Summer is Over - Except for the Heat & Hurricanes

Yes, officially Summer is over. Children and teens are back in school - some have even gone off to college or university or returned, but the Summer heat will still be with many of us in the Carolinas and the threat of a visiting hurricane hangs over our heads for a few more months. As if we could take any more rain.

The end of Summer also marks the return of many non-profits and academic groups who offer art exhibitions in the Carolinas. There is no real "season" when it comes to the visual arts, but things do slow down some during the heat of Summer and cool of Winter. Most of us commercial folks have to keep on trucking as the rent or mortgage just keeps coming.

So we officially welcome back those who have the luxury of taking the Summer off. In other words - get back to work, the deadline is still the 24th of the month prior to when your exhibit starts.

Jones-Carter Gallery Brings Works by Pee Dee Native Son to Lake City, SC

In our continuing effort to show you that big things are happening in the Pee Dee area of South Carolina we bring you news of a major exhibition of works by Florence, SC, native William H. Johnson (1901-1970), coming to the Jones-Carter Gallery in Lake City, SC, beginning this month

William H. Johnson: An American Modern will be on view at the Jones-Carter Gallery, a branch of the Community Museum Society, Inc., in Lake City, from Sept. 21 through Dec. 29, 2013. The Jones-Carter Gallery is the only South Carolina venue on the tour.

The exhibition was developed by Morgan State University and the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES). The exhibition is made possible through the generous support of the National Endowment for the Arts, the Henry Luce Foundation and Morgan State University Foundation Inc. Additional support is provided by Ford Motor Company Fund.

Works by Johnson are no stranger to the Pee Dee area since the Florence Museum has been committed to preserving the legacy of William H. Johnson's life and work through collections, exhibitions, research and educational programs. Their permanent collection currently includes five works by Johnson: two works on paper and three oil paintings, each representing distinct periods of the artist's development. But now that the Florence Museum has closed in preparation for its move into its new facility in early 2014 - this exhibit in Lake City is a major event for those who want to see works by this 20th century African-American artist.

And the news gets even better as we can announce that the Jones-Carter Gallery will have new hours when this exhibition opens. The gallery will now be open Tue. through Fri., from 10am to 6pm and Sat., from 11am to 5pm. So now many of us working class folks can make a weekend visit to Lake City to see this exhibit and many more cultural events being offered in the Pee Dee.

Not many cities the size of Lake City can boast having a facility that can satisfy the environmental and security requirements of a SITES exhibition. But, now Lake City can and that will mean a lot when it comes to the type of exhibits the Jones-Carter Gallery can present in the future.

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Facebook Revisited

After my pep talk on Social Networking last month - I have some good news and some bad news. Bad news first.

I guess my opinion on how valuable sharing posts on Facebook was lost on some, as our post that our August issue was ready to be downloaded received less shares than we got in July. (76 in July - 65 in August). And when we made individual posts about items that could be found in that issue - many of the folks we highlighted didn't even share the post about themselves. I'm keeping a mental list about those folks.

People - you have to share posts made about you or your events on other Facebook pages. It's not bragging - it's showing your followers that you're doing something that is getting attention on other pages. Get with the program.

OK - the good news is, and there is lots of it - more than the bad - that the post that our August issue was ready to be downloaded got 50 likes (40 in July), had 11 comments (5 in July), attracted 4,798 total views (4,408 in July), and brought in 121 new page likes (1416 at this writing and 1295 at the end of July). That's as many page likes that the Mint Museum's Facebook pages have. But still smaller than many other publications. We want more page likes.

And, we went over 122,000 downloads of the August issue compared to 76,000 in the same month in 2012. In the next two months those numbers will sky-rocket as the paper grows in pages and articles about exhibits taking place in the Carolinas as more publicity folks wake up from their Summer naps. More articles means more pages and more pages mean more downloads as the paper contains more info about more artists and exhibits.


The Numbers Game

What they can't tell me is if the person who downloaded a copy to their desktop,

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


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Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Features Civil War Photographs

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, will present *Photography and the American Civil War*, on view from Sept. 27 through Jan. 5, 2014.

Organized by The Metropolitan Museum of Art, this landmark exhibition brings together more than 200 of the finest and most poignant photographs of the American Civil War. Through examples drawn from The Metropolitan's celebrated holdings, complemented by important loans from public and private collections, the exhibition will examine the evolving role of the camera during the nation's bloodiest war. The "War between the States" was the great test of the young Republic's commitment to its founding precepts; it was also a watershed in photographic history. The camera recorded from beginning to end the heartbreaking narrative of the epic four -year war (1861–1865) in which 750,000 lives were lost.

Photography and the American Civil War features both familiar and rarely seen images that include haunting battlefield landscapes strewn with bodies, studio portraits of armed Confederate and Union soldiers preparing to meet their destiny, rare multi-panel panoramas of Gettysburg

and Richmond, and languorous camp scenes showing exhausted troops in repose. Also included are diagnostic medical studies of wounded soldiers who survived the war's last bloody battles and portraits of both Abraham Lincoln and his assassin, John Wilkes Booth.

"We are thrilled to bring this exhibition to Charleston, the very city where the Civil War began," says Curator of Exhibitions Pam Wall. "These photographs tell a powerful story of our nation's greatest struggle, and the fascinating intersection between history and photography during this time period."

At the start of the Civil War, the nation's photography galleries were overflowing with a variety of photographs of all kinds and sizes, many examples of which will be featured in the exhibition: portraits made on thin sheets of copper (daguerreotypes), glass (ambrotypes), or iron (tintypes), and larger, "paintingsized" likenesses on paper, often embellished with India ink, watercolor, and oils. The exhibition features groundbreaking works by Mathew B. Brady, George N. Barnard, Alexander Gardner, and Timothy O'Sullivan, among many others. One such example is Ruins in Charleston, South Carolina by George N. Barnard from 1865. This image depicting a scene of the devastated buildings along King Street is a particularly important photograph highlighting the artistic sensibilities of Barnard's documentary work. The images of the loss, death, and destruction of the South contain moral lessons about war, heroism, and slavery.

Approximately 1,000 photographers worked separately and in teams to produce hundreds of thousands of photographs - portraits and views - that were actively collected during the period (and over the past century and a half) by Americans of all ages and social classes. In a direct

expression of the nation's changing vision of itself, the camera documented the war and also mediated it by memorializing the events of the battlefield as well as the consequent toll on the home front.

City of North Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Baird Hoffmire

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to present Images From a Restless Mind, featuring works by local artist Baird Hoffmire, on view in the display windows of The Meeting Place, from Sept. 3 through Oct. 31, 2013. A reception will be held on Sept. 6, from 6-8pm.

As an animator and illustrator, it is no surprise that Hoffmire is heavily influenced and inspired by myth and various forms of storytelling. In the exhibit he offers a collection of "stories" told in his bold, distinctive style through acrylic and mixed media. Ranging from the humorous to the disturbing, Hoffmire's work combines elements of memory, emotion, and old family photos with comic books, pop culture, and current events.

