The fact that August, the peak heat of the Summer is as good as May, is a good sign. So, I hope everything, as far as page numbers go, might be uphill from now on for us. At least I hope they are. Our numbers are tied to the Pandemic, just like everything is. If the Pandemic gets worse, that's bad for us. If the Pandemic numbers go down, our page numbers should go up.

More art venues are opening up, if only on a limited basis, but that should get better as long as people use common sense - by wearing masks (which is required by both States) and practice social distancing which shouldn't be that hard. Galleries and art museums are not usually that crowed without the free food, free drinks and party atmosphere of a reception. And currently receptions are out and replaced by some commercial galleries with all day drop-ins. The all day drop-ins make more sense by spreading the visitors throughout the day.

The next issue, September, will tell us more of where things are going depending on what the colleges and universities decide to do - open or stay closed. A lot of exhibits we tell you about are held at colleges or university art venues. Normally, even during the Summer months, some of them still show art - some have the same work on their walls that they put there at the beginning of the year, but not many people got to see them. Some exhibits went up and the doors closed and then after a period of time, had to come down and head off to some other venue, as they were traveling exhibits. They passed us like ships in the night unseen. That's too bad. But, as people who have no explanation for what's happening
