Neither choose to capture holidays or particular celebrations. Both use objects as metaphors for the people and memories of their childhood. Both have traveled home to gather the bits of "Passing Time" into autobiographical tales. The mythology of "Passing Time" takes precedent over historical accuracy.

Logan has recorded the weekends he has spent with his mother in her home over the past several years as her health has deteriorated. He states, "My choice of camera - a Polaroid Land Camera - wasn't coincidental. It is toy-like, and nonconfrontational." Using an extinct camera with discontinued film makes each of his images precious as is his fleeting time with his mother. His Polaroid images are unique and are reminiscent of the painted miniatures that provided intimate, portable family memories for many years into the nineteenth century.

"To reconnect with this land and the community my family called home, I have been making regular treks to photograph Alabama over the last decade." These treks resulted in an ongoing series of photographic images of store fronts, signs, churches, cemeteries because "I find these structures and the 'stories they could tell' curious."

Both Logan and Owens hold AA degrees in photography from Greenville Technical College. Logan has also completed a BFA from Savannah College of Art and Design and a MFA from Clemson University. He is currently Assistant Professor of Photography at Greenville Tech. Owens is currently enrolled in the BFA program at Clemson and is Studio Manager and Gallery Assistant at Greenville Tech. **RIVERWORKS** Gallery is operated by and for the faculty and students of the Department of Visual and Performing Arts at Greenville Technical College. Owens' images, on the other hand, record a particular region of Alabama (Tuskegee) the origin of his parents and their families. He traveled this area as a child to visit his grandparents and other family, their homes, graves, churches. These road trips with his parents became less and less frequent as family moved away or passed on. According to Owens,
