captivated me for most of my many years of art-making. But an image that is a representation of only what can emit or absorb light presents some limitations. These images integrate the inferred veracity inherent in a photograph with conceptual possibility. While landscape photography is the starting point for my images; the digital darkroom enables me to explore dimensional space, time, perception and illusion."

Miller has spent her career behind a camera and in front of a classroom. She

received her MFA in fine art from SUNY Buffalo and taught darkroom photography at Niagara University and digital photography at Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College. Her work explores alternative, innovative ways of creating and conceptualizing art, and has been exhibited both nationally and internationally. Her studio is in Black Mountain.

## **Toe River Arts in Burnsville, NC, Offers Photographic Exhibition**

On Sept. 15, 2018, Burnsville, NC's Toe River Arts will unveil 24 rare photographs taken by music folklorist, Cecil Sharp and his assistant, Maud Karpeles. These images will take viewers back to a time when folks worked from sunrise to sunset, kids went to one-room school houses or not at all, ate meals by lamplight, and sang songs passed down from generation to generation on their porches at twilight. The exhibit continues through Oct. 20, 2018, with a reception on Sept. 21, from 5-7pm at which Donald Hughes will speak about these black and white glances of Appalachia in the early 20th century.

Hughes initiated the Appalachia Project to commemorate the centennial of Cecil Sharp's visit to North Carolina and serves as its coordinator.

In 1916, English music teacher and ballad collector, Sharp and Karpeles, travelled the Appalachian region to document the songs and singers of their music. What they also collected were photographs of these peoples, in their homes, at work, in their best finery, posed, but perhaps not as comfortable in front of a camera. A fascinating glimpse into the rural life - the rural life of this region's ancestors.

They braved challenging terrain to visit singers and record the notes and words of the songs. By the end of their 46-week travels through North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee, the pair had collected more than 1,600 variants of English ballads from 281 singers. Out of their work came the English Folk Dance and Song Society based in Cecil Sharp House in London, the US-based Country Dance and Song Society, and a remarkable collection of centuries-old songs still sung today.

A three-year celebration of the people and the songs has begun both in the US and abroad. In celebration of the centennial of his journeys and his collection of hundreds of songs, stories, and photographs, the Cecil Sharp exhibition, the photographic exhibit,

is traveling around the region.

As part of the Cecil Sharp in Appalachia Project, organizers are looking for descendants of the Burnsville and Marion singers who may have information about their ancestors' interaction with Sharp in 1918. Although the exhibit includes only the families for whom photographs exist (Many of the pictures Sharp took were mailed back to the families as a way of thanking them for their time and voices and as a remembrance.), they are interested in speaking with descendants of all the singers included in his diary. If you are a descendant of someone who is included in Sharp's diaries, please contact (descendant@ cecilsharpinappalachia.org) and/or attend the Burnsville Gallery reception on Sept. 21 and speak with Donald Hughes.

The exhibit runs concurrent with the 33rd Annual Music in the Mountains Folk Festival on Saturday, Sept. 22, from 5:30 to 8:30pm at the Burnsville Town Center (106 South Main Street). Please call the Burnsville office, 828/682-7215 for tickets and more information.

Regional visual artists from across the spectrum, from part-time hobbyists to fulltime professionals, have been called to enter their work in *Bring Us Your Best*, now in its fifteenth year. The popular exhibition is cohosted by Blue Ridge Community College in Flat Rock, NC. The exhibit takes place in the Blue Ridge Conference Hall of the TEDC building.



The Arts Council of Henderson County is proud to present the 59th annual Art on Main fine art/fine craft festival along Hendersonville, NC's historic Main Street, Sept. 29-30, 2018. Festival hours will be 10am–5pm both days.

First, second, and third place cash prizes will be awarded in each of four categories: twodimensional work, three-dimensional work, fine craft, and photography.