"I'm inspired by how social commentary and observations about the world can be coded into symbols in obvious and subtle ways," Hoffmire says, "By attempting to balance wit and humor with sensitive subject matter, I hope to weave a narrative that is accessible and evocative to the viewer."

Hoffmire received a BFA in Illustration from Western Carolina University in 1993 and a BFA in Media Arts and Animation from the Art Institute of Atlanta in 2002.




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
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
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Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Joseph Burwell and Herb Parker

The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art at the College of Charleston School of the Arts in Charleston, SC, kicked off its fall season with exhibitions featuring two internationally recognized artists; *Joseph* Burwell and Herb Parker. Entitled Joseph Burwell: School of the Viking Spaniard Revisited and Herb Parker: Studio Practice the exhibitions examine the relationship between the studio and the work produced within. College of Charleston sculpture professor Herb Parker and alum Joseph Burwell will recreate their studio spaces within the Halsey Institute's galleries. The exhibitions will be on view at through Oct. 5, 2013. An Artist Talk with Herb Parker will be offered on Sept. 26, beginning at 6pm in Rm. 309 of the Simons Center for the Arts

The stereotypical image of the artist's studio as a paint-splattered, sparsely furnished garret where the lone artist toils away producing their brilliant works is in much need of re-examination. Many artists' studios are a far cry from this description, and serve very different functions for their inhabitants. This exhibition will examine the relationship between the studio and the work produced within it by two contemporary artists who will recreate their studio spaces within the Halsey Institute's galleries.



Works by Herb Parker

Herb Parker is best known for his large-scale, site-specific nature-based installations around the world. Yet, he has an equally interesting body of works created, often, using found objects as a point of departure, and displayed within his studio.

Joseph Burwell's singular vision offers a world engineered by a network of realms and technologies, meticulously constructed and superimposed. The effect of architecture and space onto the psychology and emotions of the viewer is pivotal to the artist's work. His drawings on wood are blueprints for modular structures inspired by ancient sacrificial sites, modernist habitats and medieval fortifications. His studio contains elements referencing the structures found in his intricate works.

Parker is a sculptor and possibly South Carolina's most prominent site-specific landscape artist. The College of Charleston art professor since 1991, a native of Elizabeth City, NC, has participated in over 50 site-specific interactions in the landscape since the early 1980s. Parker has created public works at botanical gardens, a centuries old Japanese temple, urban centers, universities, rural land-

scapes and museums around the world. In addition to fifteen states, he has worked in Sweden, Japan, Italy and Canada.

Parker's South Carolina site works include those at the State Museum in Columbia, the Waterfront Park in Charleston, Chandler Creek Elementary School in Greer and the SC Botanical Garden in Clemson. In 1999, Parker was included in 100 Years/100 Artists: Views of the 20th Century in South Carolina Art at the SC State Museum. His work also is in Threshold: Expressions of Art & Spiritual Life, a SC Arts Commission exhibition of art from the Southeast that has been traveling since 2004. Parker has been represented in two SC Triennials and in exhibitions in more than a dozen states. The former US Marine and Peace Corps volunteer holds a BFA and an MFA from East Carolina University in North Carolina and has studied in Italy through the University of Georgia.

Born in Iceland in 1970 and raised in southwestern Virginia, Joseph Burwell began to study Architecture at Savannah College of Art and Design, but changed his major to Studio Arts and received his bachelors degree at the College of Charleston in 1993. He received his MFA in Sculpture from Tulane University in 1999 and moved to New York in 2000. Since, Burwell has exhibited in New York, Switzerland, Finland, Norway, Ireland, Egypt, Canada, South Korea, and many venues across the US. He is a 2011 New York Foundation for the Arts Fellow (Printmaking/Drawing /Artists Books).

Central to the exhibit will be a model

of a Barbadian chattel house, constructed in participation with the American College of the Building Arts. Chattel houses, designed to be moved, allowed itinerant workers to relocate between different plantations and farms on Barbados according to the seasonal need, availability of work, or even if a dispute with their employer warranted it. Traditionally made of wood and assembled without nails, a chattel house could be folded in upon itself and then carted to its next destination.

The City Gallery at Waterfront Park, owned by the City of Charleston and

operated by the City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs, is a tangible resource and reliable venue for displaying the finest contemporary art from local, regional, national and international artists, stimulating discussion and dialogue among audiences. don W. Bailey, "Fashioned his uniquelystyled personal portraits and tributes with evangelical enthusiasm, blending ancestral Gullah lore and his devout Baptist faith into a rich multicultural impasto."

In the 1960s, Doyle's outdoor history lesson evolved into the "St. Helena Out Door Art Gallery." The artist filled his property with portraits of people important to his community, such as Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King Jr., First Black Midwife, Penn Drummer and many more icons. Local personalities, like Food Stamp, He/She, Mr. Fool, Mrs. Fool, and root doctors were included. He also created two important series: "Penn" (school) which paid tribute to people associated with the historic center and "First" (achievements) which commemorated special events such as the first football game played on St. Helena Island.

In 1982 the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, DC. selected Doyle to be a part of the seminal exhibition Black Folk Art in America 1930–1980. His work is now highly sought after and his achievement is celebrated by his community.

On Sunday, Sept. 22, from 2-5pm, ARTworks offers an exclusive opening reception. Special guests will share their first hand stories of the folk artist, Victoria Smalls will present an informative talk, and everyone will enjoy a buffet at the "Wellcome Table," inspired by one of the artist's paintings. 


Sam Doyle's "Penn Drummer" 37.5 x 24 inches, house paint on tin, Collection of Gordon W. Bailey

In 1988, much of downtown Asheville, NC, was boarded up, with most of the rest rundown and dreary. Smart people shook their heads: who but crazy artists would start a business - an art gallery, of all things! - in a dead downtown?

Even so, the Asheville Gallery of Art (AGA) opened its doors on Nov. 1, 1988. AGA, Asheville's longest-established downtown art gallery, will mark its 25th anniversary in 2013; and, today, business owners lust for locations like AGA's.

The late Jim Morgan was the main force behind the enterprise. He and 30 other original members formulated a plan they thought could assure survival if not immediate success.

"We were artists. We were optimistic. We knew nothing about business. If we had, AGA would probably never have happened," said Cathy Searle, the one

original member still on the gallery roster. As a founding member of The Asheville Gallery of Art, she has lent her energy to the explosion of the Asheville area art scene. The gallery gained prominence over the years, and some of Asheville's most celebrated artists have been on view there by juried invitation. Searle and her work have been chosen to be the face of the gallery in celebration of the Gallery's twenty-fifth year.

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From the beginning, AGA has been unique, important, and successful because of its commitment to Asheville area professional artists. With top-quality two-dimensional original art as the gallery's sole focus, membership is coveted for miles around. Each of the gallery's 28 artists applies his or her own distinctive vision, concept, and way of working, to provide a diversity of work sure to tantalize every discerning taste.





Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center in Asheville, NC, will present Shaping Craft + Design at Black Mountain College, on view from Sept. 6 through Jan. 4, 2014.

The exhibition will focus on craft and design at Black Mountain College. This thematic focus will be achieved through an annual conference, now in its 5th year, along with an exhibition, catalogue and related educational programming. Shaping Craft + Design at Black Mountain College is designed to inspire new ways of thinking about the role and impact of Black Mountain College on developing craft and design movements in America and internationally. The conference, to be held Oct. 11-13, 2013 coincides with American Craft Week.

The exhibition will include ceramics, textiles, furniture, printed material, sculp-

ture, paintings and ephemera created by students and faculty during and after Black Mountain College, the short-lived, legendary college in existence from 1933-1957. 

Self-examination can make the difference between life and death. James beautifully delivers this message to us in this exhibition."

"Early detection is essential to beating all cancers," says Lalumondier. "This has been an issue for some people as it may be uncomfortable. I focused on these self-exams, as it would in turn require my focus on hands. There lies my discomfort,

hence, a metaphoric connection. I used student quality materials as it connects me to my students. This is to honor those students, current and past, as they feed my daily creativity. Elementary art students are the best of critics, and their work directly influences my work. I wish I could create with the freedom of a child."

"As the body ages, over time these images will age as well," adds Lalumondier. "Oil pastels require much time to dry (some say never), and shellac spray will very slowly yellow and subtly crack. All of the paintings will have an acrylic under painting with a drawing created with charcoal, oil pastel and conte' crayon and will be on 16" x 20" canvases.

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
tablet, or phone actually looked at it. They can't tell me if they just looked at their ad or article about them or their gallery. They can't tell me if they just looked at the events taking place in their hometown or area. They can't even tell me if most of them downloaded the paper to just see what I've said in this commentary.

The point is, plain numbers don't always tell us the full story of what they really mean. And, press releases about economic impact reports by the arts or art events don't come close to telling the whole story either.


The SC Arts Commission is trying to sell us a new study that says that the creative enterprise in the state (SC) engenders a core impact of \$9.2 billion and 78,682 jobs and a full impact of \$13.3 billion and 107,614 jobs.

If that was so, why don't we just double our spending on these creative enterprises and create another 78,000 jobs in SC? I guess the trick is the study doesn't tell us what that would cost us. It also doesn't tell us if Clemson and USC played football every weekend that those games would generate at \$30 billion impact for less investment. There is so much impact studies don't tell us.



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



Greenville Technical College in Taylors and Greenville, SC, Features Works by Jane Nodine

Greenville Technical College in Greer and Greenville, SC, will present a single exhibition, *Jane Nodine - Thermal Response*, on view at two locations: RIVERWORKS Gallery in downtown Greenville and in the Visual and the Performing Arts Department galleries on the Greer Campus. The exhibit will be on view in each location from Sept. 6 through Oct. 13, 2013. A reception will be held at RIVERWORKS on Sept. 6, from 6-9pm and at the Greer Campus Galleries on Sept. 19, beginning at 4:30pm.

Jane Nodine's encaustic paintings in *Thermal Response* ebb and flow through conventional descriptions of painting and relief sculpture just as the encaustic medium itself flows onto and across her surfaces. Nodine, in the tradition of ancient Egyptian mummy paintings, utilizes heat, beeswax, and contemporary technology to fossilize memories and traces of thoughts. Like amber, *Thermal Response* reverently preserves a single moment, image, thought.

Nodine both constructs and excavates as she composes. She often begins with metal pieces that over time and with moisture leave an iron oxide print or photogram on the initial surface. Then she layers beeswax laced with resin on top utilizing a torch to shape the flow. These layers can be carved, scratched and then topped with more layers of encaustic concluding with a final polish. The surfaces of *Thermal Response* remember their viscous beginnings and invite us to reverse the process and excavate the layers retracing the marks, the flow.

Jane Allen Nodine is Assistant Chair of Fine Arts and Communication Studies at the University of South Carolina Upstate and director of the Curtis R. Harley Gallery. Prior to joining the University, she owned and operated Jane Nodine Hardwear, a full-service jewelry design and manufacturing company. Nodine's work is included in numerous collections including the Medical

University of South Carolina, Equitable Life Assurance Society, Stadtsparkasse Bank-Germany, and the South Carolina State Art Collection.

Nodine's career spans several decades, and in 1999, she was selected by the South Carolina State Museum and the South Carolina Arts Commission as one of the One Hundred Most Significant Artists in South Carolina During the 20th Century.

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

her MA and MFA in painting and drawing from the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

Regula will be exhibiting new works made by using various mixed media techniques. The works are three-dimensional relief wall hangings and free standing sculptures. From earliest memory she has always liked to make things by mixing many materials together. Over the past several years she has explored many new ways to use polymer clay. Not satisfied with traditional methods of working with this clay, she has developed techniques which allow her to incorporated other materials into the works of clay. Other materials may be string, metal, wood, glass etc. The works then become "canvases" on which she paints.

Regula states, "As I work with the clay, I allow the clay to show me in which direction it wants to go. I may start off with an idea or a sketch of what I want to accomplish but in the end, it is always about the clay and how the other materials added to the clay want to travel together. When their 'journey' together gets to an end, it is up to me to become a painter and travel with them to complete the piece."

Prater will be exhibiting new encaustic wax paintings. She says of her work; "I have always enjoyed discovering and exploring new media. Over the past five years I have explored the encaustic wax method of painting and enjoy its ability to create ethereal visual effects through its transparency and layering process."

In addition to direct painting Prater experiments with a variety of photography, collage, and transfer methods within the encaustic wax. Her newest work explores

the inclusion of oil medium within the layers of wax. Linear elements are created through incisions and scratches on the soft surface in which oil is captured.

"Visually the new works are meant to be playful dream-like worlds in which birds, boats, ladders, and horses are the methods in which to move from one place to another. My work explores the concept that our entire life is nothing but a constant journey," says Prater.

Furman University in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Peter Wexler

Furman University in Greenville, SC, is presenting *Creating a Digital Museum:* The Art and Theatre Work of Peter Wexler, featuring works by this renowned New York theatre designer, producer, painter, sculptor and photographer, on view in the Thompson Gallery of Furman University's Roe Art Building, through Oct. 5, 2013.

The exhibition is the product of an ambitious large-scale project involving the digitization of Wexler's professional art and design work by the Digital Collections Center of Furman's James B. Duke Library. The digitization project is made possible through a donation from Furman University trustee Todd Ruppert and his wife, Karen.

The exhibition centers around Wexler's work on the grand opera "Les Troyens" ("The Trojans") by Hector Berlioz and performed by the New York Metropolitan Opera in 1973. The opera depicts the ill-fated love affair between Aeneas and Dido and how the fall of Troy portended the birth of Rome.

