"I don't have a favorite form or item, but I enjoy the throwing process the most. My least favorite part is glazing!! It's exciting and scary opening the lid of the kiln." Says Stachurski. "Opening the kitchen cabinet and choosing a mug, bowl or plate according to my mood is fun. The most gratifying aspect is when a true artist likes a piece I've created."

Eric New is 29 years old and a native of Abbeville, SC. He was diagnosed with Autism at the age of 12. He has always enjoyed drawing and during his high school years, he began to perfect his work with geometric designs. The repetitive patterning of New's designs, mixed with his choice of color pallets result in bold graphic pieces.

New uses markers on paper and carefully fills each 9" x 12" sheet of paper with great detail. Matted and framed in a simple black gallery presentation, his pieces are striking when either hung alone as a focal piece or displayed in a group of related designs. Since his graduation from Abbeville High School in 2009, New has participated in numerous art shows. In 2017 he was juried into Main & Maxwell as a member artist.

The Abbeville Chamber of Commerce has chosen his art to be presented at their

Welcome Center and in 2015 he was named Artist of the Year by the Abbeville Artist Guild. New hopes that one day his designs will be used for printing on fabric, wallpaper, and wrapping paper.
