His Polish comrades did not know that he was Jewish. Lorenz hid his identity, as he surely would have been killed by the men who served with him. When Stevens conceived of this series of sculptures she imagined the forest as a sanctuary. However, she soon learned that the Ukrainian landscape's

countless mass graves. More than a million people were shot in these otherwise bucolic landscapes. This relatively unknown tragedy is called the "Holocaust by Bullets." Galleries A & B, Through Nov. 3 - "Sustained Ingrain: Contemporary Woodcuts from East to West," by guest curator: Scott Ludwig, Professor at Appalachian State University / Liu Jing, Professor at Changsha Normal University (Hunan Province, China). How is it possible that the oldest method of making prints, one that emerged in China during the first millennium, is still a rich, viable and relevant option for printmaking today? Why has such a basic process historically sustained itself in the face of constantly emerging and changing technologies? For many, a simple block of wood, long associated with craft traditions in both the East and West, emerges as the ultimate, natural antithesis to 'hi-tech' methodologies that seem to negate the hand. It is the ingrained, natural beauty and sensual materiality that perfectly lends itself to the meditative act of cutting and carving - material that is so inherently connected to the environment of planet Earth. Main Gallery, Through Dec. 8 - "Art from Down Under: Australia to New Zealand". While it is impossible to adequately represent either New Zealand or Australia in a single exhibition— a challenge made more daunting when attempting to showcase both countries— the artwork in this exhibition introduces visitors to the vibrancy of the artists currently working in Christchurch, Lismore, Brisbane, Canberra, and Melbourne, as well as artists who identify as born down under but who are currently living in the United States. It is a formidable undertaking to chart the immense diversity of these places and the artists who experience them and reflect their experiences through their artwork. In exhibitions such as this one, the gallery becomes the conduit for global learning and awareness, and the setting for the genesis of conversations between cultures as we exchange ideas in in an ever-changing and arguably shrinking global economy. The practice of bringing together artists, audiences and social discourse continues to reinforce the mission of the Turchin Center.