Wexler assisted with the production concepts for "Les Troyens" and was responsible for set design, costume design, special effects, and film direction. As such, the exhibit materials include his costume design sketches, 3-D scale models of the set pieces, paint elevations, a Trojan helmet, and sculpture inspired by "Les Troyens." These physical pieces will be shown along with their digital counterparts displayed on a large flat-panel TV.

Rick Jones, manager of the library's Digital Collections Center, is leading a team of students who are photographing, scanning and editing more than 6,000 pieces of Wexler's art spanning more than 50 years. The materials are related to opera, theatre and concerts developed for clients such as the New York Philharmonic, the Metropolitan Opera, and the Boston Pops. Among the items in Wexler's collection are 3-D scale models of sets, costume design sketches, paint elevations, sculptures, photographs, 35mm slides, drawings, paintings, posters, documents and other ancillary materials.

Wexler loaned these items from his

New York studio to the Digital Collections Center which is converting materials to digital format using high-quality digital cameras and flatbed scanners. The exhibition is a powerful sharing of Lauren Hill's observations of families who have or have had members serving in the US. Military. As we enter the month of September, the searing memories of 911 flood our minds and hearts, and we think of those near and dear that have sacrificed lives, bodies, time and families, so our freedom is secured. It is a great honor to share with our community this exhibit that calls us all to offer thanks to our service men and women daily, as we are encouraged by this beautiful artist and her incredible art work, to "Never Forget".

Hill describes her exhibit with honesty: "I don't have any family in the military. But that doesn't matter. I don't always agree with our country's political agenda. But that doesn't matter either. I have watched families' hearts break. I have felt the sting of worry with every released war torn story that ticks across the evening news... waited and wondered if a phone call would come tomorrow. Watched mothers crumble to their knees as they're told their baby is not coming home. I have met widows and widowers who were met by Class A's at the door. I've seen a body torn apart by shrapnel, leaving wounds for a lifetime, and heard the story of how he lived and his best friend died. I've seen a man broken to the point where he no longer knows who he used to be, but only the soldier he has become."
"That is what matters," adds Hill. "And

"That is what matters," adds Hill. "And it should to so many Americans who enjoy the freedoms these war torn men and women have afforded them."

"Most of the touching things I've experienced were not said with words. It was in the gaze between two soldiers, two brothers, whom would lay down their life for the other that I was most inspired. The things they couldn't bear to talk about, expressed in a look or a pat on the back that no civilian could understand. Things they'd seen together that would never be spoken of. A nightmare of a world you and I will never see, tucked behind a brave face and a strong heart, hidden where only those who go looking can see."

"There in the shadows of life experience and heartbreak, I found my inspiration. I found a scene that the world needed to see. And so I began my journey through paintings of the soldier that you don't see

on the evening news: the men and women who are known only by their family and friends, and to a stranger only a faceless weapon. I want to create a conversation about these selfless individuals who often aren't even thanked... because you and I wouldn't last a minute in most of their shoes. And we live peaceably in ours because of them," say Hill.

Hill was born in 1988 in Knoxville, TN. At a young age she began moving frequently with her family across much of the eastern United States. Despite the various moves, one thing remained constant: Hill loved creating art and was intent on learning to capture a person's likeness.

In 2006, Hill began attending Savannah College of Art and Design to major in painting. There she enjoyed working primarily realistically in oils. Through exploration of technique, she began experimenting with layered images, multiples of figures, and the concepts of time and movement across a two dimensional plane. Lauren was fascinated with capturing a moment in time and the memories that surround it. She graduated in the top of her class from SCAD in May 2010 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Painting. Hill works both in Charlotte, NC and the Upstate of SC.

Hill continues to depict the human condition and is inspired by the emotion that art can bring. "My paintings demonstrate my desire to capture the time, form, and movement of an individual's life. I not only want to depict the human condition, but to also unpack moments of a person's life across a two dimensional plane. My work explores what the eye sees in a matter of seconds, slowing an action down, wrapping it around the body, and capturing it at various rates and resolutions."

"Time seems to pass at a constant rate, though we sometimes experience it continued on Page 31

in flashes of unregistered activity and at other moments, time seems tied to memories that may last a lifetime," adds Hill. "The notion of being caught in a moment that transcends time has always intrigued me. This, along with the idea of a defining moment of an action that one's brain catalogs as a visual memory are ideas I enjoy exploring. Layered imagery and figures, and multiple images lend themselves to the depiction of a moment to be unwrapped by the viewer."

"Ambiguous spaces lacking in pictorial depth offer a compressed time and area in which the figure is allowed to move. It

closes off the action from any definable space and from the continuation of time preceding and following it. The actions I choose to depict range from iconic imageinspired poses to everyday encounters with people who may not relate to the viewer in quite the same way. The viewer can either be fixed in place while the figures move, or the figures may be fixed in place while the viewer takes on multiple viewpoints," says Hill.

Clinton College in Rock Hill, SC, will present Korogocho: Photography, Painting, & Mixed Media Work by Jim Stratakos, on view in the Harry & Rebecca Dalton Gallery, from Sept. 1 through Dec. 6, 2013. A gallery talk and reception will be held on Oct. 29, from 6:30-8pm.

Award winning photo-journalist Jim Stratakos offers an intimate look at Korogocho, a massive slum in Nairobi, Kenya. A Swahili word for 'shoulderto-shoulder', Korogocho is home to thousands of orphans of AIDs-afflicted parents. Stratakos traveled to Korogocho in 2006 and 2011 to document the work of the Kenya Orphanage Project and to assist raising money to establish a children's

The crux of the exhibition includes forty-eight photographs taken by Stratakos while escorted by armed guards within the dangerous, barbed-wire compound that has no running water and is spilling over with abject poverty. In conjunction with

the photographic narrative of the exhibition are several large abstract and mixed media paintings. The paintings evoke a sense of the artist's anguish in digesting humanity's shortcomings and the perceptible sadness captured by his camera.

The mixed media component of Stratakos' work echoes the tactile, physical realm of the slum with its haphazard shelters constructed from found scrap metal and indigenous materials. Stratakos uses

"Using the subject of armor, I create the typically metal form of sculpted chest plates with clay," adds Birkner. "We are protected only to a certain extent as the fragility of the ceramic piece suggests. Growing up in the south, there were expectations about what I was supposed to accomplish as a successful woman. 'I should be nice' is the first rule of southern charm school. Being sexy or skinny is dictated by the social media and advertising for women as a goal for success. Balance is brought into question as the goal is sometimes pushed too far, to the point of illness or bizarre surgeries. The reaction to the word 'should' is explored

Jacqueline Dunford's floor to ceiling installation of 700 hand-folded, encausticized origami cranes ranging from 2" to 20" mimic human growth. Four ceramic crane sculptures with words carved into them represent the characteristics and values one is born with or taught. A selection of her ceramic shoe sculptures is also displayed.

