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Blowing Rock Art & History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Offers Virtual Exhibitions


Despite being closed to the public for more than six weeks, the Blowing Rock Art & History Museum's (BRAHM) community outreach, engagement, and promotion of the visual arts and history is as strong as ever.

Not only has the museum created a digital engagement platform through their BRAHM at Home offerings, the BRAHM team has crafted a variety of ways to experience their current exhibitions from home.

The Young at Art Student Spectacular exhibition has been converted into a completely digital experience. This annual exhibition features artwork created by K- 3rd grade students from Blowing Rock School who visited the museum each month for a hands-on art lesson about an aspect of art or art history.

"This year, Young at Art artists took a journey through art history, with stops in Ancient Polynesia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, and Medieval Europe," says Education Center Director, Jennifer Garonzik. 
