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leave he would travel to Italy, Spain and France, giving him the opportunity to see all the great art, architecture and museums that he learned about from books and in school.

After three years in the Army Cave was accepted into the San Francisco Art Institute where he received a BFA which was quickly followed by an MFA from San Francisco State University. Cave met and fell in love with his wife Jessica during this time, who was also an art student. They spent the 1960s in the Bay area where he became an accomplished architect and builder. In 1984 the Caves moved to Portugal, realizing a life long dream of living in Europe. They stayed there until 1989 when they moved to North Carolina where they still live today.

Cave's paintings create another world for the viewer. The scenes are familiar, but they are executed in a way that make you stop and look at every mark and color. The thick brushstrokes and intense pigments Cave chooses to use for each painting seem to vibrate right off of the canvas. They invite the viewer in for a closer look and they never disappoint.

The Art Cellar Gallery focuses on North Carolina artists while including select artists from across the Southeast, showing work from large scale canvases to smaller works on paper as well as including sculpture, glass and clay. Running concurrently with this exhibition is a smaller show of contemporary jewelry titled Wear that includes work by artists who use materials in new ways to create exceptional wearable pieces.

The Visitors Center Gallery has an ongoing display of objects that illuminate the history of Penland School, and the Lucy Morgan Gallery presents a selection of work by dozens of Penland-affiliated artists. On view outside the Penland Gallery are large sculptures in stone and steel by Daniel T. Beck, Hoss Haley, and Carl Peverall, plus a structure designed by artist Meredith Brickell that invites visitors to stop for a few minutes and observe the clouds.

Penland School of Crafts is an international center for craft education dedicated to helping people live creative lives. Located in Western North Carolina, Penland offers workshops in books and paper, clay, drawing and painting, glass, iron, metals, printmaking and letterpress, photography, textiles, and wood. The school also sponsors artists' residencies, an outreach program, and a gallery and visitors center. Penland is a nonprofit, tax-exempt institution which receives support from the North Carolina Arts Council, an agency funded by the State of North Carolina and the National Endowment for the Arts, which believes that a great nation deserves great art.

The Penland Gallery and Visitors Center is located at Penland School of Crafts on Conley Ridge Road, just off Penland Road in Mitchell County (near the town of Spruce Pine). It is the first building on the right as you enter the Penland campus.

works by contemporary glass artists, or view in the Penland Gallery, through Sept. 16,2018.

Alchemy was an early science famous for its attempts to turn lead into gold. Today, it's used to describe miraculous transformations. This makes Alchemy a fitting title for the current Penland Gallery exhibition of work by artists using glass in remarkable ways.

Glass is a material with almost limitless artistic possibilities. The twelve artists in this exhibition create objects of mystery and complexity by working with the material's chemical makeup, its optical properties, its ability to hold incredible detail, and the possibilities of layering and combining multiple processes.

Mark Peiser, who lives near Penland School, is represented in the show by two cast forms. They are made from glass that separates light into different colors so the apparent color of the pieces can change depending on how they are lit. Nickolaus Fruin's vessels, by contrast, are completely clear but have visible patterns created by combining different formulations of clear Page 34 - Carolina Arts, September 2018

glass that each refract light a bit differently. Penland resident artist Dean Allison has several three-dimensional portraits included in the show. His complex process begins with a rubber impression of his model's head. After many intermediate steps, the end result is a detailed bust cast from colored glass. Nearby is Amber Cowan's piece: an intricate assembly of glass leaves and flowers sculpted from recycled commercial glass waste and incorporating several vintage glass objects.

Also on display are several pieces by Kit Paulson, one of which is a flexible snake made from hundreds of linked glass rings.

More than twenty stunning images will grace the gallery space and stimulate discussion.

Miller is a Black Mountain resident with a history of contributing her photographic knowledge and passions to the Arts Center. For the past seven years she has organized, facilitated and shared her understanding of camera obscura history through the Worldwide Pinhole Day celebration. This fun and informative experience has introduced hundreds of people to the roots of photography by making an image on film using Miller's whimsical homemade pinhole cameras.

superimposed with geometric constructions and mathematical diagrams meant to invite the viewer to consider invisible or conceptual aspects of space. The artist asks, "Is there more to reality than what is observable, measurable or optically possible?" These works encourage the viewer to look more deeply than the surface of the image.

"A photograph is a two-dimensional representation of light reflected from three-dimensional space," says Miller. "No other medium renders perceptible reality more accurately - a magical quality that has continued on Page 35

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