Dunford offers the following artist statement: "My inspirations come from life events, college courses, nature, and movies as evident in a series of ceramic shoe sculptures fashioned after leaves, bark, grapevines and a black feather covered ballet slipper form. A developmental psychology class inspired the room-size installation piece of 700 origami cranes,

while living on Lake Wylie inspired a series of encaustic paintings of the lake. I am an experimenter and have a passion for tools, making many of my own stamps that I use for my equal loves of encaustic and clay. My works span a variety of scale and I strive to create art that tells a story."

"I am past-president of the Gaston County Art Guild and an initial organizer/ consultant/designer of the development of the Arts on Main Art Center located in downtown Gastonia. I now serve on the GCAG Board of Directors and produce art from my studio, Hummingbird Farm Ceramics in Belmont, NC."



Kennedy offered the following artist's statement: "Visiting Arnaldo Pomodoro's ('Il Grande Disco' in center city Charlotte) studio in Milan, Italy gave me valuable experience for producing bronzes through the Lost Wax process. Inspiration came from memorable experiences and an interest in symbolism. I warmed and worked the dark reddish-brown wax with my hands infusing important influences in my life into my creations. I then traveled to a foundry where they were cast in bronze by the lost wax process. The surface reflects an element of the original wax material created by melting the wax with hot metal. I sculpted A Climber's Grasp in Carrara marble with chisels. sanding screen and sandpaper until I gave it a final polish. It represents relationships juxtaposed of climber, rope and mountain and relays how a climber becomes a part of the mountain, symbolized as the arm and hands, rope are of marble. The arms and hands of are the smoothest surface. My climbing rope, only partially sculpted, remains rough to signify the connection of climber to mountain. The remainder is as it was quarried from the mountain in Carrara."

"After a career in Commercial Art, I have a studio at Arts on Main in Gastonia where I create figurative works and landscapes en plein and serve as Program Chair and member of Gaston County Art Guild," adds Kennedy. "I am Program Chair of Matthews Artists Guild and slated for V.P., member of Piedmont Pastel Society who will host the 2014 NC Statewide Pastel Exhibition for which I am Co-chairman of Awards."







When I moved to North Carolina in 2006 with my husband and our two boys, I joined The Sawtooth School for Visual Arts in Winston-Salem, where I took advanced pottery classes and instructed basic handbuilding and wheel throwing classes for a group of visually impaired adults at Industries for the Blind," says Rodríguez-Pardy.

"I have since been teaching workshops on the 'Tree of Life', a traditional Mexican sculpture, but with my own interpretation and style. I find great satisfaction in telling stories and encouraging others to





tell their own stories through this medium. I have participated in the Artist in School program from Artquest and GreenHill for the last two years and was invited to participate at their 2010 Winter Show. I have also collaborated with the Hispanic Arts Initiative from Winston-Salem, NC, in several programs including a mask making workshop for The Arts Based Elementary School in 2011."

Rodríguez-Pardy adds, "In 2011, I cofounded, with the support of the United Arts Council, an initiative called Casa Azul to promote Latin American arts and culture in the Greensboro area. I worked as a Spanish interpreter for health and human services for the Hispanic community in the Triad for 4 years and now I am part of Wake Forest Baptist Health. Since 2008 have a studio at 205 Collaborative

Such incredible creatures and marvels await beneath its cerulean surface. I would like to reach out and capture the beauty and





wonder, securing it through my work."

"I work primarily in porcelain and glass," continues Douglas. The surface of the glass provides a luminosity that is incomparable to other surfaces I have experimented with, and captures glints of light as it shines across the surface. I seek to provide a visual tie between space and the ocean."

'My art is comprised of recollections from time spent at the coast as a child, as well as elements from the imagery I have researched and I wish to capture for the viewer. The play of light on the cracked surfaces of the glass shimmers, while abundant patterns and shapes harmonize,

representing the elements I find similar between the aquatic and cosmic environments that have influenced my art. Piece by piece I recollect the vivid memories of my experiences and my journey to discovery," says Douglas.

Julie Mixon is an image-based media artist who focuses on processes that merge analog and digital photography. Currently, she is an Assistant Professor of Photography at Francis Marion University.

Mixon began her studies in photography as an undergraduate at Barton College, in Wilson, NC, where she received a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts. In 2004, she received her Master of Fine Arts Degree with a concentration in photography from East Carolina University in Greenville, NC. Mixon's career in photo education began at Lenoir Community College, in Lenoir, NC, in 2004 where she taught as an Art Instructor for over seven years. Her photography courses emphasize traditional and digital darkroom techniques with an emphasis on the fusion of the two

"By definition empirical evidence is evidence based on observation and experience," says Mixon. "These evidences come from sources such as the senses, memory and testimony. This body of image based media compares the image making process to gathering empirical evidence. In this case, the images are evidence of how I experience my nearby environment, particularly the home, family and the objects connected to them that are both man made and organic."

"My process of image making is often the result of joining symbolic objects together with images made of places and people of my day to day experience. These elements come together to form a personal narrative based on a memory or mere appreciation for formal (line, shape, color, texture, light) aspects."

"Many images from this series are placed in groups of two of three," adds Mixon. "Placing images together, whether

related or random, allows the viewer to make their own narrative connections between the images. Even though the images represent personal memories of places and people, the viewer can still be connected to them by filling in the gaps. When we see something non-distinct, whether it be an abstract work of art or a patch of clouds, it is our natural desire to want to see something concrete. The process of layering beeswax over the surface of the already apparently fading image lends itself to how memories exist, sometimes futile, sometimes clear, and more often than not, incomplete."

"Collectively, my work centers around symbolic objects, the spaces these objects inhabit and the people connected to them. Most often these spaces and objects are re-contextualized by taking them out of their original environment and rebuilding a new space for them to inhabit. I have always been drawn to natural objects but have never really been drawn to photographing them in their original environment. The act of collecting things from nature and joining them with other elements such as papers or found objects has been a fascination and a practice since childhood. My childhood practice of this process included finding leaves and flowers and gluing them to a piece of paper to make a formal design. This practice resurfaced, but has grown to utilize a flatbed scanner, various cameras and Photoshop,"

Coker College in Hartsville, SC, Features Works by JinMan Jo and John Chang

Coker College in Hartsville, SC, is presenting several new exhibits in the Cecelia Coker Bell Gallery, in the Gladys C. Fort Art Building, including: an exhibition of sculpture by South Korean artist, JinMan Jo, on view through Sept. 20, 2013, with a gallery talk on Sept. 20, at 3pm, and featuring mixed media paintings by John Chang, on view from Sept. 23 through Oct. 18, 2013, with a reception on Sept. 23, at 7pm.

On a personal level, JinMan Jo finds our society's increasing focus on electronic media and consumerism disturbing. As relationships between people become electronically diluted, and consumer goods ever more short lived, he looks for symbols of strength in his sculpture. He works primarily in durable materials like stone, steel, and wood. Durable though they may be, he welds, wires, and cements these materials in ways that visually reinforce their durability. His sculptures appear ready to resist any assault and offer counterbalance to the ephemeral aspects of contemporary civilization:

"Thick steel bends during forging and hammering, thin wires are welded together, and weak things overlap and connect with each other to become strong. Each element makes an undeniable contribution to the whole. I want these substances to individually represent the required strength that is needed to withstand

greater forces of nature," say Jo.

