Louisiana State University in 1983. He has been represented by numerous galleries, participated in many solo and group exhibitions, and earned multiple

The Durham Arts Council also is presenting The Still Life Reinterpreted by two-time Emerging Artist Grant recipient Cynthia Aldrich (1992 and 2002) in the Ella Fountain Pratt Legacy Gallery. The exhibit is a change from the work and research Aldrich has been doing for the past fifteen years. Aldrich's past work was inspired by her research on prehistoric art from all cultures, with a primary focus on images of ancient goddesses. Using these ideas, she created goddess forms that were not only objects of beauty but also reflected the artist's views on social issues regarding women. Her recent sculptural work has been more contemporary in design and surface treatment, and The Still Life *Reinterpreted* is a reflection of this change. Aldrich has been fascinated by still life painting for many years: not only the beauty of the traditional floral images, but also the variety and arrangement of objects and their

NC Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, **Offers Works From Its Collection**

The North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, is presenting Sacred Motherhood: Mother-and-Child Representations from the Permanent Collection, on view in the East Building, Level B, through Dec.

The exhibition includes artifacts, paintings, sculpture, ceramics, photographs, and lithographs that depict mother and child, from ancient Egypt to the 21st century. The 13 works in the exhibition examine multiple facets of motherhood from pregnancy to the pain of separation at death.

Sacred Motherhood offers historical and cultural context to older works of art and addresses how artists today are inspired to portray the subject of motherhood. Caroline M. Rocheleau, the NCMA's curator of ancient art and Sacred Motherhood curator, says context is important to our understanding of the works in the exhibition: "In order to figure out what a particular presentation of mother and child means, we must look beyond the image of the woman and the child. We must determine when and where the work was created, who created it, and how he or she created it." Extended labels that provide this context accompany each work.

Regarding the title of the exhibition,

Rocheleau explains, "Sacred Motherhood is not about sacred mothers; instead, it stresses the fact that motherhood is worthy of reverence in and of itself."
