Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Derek Larson and Marc Mitchell

Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, is presenting *A Monk Texting*, featuring work by Derek G. Larson and Marc Mitchel, on view through Oct. 17, 2015

The exhibit is a visual exploration in response to the popularity of fitness trackers and web data collection by Google, as well as other companies.

Larson and Mitchell willingly became their own sample set, collecting personalized data from their daily activities (such as number of steps taken, hours slept, calories burned, and time spent on the internet) via Fitbits. The catalyst for the project was the history of autobiography in the studio practice of artists, especially Philip Guston's 1973 artwork "Painting, Smoking, Eating," which chronicled the artist's daily routines. Larson and Mitchell have created autobiographical artworks specific to data sets that can then be combined and hung side-byside to represent a given daily activity. With their studios 900 miles apart, this project became an ascetic/aesthetic exchange of data and a devout practice in communication with someone not present.

Regardless of age, gender, ethnicity, or profession, our days are driven by a reliance on digital surveillance. With the influx of af-

fordable consumer-based central processing units (CPUs), individuals can now "plugin" 24 hours a day. Now more than ever we rely on computers, sensors, and software for professional and personal well-being. Posts on social media outlets not only share our thoughts with the world but also shape our cyber-profile; every time we post a location via Foursquare, swipe a credit card, input a Google search, or send an e-mail, we create a footprint that is tracked. Whether we like it or not, our digital data is being collected, aggregated and synthesized.

City of North Charleston, SC, Features Works by Melody Croft & Matthew Dietz

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that portraits in oil by Athens, GA, artist Melody Croft and abstract acrylic pieces by local artist Matthew Dietz will be on display at the North Charleston City Gallery, located in the Charleston Area Convention Center, in North Charleston, SC, from Sept. 3 - 26, 2015. Process, Pattern, and Transition, a collection of abstract paintings in acrylic created through techniques deeply rooted in his studio practice that convey visual experiences, as well as completely non-objective ideas. "My collections of shapes and space will continue to change as I pursue the next hidden gem. It is the discovery of that gem that completes the art work and keeps me interested in making images," Dietz states.

Dietz was born in Columbus, IN, where he grew up surrounded by architecture and public art. He earned his BFA as a double major in painting and printmaking from IUPUI Herron School of Art, his Post-Baccalaureate certificate in painting and drawing from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, and his MFA in painting and drawing at Ohio State University. Dietz's teaching experience includes, but is not limited to, adult figure drawing, summer camp art classes, drawing classes at Ohio State University, Trident Technical College, and other institutions of art.