Originally from South Korea, JinMan Jo received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in sculpture from the University of Seoul in Seoul, Korea, in 1999. He earned a Master of Arts and Master of Fine Arts degrees from the University of Iowa in 2002 and 2003.

Jo's work has been exhibited in solo shows in the United States and Korea as well as numerous group exhibitions. His work is included in the collections of the Gail Art Museum in GaPyon, Korea; the Seosan Art Center, Seosan, Korea; the National Museum of Contemporary Art, Seoul, Korea; the Summit Street Gallery, Iowa City and the Utah State University College of Business in Logan, Utah. He has been honored twice with the Outstanding Achievement Award in Contemporary Sculpture by the International Sculpture Center. He currently teaches at the University of Wisconsin in Stevens Point.

John Chang's large calligraphic paintings combine the influence of America's Abstract Expressionist painters with the sacred nature of classical Chinese calligraphy. Chang notes, "Chinese students are conditioned to submit to authority, in part, through the rigorous requirement of learning to memorize and write several thousand characters flawlessly." At the same time, students were bombarded with those same characters in the form of propaganda, which during Chang's youth, were plastered to walls in China's public squares.

Chang adds, "In classical Chinese, the script or shu, is so sacred that it is believed to be capable of affecting change in the natural order of things." This use of the sacred shu for propaganda motivated Chang to "reclaim the energy of the written word." Perhaps surprisingly to some, he found inspiration for his use of energetic marks and collage in the paintings, collages, and prints of Western Abstract Expressionists, Franz Kline and Jackson Pollock and Pop artist, Robert Rauschenberg.

"My calligraphic strokes commingle with expressive brushwork and drips, and continued above on next column to the right

one I requested a copy of and read about the impact of the arts in SC - which left out of the press release that the majority of economic benefit came from the commercial side of the arts. The purpose of the report was to convince SC Legislators not to cut funding for the non-profits in SC - mainly the SC Arts Commission's budget.

But if most of the economic impact is generated by commercial sectors of the arts industry - why wouldn't government funding be best used funding projects in the commercial sector? And, when you factor in that the commercial sectors' impact is generated "without" government support, it really makes you wonder why those taxpayer dollars wouldn't be best used in supporting the sector that is most cost efficient and most effective as far a job creation?

Makes sense to me, but that's not what's happening.

There is a press release about a study that has been released on the economic impact of the new ArtFields event that takes place in Lake City, SC. It starts with the statement:

"ArtFields, the 10-day art festival in April, had a total economic impact of more than \$5 million on the area from visitors, construction jobs created and by event organizers and employees before and during the event." It also states, "... found an estimated 22,000 visitors visited the festival, spending an average of \$33."

I agree that ArtFields had an enormous economic impact on Lake City, but the press release doesn't tell us how much money was put in the pot to have this event and by whom.

Press releases about economic impact studies never tell the whole story. I'll be asking some questions about this study at my blog, *Carolina Arts Unleased* later this month. We'll take a look beyond the headlines and see what we find.

the freedom of such abstract artists allows me to explore Chinese characters in a personal, reinvigorated way - connecting to and balancing vital energy. He also studied with the well known Chinese artist, Xu Bing.

New Smithsonian Traveling Exhibit Featuring Major American Artist William H. Johnson to Open at Jones-Carter Gallery in Lake City, SC

A new exhibition from the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES) will feature rare paintings by Florence, South Carolina-native, William H. Johnson, from the collection of the James E. Lewis Museum at Morgan State University. An essential figure in modern American art, William H. Johnson (1901-1970) was a virtuoso skilled in various media and techniques, and produced thousands of works over a career that spanned decades, continents and genres.

William H. Johnson: An American Modern will be on view at the Jones-Carter Gallery, a branch of the Community Museum Society, Inc., in Lake City, SC, from Sept. 21 through Dec. 29, 2013. It will then finish its 10-city tour through July 2014. The Jones-Carter Gallery is the only South Carolina venue on the tour. Developed by Morgan State University and SITES, the exhibition is made possible through the generous support of the National Endowment for the Arts, the Henry Luce Foundation and Morgan State University Foundation Inc. Additional support is provided by Ford Motor Company Fund.

The pivotal stages of Johnson's career as a modernist painter are assembled in this group of rarely seen paintings. Every step of his artistic development is conveyed - from his post-impressionist and expressionist works of the 1920s, to vibrant vernacular paintings from the end of his career in the 1940s, in which Johnson articulated his distinctive, unforgettable vision as an American modern artist.

The paintings boast a remarkable history. In 1956 the Harmon Foundation, a nonprofit that helped foster awareness of African art from 1922 until its demise in 1967, took ownership of Johnson's own collection of art - saving it all from being destroyed. When the foundation had to shut its doors, they donated more than 1,000 works to the Smithsonian's National Collections of Fine Arts (now the Smithsonian American Art Museum). The terms of the agreement called for the Smithsonian to donate artworks to several black colleges and universities, including Morgan State University. The founding chair of Morgan's art department, James E. Lewis, was first to carefully select these works for his museum's permanent collection.

The exhibition is complemented by an illustrated companion book *William H. Johnson: An American Modern* (Uni-

versity of Washington Press, 2011) with essays by Richard J. Powell, Leslie King Hammond and others. The book features some of the world's premier scholars of Johnson and African American art history re-examining the artist and presenting him in new, fresh ways. The book will be available for purchase at the Jones-Carter Gallery during the exhibition.

Morgan State University, founded in 1867, is a Carnegie classified doctoral research institution offering more than 60 academic programs leading to bachelor's degrees as well as programs at the master's and doctoral levels. As Maryland's public urban university, Morgan serves a multiethnic and multiracial student body and seeks to ensure that the doors of higher education are opened as wide as possible to as many as possible. Brookgreen Gardens was founded by Archer and Anna Hyatt Huntington in 1931 and, today, is a National Historic Landmark and a display garden with the most extensive collection of figurative sculpture in an outdoor setting by American artists in the world. 

around us. In nature we can see fantastic designs, the perfect blending of beauty and function. We should celebrate that

All of the plants in this display are native to our region. He has not attempted to copy them, but rather to reflect their beauty. Each piece starts as raw steel and then transitions into a life like reflection of the original.


The wood he is using is Cyprus, "This Cyprus tree was growing in eastern North Carolina before the first European settlers arrived. The tree fell, not by the hand of man but by an act of nature, into a coastal North Carolina river in where it stayed for decades. The sand and debris carried by the moving water scoured the sides and ends of the wood. The natural chemicals in the water permeated the fibers and gradually staining them to a patina only time can achieve," says Zawistowski. "I first saw the 24 foot trunk after it was removed from the water and allowed to dry in a farmer's field. Even then, I could appreciate the special qualities of this piece. The log was milled and moved to my studio where I slowly continued the drying process over the last several years. I waited for the right project to come along. Using this wood on anything other than a unique piece of furniture would be a loss. I hope you agree, celebrating the art of nature, is the perfect use of such a beautiful piece of natural history."


