The City of Chapel Hill, NC, will present Geegaws and Ghostlies: Southern Storytelling, featuring artists' books and assorted three-dimensional works of paper and wood by Lillian Trettin, on view in cases at the Chapel Hill Town Hall, from June 3 through Aug. 27, 2015.

Trettin, who resides in Jonas Ridge, NC, and Mount Pleasant, SC, creates visual narratives by piecing together shapes in paper or wood like a jigsaw puzzle. She often begins by writing stories to inform her complex figurative works. Her works exude dark humor in bright colors derived from Appalachian folklore, Southern literature, and the art of Romare Bearden.

With an undergraduate art degree from UNC Chapel Hill and graduate degrees from the State University of New York and the University of Michigan, Trettin returned to making art full time in 2011, following a career as a teacher, researcher, and consultant and after raising two sons. She's convinced the delay enriched rather than impeded her growth as an artist.

Included in this exhibit are handmade books, paper animations, miniature pictures of cut-paper collage, and jigsaw sculptures of wood and paper. The exhibit's purpose is to encourage viewers to reflect on the

wealth of traditions in southern storytelling. Objects are arranged in three cases, one each pertaining to Southern Lit, Blue Ridge Lore, and the Far-Out South.
