Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Ben Nixon

The Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, is presenting Ben Nixon: Native State, on view through Sept. 7, 2014.

Using the 19th-century wet-plate collodion process, Spartanburg, SC, native Ben Nixon creates landscape photographs of exceptional beauty. By focusing his lens on unfamiliar terrain, he invites viewers into a mysterious, dreamlike world. Nixon is an expert technician in the collodion process, and when shooting in the field he relies on his car as his darkroom, where he develops the glass-plate negatives on site.

Because of its ability to record great detail, the collodion process was popular with photographers from the 1850s to the 1880s. The process has remained the same throughout the years. First, a glass plate is prepared and coated with collodion, a highly flammable solution of pyroxylin in alcohol and ether, which quickly loses sensitivity, requiring that the plate be developed immediately after it is shot. Once inside a traveling darkroom, the plate is dipped in a silver nitrate solution before being placed in a sealed container, which is then inserted into the camera and exposed. The glass plate is then returned to the darkroom and developed, dried and varnished, after which prints can be made from the glass plate negative.

Nixon attended Sierra Nevada College in the Lake Tahoe, NV, region and studied photography at Rockport College (now Maine Media College). Following his studies, Nixon relocated to California, where he worked for more than five years assisting photographer Jack Wel-



The series titled Native State began the summer of 2010 when Nixon returned home to photograph kudzu forests in South Carolina. The exhibition title reflects that the photographs were not only created in the artist's home state but also that his subject matter—natural landscapes and urban landscapes—is captured as it reverts to its native state. Nixon's work can be found in the permanent collections of the Santa Barbara Museum of Art and the Bolinas Museum.

That resolution then opens other avenues of investigation and process traveling toward yet more resolutions.

Their exploration is both personal and process oriented. Of his paintings Tom says, "The geometric figures and interplay between positive and negative forms reflect this dialogue between the inner and outer consciousness." Terry comments, "I have long considered the finished artwork as documentation of my inner thoughts and feelings and often refer to my work as interior landscapes." Both artists' works are inner conversations between a unique individual and the many processes and found objects each employs. Tom applies watercolor, comic pages, washes, acrylic mediums, inkjet transfers and more to

The Artists' Guild of Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, will present *Mechanisms* of Resilience, featuring works by local artist Aimee Wise, on view in the Guild Gallery at Chapman Cultural Center, from Sept. 1 - 17, 2014. A reception will be held on Sept. 4, from 6-9pm.

A Spartanburg native with deep roots in the community, from Pine Street School to the Spartanburg Day School, Wise's return home is a palpable motif in her art. After years of producing and exhibiting in Chicago, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Colorado, the 28 year old artist is excited to present an exhibition of her own in her hometown, with a series of works, both old and new.

"Recently I have been struggling to develop a cohesive body of work, similar to developing my own story, minus all the words," Wise said. "I tend to incorporate a lot of creatures in my art. I think that the symbolism and the minute subtleties of nature can appeal more largely to the viewer than a portrait can. The factual nature of scientific illustration together with interpretative feelings derived by the viewer are common elements in my work. I gravitated towards insects, snakes, blackbirds, and particularly the lotus flower to formulate works that I felt could communicate symbolically as well as emotionally," she said.

Wise typically employs nature as a

means of communicating personal artistic experiences. Her academic years at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago opened the doors to painting and drawing courses in both scientific illustration and form invention. Wise continued to cultivate biological research in her free time, as well as her time spent volunteering with insects at The Butterfly Pavilion (an invertebrate zoo in Westminster, Colorado) and handling snakes at the Spartanburg Science Center. Paintings and drawings of insects, fauna, and flora - artifacts of her continuing investigation in scientific illustration - are not merely representations of the specimens, but rich descriptions of her understanding of existence. "These narratives, found in the folds of fact and fiction, are the purest forms of truth," she said.