Carteret Community College in Morehead City, NC, Offers Works by Jean Baardsen

Sometimes my work is pared down representation; sometimes it is abstract. Regardless of the genre, however, my paintings are all paintings of light and atmosphere. I seek to explore the many and varied faces of the physical world and to capture the ephemeral nature of light at a moment in time that transcends the subject and captures a mood that is timeless."

"Each piece begins with a loose idea that evolves gradually and intuitively as I build up the surface layer by layer," adds Guthrie. "I always have an idea of what I want to explore but I find that at some point the painting takes on a life of its own and I'm never sure where it will end up. Always, however, I strive to discover and convey the essence of the subject and to create exciting, thought provoking visual metaphors that celebrate the incredible beauty and diversity of our world. To me the concentrated stillness of making and manipulating marks on a canvas is a



form of meditation."

Eduardo Lapetina's abstract paintings, are based on the inner light of human emotion. "My abstract paintings are soulscapes that are the product of working in complete solitude. They represent the discovery of mysteries of the subconscious mind, and they are part of my personal legend. It is a collaboration of mind and spirit. These abstractions hold the promise of dreams, visions, fears, intangibles, and will. It is the magic of a private, secret, and confidential language."


Pringle Teetor marries art and science in creating her lyrical blown glassworks. "I find myself constantly amazed with how chemistry works in glass. Gold chloride, manganese, cobalt, copper and iron oxides are all used to create specific colors in glass. Unfortunately most of my favorite colors are high in silver and gold compounds, which have become more and more expensive. Silver blue or a gold ruby color is just so beautiful! Most of the pieces I make are made a bit 'backwards' - I think 'color before form' which sometimes can be the kiss of death in glass."

"Different colors of glass have very different working temperatures – some colors are very soft and fluid when at working temperature and others can be stiff at the same temperature, which makes blowing an even walled piece quite a challenge," adds Teetor. "Combining

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where there is something of interest for everyone. Of course, special pricing is available for these

many colors with high silver and gold elements that don't play together well made many of the pieces for my featured artist show difficult to produce - but the results can be astounding. A metallic sheen can result on some of the colors. Some of the pieces remind me of different stones, like jasper, malachite or lapis lazuli. Others look like visions from the Hubble Telescope of stars, dust and gasses in outer space. The sculptural pieces are made by specifically combining softer colors with stiffer colors wrapped around them, and then the axis is switched by transferring the piece to another pipe and another stiff color is wrapped around the piece. When

the blowing process starts, the stiffer color can be a little restraining and give the piece a 'cage' effect."

Founded in 2006, the Hillsborough Gallery of Arts is owned and operated by 22 local artists. The gallery represents these established artists exhibiting contemporary fine art and fine craft. Offerings include painting, sculpture, ceramics, mosaics, photography, fiber art, jewelry, glass arts, metal, enamel, turned wood and handcrafted furniture.


Louisburg College in Louisburg, NC, Features Works by Len Davis

Working collaboratively with sound designer, composer and audio engineer Jason Wagonner and light engineer Art Robinson, Grant has created wall sculptures that incorporate fiber optic lighting with an aural component. The viewer is able to trigger through sensors within the piece, sounds and optics that have been designed to integrate the visual and textural experience. These works encourage the viewer to see, touch and hear the sculpture.

Grant's pieces begin with a clay sculpture. After the firing process, numerous layers of oil pigments are applied until the final patina of rich hues is achieved. Porcupine quills, fossils, stones, feathers, wood, shells and other evocative objects are incorporated into the piece enriching the visual and intellectual experience. Each wall sculpture, while beautiful in its own right, comes alive as the fiber optics and aural components interact with each

There is an instant appeal to these works of sculpture and luminosity. Grant's Dreamscapes twinkle, glitter, radiate and glow ethereally. She explores the spectrum of optics as an integral part of

her wall sculptures - but this is not just about light and sound. Those familiar with Grant's "Windows to the Earth" series know that her wall sculptures stand on

Grant says, "Viewers are curious to see what the surfaces and textures feel like, getting so close their noses were almost touching the sculptures in an effort to see all the intriguing objects incorporated into each piece. They are even more curious to know the story behind the piece. What was the inspiration? Why is this peculiar pod in the center? Are these fish bones or tusk shells? What were you thinking when you conceived this piece? There was a need for many viewers to have an intellectual understanding as well as an emotional experience with the work.'

Warehouses, farms, towns, and cities that Ulinski passed on drives from Raleigh to the beach inspired this body of work. Through a series of long Sunday drives, Ulinski gathered the subject matter for his paintings. The works depict scenes spanning winter through summer.

Ulinski elaborates, "I was looking at the way the light bounced off the farm buildings, the abandoned warehouses and the empty streets...As spring turned to summer the last traces of gray disappeared replaced by verdant greens and clear blue skies. The trees, a linear compositional aid in the winter, became massive and looming and the dominate feature in the landscape. Late afternoon thunderstorms became a regular feature of July and August. [There were] huge banks of clouds that would catch and bounce the light down illuminating the scene with an eerie green light and deep blue shadows."

Ulinski creates his works using a palette knife, applying oil paints with wax and/or a heavy impasto medium. Layer is built upon semi-opaque layer, capturing subtle shifts in light and color in the scenes depicted.

Ulinski was born in Bandung, Indonesia, the son of a US Foreign Service officer. He spent his childhood shuffling between Africa, Asia, Europe and the United States before settling in Raleigh in 1976. He opened Dovetail Woodworks, a studio furniture shop, that fall. Ulinski

continues to design and build commissioned furniture and sculptural pieces for gallery exhibitions.

In 1993, Ulinski began the formal study of oil painting, working with Elizabeth Lentz for four years and subsequently with Jacob Cooley, Margie Stewart and Beverly McIver. Ulinski has taught woodworking and painting with various organizations, most recently at the Penland School of Crafts, NC, Arrowmont School for Arts and Crafts, TN, as well as at Artspace. He has exhibited widely at various museums and galleries, including the John Elder Gallery, NY, NY; Funeria, San Francisco, CA; the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art, Winston-Salem, NC; GreenHill, Greensboro, NC; and Blue Spiral Gallery, Asheville, NC. Ulinski's work has been included in the Smithsonian Craft Show and the Philadelphia Museum of Art Craft Show. He was an artist-in-residence at Artspace in 2000, and is currently an Artspace Artists Association member. Fellowships include those from the Vermont Studio Center and the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts.

In the exhibit, It All Goes Back To Childhood, Kiki Farish's drawings focuses on dichotomies. She explains, "In this series of drawings, I begin with text that reflects conflict regarding my own family's words of comfort: 'Kiki, you're not fat, you're chubby." Blending abstraction and realism, Farish uses mark-making to both express and suppress emotions in her works. 

