

Duke Energy Center for the
Performing Arts in Raleigh, NC,
Features Works by Robert Tynes

The Duke Energy Center for the Performing Arts in Raleigh, NC, is presenting *Robert Tynes: Contemporary Trompe L'Oeil Paintings*, on view in the Betty Ray McCain Art Gallery, through Sept. 28, 2014.

Tynes is a professor of art at UNC Asheville. Lee Hansley, of Lee Hansley Gallery in Raleigh, represents Tynes and curated the exhibition of 17 paintings.

and shaped to create this added effect. Such construction allows the illusion of the objects to move beyond merely projecting toward the viewer, to extending outside the periphery of the paintings, including casting shadows on the wall. When properly lighted, the actual shadows falling on the wall match up with the painted shadows to enhance the illusion.”

“My paintings combine abstract brush marks with trompe l’oeil illusionism,” continues Tynes. “The juxtaposition of these opposite ways of working results in a dialectic approach to painting. The visual tension that exists in the work reflects the dualities and paradoxical nature of the world as I see it. The paintings can be seen as simultaneously abstract and hyper-realistic, active yet calm, or both contemplative and humorous.”

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“Reconciling different technical approaches to painting allows each method to contribute to the overall mood and feeling of a work. Through the use of illusion, the paintings convey both a sense of mystery and humor, and reflect my long-time interests in Surrealism, as well as the psychology of perception,” says Tynes.

The Duke Energy Center for the Performing Arts is a downtown arts complex, which houses one of the largest suites of live-performance venues in the Southeast.

The downtown Raleigh entertainment center is the main scene for theater, dance, and classical and popular music in Raleigh. Some of the various components of the center include Memorial Auditorium, Meymandi Concert Hall, A. J. Fletcher Opera Theater, Kennedy Theater, and the Betty Ray McCain Art Gallery.

Duke University in Durham, NC, is presenting *Sound Vision: Contemporary Art from the Collection*, an exhibition of recent acquisitions of contemporary art and other highlights from the collection, on view at the Nasher Museum of Art, through Aug. 8, 2014.

The exhibition includes paintings, works on paper, photography, video, installation and sculpture.

“We are thrilled to present an exhibition of some of the most exciting art of our time,” said Sarah Schroth, Mary D.B.T. and James H. Semans Director of the Nasher Museum. “Visitors will enjoy one dazzling work after another, and the conversations between them. A story emerges in this exhibition—of our dedication to our curator’s vision and our sound strategy for building a collection.”

The exhibition reflects a collecting strategy with a focus on artists who are living and working today, and may be emerging or unexpected. The work of these younger artists, often connected to the museum through exhibitions, is juxtaposed with established artists who have greatly influenced art of the 21st century. *Sound Vision* will be complemented by free programs at the Nasher Museum.
