## **Upstairs Artspace in Tryon, NC, Reopens With Two New Exhibits**

The Upstairs Artspace in Tryon, NC, reopens with two new exhibitions including: Jane Allen Nodine: Reflections in The Age of Pandemic and Still Life: Contemporary Interpretations, both on view through Aug. 7, 2020. Due to the ongoing presence of Covid-19, there will not be a public reception. However, a virtual tour of Nodine's work will be on the website, along with a virtual Q and A on the topic of Still Life on Facebook live later in July.

Jane Allen Nodine started making art last March in response to the pandemic when states ordered people to stay home and businesses to close. "It was a way to cope, to express fear of the virus, and eventually, to celebrate the hopes of life and a future," she explains. The achievement of her concentrated effort is amazing - nearly 30 works. Some paintings depict a layer of shriveled texture that is overtaken by rich colors seeping up and around to drown out the negative. Nodine's message: "We will prevail!"


A resident of Spartanburg, SC, Nodine is Gallery Director and Distinguished Professor Emerita at the USC-Upstate where she was head of the art program for over 20 years.

Prior to joining the University, she owned and operated Jane Nodine Hardwear, a full-service jewelry design and manufacturing company. She has worked in a variety of media throughout her career and she exhibits widely in the US and Europe. Recognized with numerous awards, Nodine received an NEA/SECCA Southeastern Seven IV Fellowship from the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art and two South Carolina Arts Commission Artist Fellowships. In 2012, she received the Award for Outstanding Artistic Achievement by the Southeastern College Art Conference and in 2002 she as awarded a Belle W. Baruch Visiting Scholar Fellowship to Hobcaw Barony Plantation in Georgetown, SC.

Nodine's work is included in numerous collections including the Medical University of South Carolina, Equitable Life Assurance Society – NYC, Stadtsparkasse Bank – Germany, and multiple works in the South Carolina State Art Collection. Her career spans several decades and in 1999 she was selected by the South Carolina State Museum and the South Carolina Arts Commission as one of the One Hundred Most Significant Artists in South Page 16 - Carolina Arts, July 2020

The exhibition, Still Life, offers expanded interpretations of an art genre that dates back to the Middle Ages, even earlier. Many of the show's artists enjoy turning heads by creating outside the box! Each of the artists has exhibited previously at the Upstairs; each is well established and highly praised by private collectors and institutions alike.

Founded in 1978, Upstairs Artspace is Tryon's oldest fine art gallery and is operated by its a Board of Directors, members, and volunteers. It exhibits 10 to 15 shows annually that are generally conceived around themes or genres.