Exploring the core of Dear Nature, featuring works by Natalie Abrams, Cynthia Camlin, and Mi-Sook Hur, art critic Dave Delcambre observes: "A constant dialogue with nature (positive or not), seems in fact deeply rooted in our modus operandi, perpetually engaging us on multiple levels. Not only is the ever-changing tableau of the natural world (and perhaps most importantly our interactions with it) a constantly roving target, but the particular challenges of capturing and representing such variety is an especially daunting one given nature's familiarity and the simple fact that we think we know the natural world better than we actually do.'

"Interesting to note in this exhibition, aptly entitled *Dear Nature*, is how one certain trio of artists - Mi-Sook Hur, Cynthia Camlin and Natalie Abrams - unflinchingly grapple with these issues head on. Within their work, time and process are inextricably interwoven so much so that it is often difficult to tell where each begins / ends and / or begets the other."

Natalie Abrams utilizes wax on wood panel to create sculptural, fluid pieces that reflect on concepts that include transition, capturing moments of time, how our systems and relationships mimic those found in the natural world, and the disregard we sometimes have towards the future while acting in the present.

Abrams has exhibited work throughout the United States at venues including Ball State University Atrium Gallery, Muncie, IN; Conrad Wilde Gallery, Tucson, AZ; The Gallery at R & F Paint, Kingston, NY; and the Denver International Airport, Denver, CO. Abrams was recently a Summer Affiliate Artist at the McColl Center for Visual Art, Charlotte, NC. She was also recently awarded a scholarship grant from the Seventh International Encaustic Conference in Provincetown, MA and, in conjunction with the conference, curated the exhibition Losing Ground, Gaining Perspective at Gallery X at Castel Hill in Provincetown. In 2014, Abrams will have a solo exhibition at City Ice Arts in Kansas City, MO.



Ray Duffey, with works on view in *Thought Maps & Ladders*, is an artist who explores the relationships between wood, sculpture and furniture. He elaborates, "My current sculptural series combines refined woodworking with the rough quality of reclaimed scrap material to create a relationship between vessel-like forms and their support structures. The structures act as a metaphor for those abstract social and familial networks that allow us to do what we do and make what we make."

Duffey has included for this exhibition a number of individual wooden sculptural forms referencing support structures, such as scaffolding and railroad trestle bridges. The structures are linear and constructed of many small boards meticulously fitted and joined together. These connections make up a network of cross bracing and triangulation that create a support for forms that may resemble sea or air-going vessels or perhaps seating of some sort.

Duffey has exhibited nationally, been a resident artist at Maine College of Art, Portland, ME, and has assisted teaching workshops at Penland School of Crafts and at Arrowmont School of Arts & Crafts. He currently teaches in Foundation Studies and Furniture Design at Herron School of Art & Design, Indianapolis, IN, and also holds the position of woodshop technician. degree in Art & Design from NC State University's School of Design and an MFA in Furniture Design from Herron School of Art & Design.

Becky Joye puts her experience as an architect to fanciful and at times ironic use to create her "Amusement" series, featured in *Thought Maps & Ladders*. Her amusement parks are set in stark, horizonless spaces that are colored with a dizzying range of rich, flat paint shades and collaged fabric and thread. Viewers may notice that there are no seats for people to sit in or tracks for the cars to glide upon. It turns out that Joye's utopian escape has no other people in it. However, viewers are welcome to relish her return to vouthful euphoria with a gondola, a series of islands, an elaborate network of chutes, a roller coaster, swings, and other delights crafted expressly for the delight

Joye received a Bachelor of Architecture from UNC-Charlotte in 2003. ing photographs of the scenic beauty of North Carolina and there are certainly numerous painters who have painted different areas of the state extensively, but to Wilson's knowledge none have attempted to paint the state in its entire breadth. By his reckoning, he is one-third of the way to completion.

While the Museum's exhibit of sketches, studies and preliminary drawings occupies the Nature Art Gallery, there will be approximately 30 paintings from the series on display throughout the Raleigh. None of those works will be for sale however. Wilson does not want to sell any of the paintings until the project is completed. The North Carolina Museum of History has 13 of the large paintings that he has completed hanging in their lobby. The remaining 15 or so will be distributed between the House of Representatives Chamber of the Legislative Building, the State Library, the Department of Cultural Resources and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources. The sketches in the Nature Art gallery are for sale.

Wilson's hope is that the viewers will renew their appreciation for the scenic beauty and diversity of the North Carolina landscape and "turn away from the envy of the Alps...in favor of the nobility of the Blue Ridge."

"For me this journey is about rediscovering the riches of North Carolina in a pre-Interstate natural landscape and hoping that you might experience the journey with me through these paintings," he said.

Wilson's paintings have been exhibited widely in museums throughout the Southeast, including the Greenville and Fayette-ville Museums of Art in North Carolina, The Burroughs-Chapin Museum of Art and the Spartanburg County Museum of Art in SC, the Albany Museum of Art in Albany, GA, and in galleries such as the Blue Spiral in Asheville, NC, Flanders



Yves Saint Laurent (1936-2008) is recognized as one of the greatest names in fashion history, called "the most consistently celebrated and influential designer of the past twenty years" by fashion historian Caroline Rennolds Milbank. He was among the first to present ready-towear designs, including his famous tuxedo suits for women that became a symbol of fashionable ease. 

It shows visitors that what we share culturally is perhaps greater than what separates us. Abstract art, like Naifeh's work, is capable of expressing complex ideas like unity and continuity. This exhibition is presented through the generosity of Mrs. Joyce Martin Hampton, The Hilliard Family Foundation and Dr. Gregory J. Wych. Through Dec. 8 - "Figures and Forms: The Glass Sculpture of Rick Beck". Similar to a magician, artist Rick Beck makes us look closely at what we thought we saw, only to see something different than expected, and become surprised, delighted and amazed. In his first one-person exhibition at the CMA, Beck shows figures and forms sure to capture the imaginations of visitors of all ages. Beck creates his glass sculptures using clay forms to create a silicone mold for recycled glass, which is fired to 1650 degrees Fahrenheit. As the molten glass takes the shape of the mold, it can take anywhere from a couple of weeks to a couple of months to cool to room temperature. Diamond blades shape the sculptures, and their surfaces appear rough and unpolished. That is intentional. "I want light and color to pass through, but I want you to be looking at the form and the color, not at what's pretty inside of it," Beck said. Light and color passing through the sculptureinstead of being on the surface only-can fool the eye and its interpretation of an object's position in space. Interactive Education Gallery, Through **Sept. 15 -** "Converging ideas: waterways of South Carolina". South Carolina students work with the Congaree Riverkeeper, Waccamaw Riverkeeper, and Savannah Riverkeeper organizations to photograph the state's waterways and highlight the natural beauty of South Carolina.
