Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, Extends Exhibition by Adrian Rhodes

Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, has extended the exhibition, Adrian Rhodes: Blood and Honey, on view in the University Place Gallery, in downtown Florence, through Aug. 28, 2020.

Rhodes is a Hartsville, SC, native with an MFA in painting and printmaking from Winthrop University. Her work was recently featured at the Mint Museum of Art in Charlotte, NC. Her large scale printmaking and painting works are routinely incorporated into sculptural and site-specific installation presentations which transform the gallery spaces they inhabit.

The symbolic and visceral works included in Blood and Honey rely on the repetitive images of bees, pomegranates, and constellations.

Rhodes is a painter, printmaker, and installation artist who transforms gallery spaces into new realities, rich with symbolic imagery and her bold design aesthetic. Themes of bees, the human condition, the matrilineal, the corporeal, and mortality find themselves looping out of paper trails and attached to walls in swarms of winged creatures made of paper.

Rhodes offers the following artist statement: "I inhabit a space between fully site-specific installation and a traditional understanding of individual pieces in a gallery setting. Each piece in my exhibition is a statement within a larger con-

versation, which isolates an aspect of the dialogue, examines it, and places it within the context of other works in the space. Coming from a strong background of collage, I bring the same approach of layering images to my work's presentation. I look for ways to connect works as I repeat themes. As a medium based in creation of the multiple, print becomes a method for creating structure. This framework, indulging a desire for order, creates space for disruptions."

"Using prints as modular components allows the work to inherit visual information across pieces," continues Rhodes. "Pulling on the iconography of symbols and objects I examine how my process reflects the recalibration inherent in the search for a 'new normal' as life shifts. As I work, I attempt to frame a question - How can we hold extremes of bitter and sweet - forces which stand in such opposition they should not be able to coexist, and yet they do - so how do we find the balance of them?

Choosing from the different processes the artists use such as sculpture, ceramics, photography, acrylic/oil painting, ink drawing, and mixed media was honestly really fun. I took this process to heart and congratulate those who made it in the show because it was a strong field of submitted work. I'm excited to see the exhibit in person soon."
